

THE AGONY OF WAITING ON THE LORD

A few years ago, we wrote of a young, single, white Zimbabwean lady, a trained nurse who, in 2000, left her friends and family in Harare and went to the Tonga people in obedience to the Lord's call. There in Siabuwa, she began a nursing/medical/etc ministry from her tiny caravan.

This is a small tribe in the Zambesi Valley whom the development in the Country seemed to have missed completely. The land is very dry and sandy. There's no irrigation so folks depend on rain to produce food for themselves and grass for their few animals. When there is no rain, they scratch the riverbed for water.

Electricity and telephone were things they only heard of when Vicky first went to serve her Lord in that region. There was no one of her ethnicity around; she did not speak their language nor was she familiar with their culture. Hers was the only medical 'facility' around. But the local Chief welcomed her and allowed her to park her caravan from which she attended to 200 to 400 patients daily. It also doubled up as her accommodation.

Over the years, Vicky has tried to train a few of the people so they could assist her. She also had a Sunday School for the children. All who come to her for help understand that it is Jesus Christ who, in her, is reaching out to them. In due course, she was able to arrange for Pastor Rikki from Harare to visit monthly to teach the pastors. Although churches abound, their spirituality is mixed with tribal practices and beliefs. Now over seventy-five, Rikki and his wife continue to make this eight hour trip despite the terrible roads. Dhan had the privilege of accompanying him on a few occasions. Four years ago, the pastors asked for Vicky's help in having a Missions Conference to which they invited many pastors from other villages – a first for Zim, we are told. This has been an annual feature since then.

This, in a nutshell, is Vicky's story. So why are we sharing it? Because it is the story of so many of us who serve the Lord in missions. Time and again, we labor and wonder if there are any results; whether our efforts count. We ask ourselves, "are these people benefitting from what we are doing? Are we really making disciples?"

We have been reading over the Psalms these days and looked at Ps. 126 recently where the Lord promises (vs. 5,6): "Those who sow in tears will reap with songs of joy. He who goes out weeping, carrying seed to sow, will return with songs of joy, carrying sheaves with him." That same day, we received a call from two pastors who, until recently, were part of our Chegutu group. They said, "Dhan and Dolly, we just want to say thanks for the investment you made in our lives; there is hardly a day that we do not recall and apply some of what......". We could only say "thanks" and encouraged them from 2 Tim. 2:2 – "The things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others."

The Lord spoke to us, we responded in faith and that is why we are here. Though we stuttered at times, we have never really doubted His call upon our lives nor the validity of what He called us to do. We know only too well that "the race is not for the swift". Our task is not to judge the work by the appearance of visible, tangible results. On our part, faithfulness is really the only true test of success. So before His face, we must strive daily to be faithful.

We are very grateful that, whilst many of you readers have been faithful in praying and giving sacrificially, you have not demanded of us that we produce "hard" evidence of the success of our mission. We know it's tough not to do so. But even more tough is trying to put God in a box and to demand of us what we cannot of Him. Instead, you join us in waiting for the appearance of fruit in due season, and we deeply appreciate that.

But most of all, though, we give praise to our Lord whose work this is, for calling us and being able to serve Him in this way. Indeed, we are so very blessed. Thanks be to God for His abundant blessings!!

In April we gave God thanks as we marked 30 years as full-time missionaries and this month we give God thanks for seeing us through 8 years of ministry here in Zimbabwe. We thank God for all of you who have partnered with us over the years, some of you all of the 30 years! May God richly bless you for your faithfulness to His call.

Earlier this year, we quietly celebrated thirty years of ministry with praise and thanksgiving to our Lord for the privilege of serving Him these past years, for leading and keeping us, and for all He has taught and continues to teach us in our journey with Him.

We spent time reflecting on God's goodness and faithfulness as He graciously and patiently worked and continues to work in us through these many years. We could see how He used our backgrounds and life experiences to prepare us for today.

