Also visiting is a friend from Dominica where we had planted a church in the late 60's - early 70's. She came to Jamaica for Bible School in the 70's and returned to Dominica, where she now is involved in Evangelism and children ministries in Portsmouth, in the north. She is married with two adult children.

Your earnest prayers are sought for an initiative by the Evangelism Committee of our Ministers Fraternal, for a year of children evangelism activities. On February 16th. we will hold a gathering of pastors and children ministry workers to sensitize them to our vision. We hope to see a new focus and effort to win children outside our churches, led by younger members after an eight session training exercise. Then, after involvement in summer ministries in their churches, we hope to have community-wide children crusades. We will not be successful without your prayer support for these activities.

We greet you again with joy, as we keep busy for the Lord. Yesterday Lloyd had his first teaching class in Church History at Regent College of the Caribbean (formerly Jamaica Bible College). The Semester will go to late in May.

It was our joy to host, towards the end of January, a spiritual daughter from our ministry time in Dominica, late 60s to early 70's. She was here for a church conference in western Jamaica, and took the opportunity to visit with us. We had last seen her 37 years ago when she graduated from a Jamaican Bible College. She is now married with grandchildren. Melanie is involved in children and other evangelism ministries in the villages around Portsmouth, in the north of Dominica. It was so good to get updates on the work in Dominica. Plans are now afoot, with our daughter who was born there, for a visit later in the year during October, after attending a Caribbean Evangelical Conference in the nearby island of St. Kitts. Pray with us towards these plans.

Last Saturday the Evangelism Committee of our local Ministers Fraternal, of which Lloyd is Vice-Chairman, had a most encouraging launch of a planned year of Children Evangelism. Presentations were made to Pastors and Children's workers by Child Evangelism Fellowship, AWANA and FLOCK Jamaica leaders on the value and urgency of winning children to faith in Christ. The turnout was more than we had dared hope. Eight sessions of training will begin on March 9th going until June 22nd. The training will be done by presenters from the organizations mentioned above, along with others. The plan is to end in October and November with localised and then a final united Children's Crusade. We ask for your earnest prayers for the success of these plans.

Our Community Development efforts continue in the community of Greyground. Small business loans have been made to two single mothers, and we have two new requests to consider. But we need to strengthen our leadership cadre by inviting other persons to join our committee. Pray with us for the following issues:

- choosing officers to take on leadership positions;
- setting policies, guidelines and developing forms for use;
- establishment of a loan committee to consider applications;
- open a bank account to handle the funds we have now and will receive.

In two weeks time we welcome a team from Lifeline Gospel Ministries of Ft. Lauderdale in Florida. This is led by Jamaicans who minister to prisoners and to children in school assemblies, etc. Elaine and I are contacting and setting up visits to six Primary and High Schools, arranging transportation, etc. The schools are open to us, and the team will address assemblies as well as chapel services at the College where Lloyd teaches. Among the team leaders are two graduates of the College. We invite your prayers for the team and the children.

Our 17 year old car has been in the garage since the beginning of the week, with cylinder head and radiator problems. It seems to be on its last legs. We hope it can last a little longer until we can get a newer one.

We both continue to enjoy fairly good health, considering our age. Lloyd has upcoming visits to his Cardiologist and Urologist early next month. We trust his cholesterol and PSA readings will continue to be good.

There have been a number of funerals of friends and acquaintances recently. It keeps us reminded of our mortality, and the need to be ready for the inevitable call home. But Elaine and I are determined not to slow down, but to do as much as we can for as long, towards the salvation of souls and the promotion of the Kingdom of God on earth.

The 'lazy days of summer' are just about over. But for us the summer was by no means quiet and lazy.

We returned from Florida and Barbados at the end of May to marking final term papers and reports, followed by graduation day at Regent College of the Caribbean, where Lloyd teaches. June saw us in continuing involvement with the Ministers Fraternal in the Child Evangelism teacher training effort. We rejoiced at the testimonies given by attendees of help received and insights and inspiration gained into the importance of reaching children with the gospel message. A total of thirty (30) persons participated in the eight (8) sessions over a period of four months. Certificates of 'Participation' were presented to seven (7) persons and of 'Completion' to ten (10). Come October and November this Child Evangelism effort in the churches will take the form of outreach events in local communities, followed by combined Children Crusades.