For the first seventeen years of ministry, we were based in Grenada and worked in most of the English- speaking islands in the Caribbean in the areas of Evangelism and Discipleship, Hurricane Relief (when occasion arose), and various other forms of ministry. In retrospect, the Caribbean was our comfort zone. At times, we clearly did not understand what God was doing, like when He sent us to the US for five years. That was part of our preparation for coming to Zimbabwe although we did not see it initially. But we thank Him for extending our borders and bringing us into this phase of our ministry experience. Undoubtedly, despite the many challenges, this has been the highlight of our lives as we grow in our relationship with our loving, Heavenly Father.

We are as convinced now as we were in 2008 this is where God wants us to be right now. As we grow older, there is an added sense of urgency to share Christ, to make Him known, and to help prepare believers in this land for this mission. So we continue to work with the leadership of different assemblies, as well as individuals and other groups, in spiritual growth (discipleship) - knowing the Lord and taking the Gospel out.

We are ever deeply grateful to our Lord and to all of you who have been a part of this process. Some of you have been partnering with us throughout these thirty years and we celebrate you and your faithfulness. Others of you later came on board and have been no less faithful. You all have been a very special blessing from our Lord to us. You have been more than supporters – you have become our dear friends. We thank God for your friendship, prayers, encouragement and financial support without which we certainly could not remain on the field. We pray that our journey with the Lord has been a growing experience for you as well.

There is a great and continuing need for Discipleship in Zimbabwe; indeed, in Africa. Please pray that the Church would see Discipleship as essential to its obedience and growth, and to the nurturing and preparation of those who will take the Gospel from Zimbabwe to the nations. To this end, we labor.

It is such a joy to know that we can take our requests to Him, no matter how seemingly trivial and insignificant, and He will hear and answer. I thank Him too for teaching Dhan and me to appreciate the gifts which He lavishes on us each day. Gifts that may appear little but are so very important to our overall well-being.

The Holy Spirit recently brought us again to John 8:58, where our Lord tersely responded to the religious zealots by saying, "......before Abraham was, I am". With this simple response, His detractors were both moved to violence and silenced. Just two small and simple words, "I AM", say everything, for they are the Words of Life.

So whatever circumstances, events, changes or challenges we may be experiencing, may they bring us great assurance, courage and hope. Isaiah puts it this way: "If you do not stand firm in your faith, you will not stand at all." (Is 7:9b NIV). We pray you would continue to find great encouragement in Him who changes not. For these very circumstances which we face remind us that the Lord is working out His sovereign purposes.

Globally and nationally, this year has already seen its fair share of big challenges. Here in Zim food shortages caused by hiccups in our farming plus severe drought have been added to our list of woes. The rains, when they came, were welcome as they helped with the water table but they were much too late to be of significant help to the stressed crops in many areas. In some parts of the nation, the drought is so severe that cattle are dying and people are already showing signs of malnutrition.

We thank God for His grace in enabling us to keep our eyes on Him and to trust Him to meet the physical needs of those around us for one can easily be overcome by a sense of hopelessness. Yet, a deep abiding faith in the one true God is what is absolutely necessary to see God's people and this nation through. So, by His grace, we continue to focus on what He has called us to do.

Earlier this year, we began meeting with a new group at Goromonzi, about one hour twenty minutes from home. We meet with them on two Saturdays each month, then the following week we proceed on to Chegutu and Gweru. In between trips, we meet with individuals and couples and have home Bible studies, and preaching engagements.

We are now into our eighth year of ministry here. During this time, we have met with hundreds of national pastors at different locations. However, we are still greatly troubled by the lack of depth in many areas of the Church and what appears to be luke-warmness towards the Lord Himself.

Zim is a nation of churchgoers. The streets are filled on Sundays with people going to and from Church services. Their singing is melodious, their tunes catchy and their dancing spectacular. The airwaves are filled with all kinds of preaching. Prophets, apostles and other "titled" persons abound! This, coupled

with the stranglehold of the prosperity Gospel, highlights the need for people to know Christ. It is the only way they can discern truth from error and not run to the n'angas (witch-doctors) as soon as they face a challenge.

For this reason, we give God thanks for those whom we have been working with and particularly for the four young ladies in Gweru and Harare in whose hearts God has placed a deep love for Him and a desire to know and serve Him.

Please pray that God would:

- Place a desire in the hearts of believers here to know Him and to love Him for who He is
- Cause them to invest time in reading His Word
- Impress upon the hearts of pastors and leaders the need for discipling their flock
- Give us continued wisdom as we disciple the individuals He has been sending into our lives

Please also pray for us:

- Safety in travel
- Continued good management of our health and
- Wisdom and sensitivity as we minister cross-culturally

Praise God for:

- Dolly's recovery from sinus infections and bronchitis
- Those individuals whom He has brought into our lives desiring to know Him
- Continued grace to maintain our focus
- The privilege of serving Him these past 30 years (April 16th was our anniversary as missionaries)
- The daily comfort and encouragement of His Word

Thank you so much for faithfully partnering with us as the Lord uses us to help train the workers for the harvest (Matt 9: 37-38).

Dear Faithful Friends,

December 2016

In a few more days this year will be history. If the Lord tarries, 2017 may even run by faster than its predecessor.

In January, the Lord had prepared us to expect a year marked by irreversible change at every level of life. As we experienced each of the many, we have had to remind ourselves that, regardless of how far-reaching they are, these very changes testify that the Lord is working out His sovereign, eternal purposes which cannot be thwarted or undone. So, by His grace, we are not dismayed but are sustained by the reality – forever, He reigns!

Now, more than ever, we are convinced of the urgency of "world missions" with which the Lord has tasked His Church. In Matthew's Gospel, He prefaces His command with the declaration that all authority is vested in Him. He ends with the assurance that He is with us until this age ends. This task involves, firstly, sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ with those who do not know Him so they could have an opportunity to come to faith in Him ("evangelizing"); and helping such ones to maturity in Christ ("discipling"). When the Lord commissioned us in 2008, it was clear that we were to be 'equipping the Church in Zimbabwe for intentional participation in World Missions'. We understood that to mean that we were to work with the Church in a discipling ministry.

Before long, we discovered that, even among the leadership of some of the churches, we needed to present the Gospel. From then, we made no assumptions as we met with groups drawn from various churches. Over the years, we have had inter-denominational groups in several cities and rural areas, spending two to three days monthly with each. This required much travelling over a sizable portion of the Country. In the process, we have sat with a few thousand people.

But, along the way, we also discovered that some participants had different agendas. Many of them lacked a real desire for the Lord; others were merely interested in getting preaching material. We learned that the title "Pastor" carried great respect and preferential treatment in the community, and it seemed to us that many opted for this 'vocation' but lacked any sense of call.

In frustration one day last year, we cried out to the Lord asking Him if there were not any who longed for Him and greatly desired to know Him. Almost immediately, He sent us four ladies – one in Harare and three in Gweru. (We have not found any sustained interest among the younger men). The Harare lady is preparing to go to an Islamic country in Asia with an international Missions organization. What a delight to work with her; it is so refreshing to find a young person who has a pure, passionate desire for the Lord Himself. When in Gweru, on our bi-monthly visits, we spend two hours with each of the three, although scheduling is becoming a problem. We still have two main groups – one at Goromonzi on the outskirts of Harare and the other in Gweru – both of which are quite encouraging. Additionally, the Lord continues to send us families and individuals in Harare with whom we regularly meet.

So this is where we are at the end of 2016. As you can see, it is a mixture of joy and sorrow, excitement and heartbreak. But God is faithful. So, we leave our meager but faithful efforts in His hands that He may yet see fruit from lives that honor Him.

None of this would have been possible had you not stood with us, faithfully supplying our needs for prayer and financial support. Thank you, dear ones, for your friendship with us and your love for our Lord. To Him alone belongs all the praise and glory!