Much planning will be needed to achieve success in these events, but more so prayers. We depend on you our partners to stand with us by your prayers. Other summer involvements included:

- A brief visit by our grandkids, Annika (10), and Tyler (8) in June.
- A week of special believers Bible studies and public messages at the annual Keswick spiritual conference July.
- 2 weeks of VBS leading and teaching by Elaine. An outstanding feature was the large # of boys who attended.
- Visits Elaine's sisters and a niece for a funeral in July, followed by a family reunion of the Huie family.
- Much of Lloyd's time was, spent marketing his book on Jamaican Missions involvement to bookstores, libraries, seminaries and denominational headquarters in Jamaica. A lot of time was spent in travel into the capital, Kingston, as well as to conferences and other events which allowed opportunities for presentation. Funerals have featured large in our recent activities as, in addition to that of Elaine's sister's mother-in-law, Lloyd's mother passed away on July 31st. She was 96 and a half years old and prepared to enter the presence of her Lord. Yet her expected passing has left a void in the family. The funeral took place on Monday August 12th. with Lloyd saying a poem he wrote in tribute to her. Our second daughter Gail visited with us for the funeral and has since returned to her family and job in Miami. Today is Good Friday! For those outside the USA, it is also a Holy Day (holiday). I preached at my home Gospel Chapel on the three locations of the happenings of that day: Gethsemane, Gabbatha and Golgotha. It was for me a most memorable day. I trust it was for you also.

On Monday last it was our joy to visit with our daughter Gail, her husband Scott Tracy, and our grandchildren Annika and Tyler, as they stopped in Falmouth by cruise ship. Along with a nephew and his family we spent a day of fun with them at the Dolphin Cove attraction in Ocho Rios. They left for Grand Cayman that evening, on their way back to Florida.

The visit earlier this month of the team from Lifeline Gospel Ministries, in Florida, gave us the opportunity to visit six elementary, Junior High, and High Schools here in the Mandeville area. We ministered to over 3000 children, and distributed more than 3200 booklets on self-worth and God's purposes for their lives. Many prayed to receive Christ as their Saviour. It is left up to the teachers and Guidance Counselors assigned to the schools to nurture them in the faith. A tremendous opportunity was shared with us by the head Guidance Counselor for the region, to meet with and assist the other Counselors in their work with the schools. Do help us pray for these believers who regularly minister to the thousands of children in our various schools in Jamaica. It is a great opportunity that is not being adequately grasped by the churches.

The Child Evangelism training, led by the Evangelism Committee of the Ministers Fraternal, has had two sessions, with six more to go. The turnout has been good, and we trust it continues to be so. We still pray we shall see even more coming out, and that they will return to their churches and communities to gather children into the Kingdom of God. Pray for the trainers from the various children organizations who are partnering with us in these training sessions.

Over 20 single mothers came out for the business training a few weeks ago, to learn how to set up micro business ventures. Do pray for us, and the others who form our Managing Committee, as we continue to strengthen our policies and plans to help these mothers and their children. We trust that many will be eventually led to faith in Christ, the One who can meet all of their needs, material and spiritual. We seek your prayers for us for the following requests:

- for the students at Regent College who continue their studies with Lloyd in Church History;
- the children at Porus to whom Elaine ministers in her Bible Clubs and literary classes;
- the submission of Lloyd's finished manuscript by the publishers to be printed. We await the book's expected delivery in a few weeks time. Lloyd may need to travel to South Florida to take delivery of a portion of the books. Pray for the covering of all these costs;
- Our car problems have worsened, as we are unable to find a replacement engine. We are therefore of the view that the Lord wishes us to seek a replacement. But due to the financial restraints we are under until the book's costs are fully paid for, we are forced a wait awhile. Do pray for the Lord's resolution of this need. We are trying not to let it hamper our ministries here;
- We praise the Lord for all His provisions of our needs, as well as for the good health He gives us to continue serving Him here. We are only able to do all these things as you continue to stand with us by your prayers and financial support.

Elaine's weekly children's classes continue, and soon she will be into Vacation Bible Schools. We look forward with happy anticipation to our grandkids visiting with us in mid June. They should have exciting times with their many aunts, uncles and cousins in Jamaica. Our health remains good, just that Lloyd has been having problems with insomnia recently. Elaine thinks he is taking too many nutritional supplements, and so his body is maybe too hyper. He has done various sleep related tests but none has shown the cause. Pray that we find out how to get him back to normal sleeping patterns, without dependence on sleeping tablets. Otherwise he is fine.

We do want to wish you and your families happy summer vacations as they come. Thanks again for your love shown to us, your prayers and financial support. We appreciate them all, and are aware how how fortunate we are to have friends and supporters like you are.

Elaine and I returned after two weeks to find new life and fruitfulness bursting out all over on our little 'plantation.' The rains had fallen most of the time we were away. Our two cherry trees were bowed down with fruit, and many were on the ground. So too were the Jamaican (O'Tahiti) apple tree. At its root, as well as on its branches, was more than we will be able to consume. The 'pa-pa-ya' (paw-paw) tree by the fence provided 4 ripe fruits that were immediately pureed to provide pulp for gallons of juice. Elaine did the same with the large bag of cherries Lloyd picked.

The rains have caused all the trees to be sprouting fresh leaves; so too the grass and weeds. I think we will await the end of the rains, but we do have to have it cut soon. The 'Jerusalem candlestick' purple, as well as the yellow, lilies greeted our wondering eyes. Even the 'star-apple' tree had a late crop with a couple of ripe fruits awaiting us; and the 'sweet-sop' trees are laden with future fruit. Truly God is good to us, on our little half-acre plot.

We also returned with the fruit of 8 years of research, writing, reading, rereading and correcting, plus 4 years of waiting for the publisher to do her work of preparing the manuscript for the printer. At last Lloyd's 700+ pages book is in our hands. His 'tome' The Story of Jamaican Missions, has been receiving rave accolades in Miami, Barbados, and now in Jamaica as we had opportunities to present it to a South Florida conference of Jamaican churches, and to Barbadian friends before our return Friday last. This week Lloyd has been making the rounds of christian bookstores, denominational headquarters and Bible Colleges and Seminaries to promote and sell the book.

Your prayers, and Lloyd's hard work, has come to fruition, finally. We ask your intercession that this book will be blessed of God to inform His Church, and to raise up a new generation of Jamaican missionaries to go into all the world with the gospel message before the end comes.

Our Barbados visit, via Miami and Trinidad, was to reunite with old friends from Bible College and ministry together in Dominica, and to make new ones. Lloyd was the Sunday speaker at the service to honour Ronald and Cynthia Trotman for 40 years of pastoral ministry. Now that we are back Lloyd has exams and term papers to mark. It never ends, but God gives us strength to do His work. Thank you all for your help by your prayers for us. May he abundantly bless you all!

Dear supporting friends and family,

Greetings from fairly warm, and mostly sunny, Mandeville Jamaica. We trust you had a good Thanksgiving Day's dinner and fellowship with family and friends. Elaine and I greatly miss that particular U.S. holiday. We don't have anything like that here, but we did bake a chicken and pretended it was a turkey. We truly give thanks to God for all His blessings over the past year. We look forward to the Christmas celebrations, which is more like Thanksgiving in Jamaica.

As we review the year we find we have so much to celebrate and be thankful for: As a family:

- We enjoyed good health, though Lloyd did a lot of tests concerning his high cholesterol problem. It is largely under control with drugs and diet changes; he also sought to settle issues concerning insomnia. After certain tests and second opinions, he ruled out any surgery or major interventions. The cholesterol medications seemed to be the main culprit. Elaine has recently been referred to a cardiac specialist, but all tests are negative, praise God. She also battles high cholesterol and has begun taking the dreaded statin drugs. She is not too faithful in taking the medication.

- One of our special joys this year was the January visit of a spiritual daughter from Dominica. She had come to Jamaica in the 70's for Bible College, and returned to her homeland. She has a family, and serves in soulwinning visitation evangelism. Her visit sparked a desire in us to revisit that country where our second daughter was born. We had hoped to do so in October when Lloyd was to attend a Caribbean Church conference. But the conference was cancelled. Another opportunity may present itself in July 2014, when a denominational conference is planned for St. Kitts, a close-by island. We are trusting the Lord to bring this about.

- We had the joy of visiting with our daughter and family in Miami in late May, and in hosting the grandchildren for a week during their summer break. Then came Elaine's sisters and their families for an in-law-parent's funeral in mid July. This was followed by a family reunion in Montego Bay of the Huie clan, Elaine's family. It was a real treat, with celebration of the spiritual heritage of the family. Elaine got a plaque for being one of the Living Legends of the family.

- Lloyd had a number of family funerals this year, as his 96 year old mother passed on at the end of July; in November his family lost his older sister's brother-in-law, and his father's niece's lost her husband that same day. We hope there are no more in the near future.

Many opportunities for Ministry have come our way during the year.

- Elaine continues her many children's ministries at the Methodist Church in Porus, and in the schools. It was our joy to host Jamaican ministry friends from Florida for a week in March. We are able to go into six (6) elementary and high schools with the message of biblical self-worth, and distributed over three thousand booklets to the children. Her other visits into schools, as part of her spiritual-medical abstinence program, saw many asking to receive the Lord as Saviour. But adequate follow-up with them is a problem.

- Another of her initiatives is with the government's programme to assist low literacy and high school dropout students, JFLL (Jamaica Foundation for Life-Long learning). A dozen of the most needy boys go to her Methodist church each week for economic, social and spiritual assistance. A few have shown spiritual awakening,

and one now attends church occasionally. Her advocacy for the students has resulted in her being put on the parish (County) governing board. Other young people are constantly seeking her out for school fees, financial aid, counsel etc. We thank God for each chance to influence these lives.

- Lloyd relishes teaching at Regent College. His students face a class project presentation about Comparative Religions this week, end of semester research papers and final exams in a few weeks. It has been a challenge and a joy to pour into these young people, and to help prepare them for future ministry.

- The printing of his book The Story of Jamaican Missions has revived his salesman past. It has also opened doors for presentations before ministerial groups, denominational leaders and bookstores, and church missionary meetings. And he has invitations pending for the coming year. He has gotten it into the major bookstores and tertiary institutions, though he has had to credit out quite a lot. But sales have been progressing fairly well. The major portion of the books are in the U.S. and are available from my daughter and other sources in Florida. It is listed on Amazon.com, but we have not seen any movement from that source.

- One development from marketing the books has been connecting with a young pastor who waited on the book for three years, and has a vision to start a mission sending agency. He has the potential to be a catalyst for cross-cultural missions within and outside his denomination. Do pray that we can provide the practical and wise guidance he seeks from us.

- On another plane, Lloyd has recently been working with a local pastor who sought his help finding a missions team to help in repairing and remodelling of a building he is using to plant a church. Lloyd was able to link him with a source which is working with him to bring this about.

- He has also been contacted recently by a graduate student in the U.S. to link him with churches and missions receiving short-term missions teams. He wants to visit to do research for his Phd. thesis on value gained by those receiving such groups.

On the local scene, we have often been the source of counsel and of help to people needing financial/economic aid. Persons in the Community seem to believe that we are an economic answer to their problems. We do what we can, and find work around the home for some as we are able. Others we have sought to help through a community outreach program with churches nearby. But too many are only looking for a handout. Very few are trainable, or are seeking long term help for themselves via a skill or business. Nevertheless, we have not yet outre given up. Pray with us that we will be more effective in the future.

- With the Ministers Fraternal Lloyd has been kept busy as Public Relations Officer and general go-to-guy. He cherishes his role as Vice-Chair of the Evangelism Committee. The focus this year has been to help the churches revive, or begin, a Child Evangelism effort. Training sessions in reaching children outside the churches were held between March and June. Combined outreaches by churches in two particular communities were initiated during November. Both went well, and the hope is that this will spark other individual or united outreaches on a Sunday afternoon. Pray towards this end. Plans are to have a Children's Crusade and Fun Day in 2014. This will need much planning and prayer. We depend on you standing with us.

The signs of Christmas are all around us: we only need to look out at our garden as the 'snow-on- themountain' (Euphorbia) trees are ablaze with their white leaves. The poinsettia leaves and flowers have also been changing from green to flaming red. Elaine has also began preparations with the churches in the town of Porus for their annual Christmas program in the streets. This will take place on December 23rd. We are trusting God to draw many persons to Himself.

Do have a blessed Christmas season, and a prosperous New Year when it arrives.
