

As co-laborers with us in the Kingdom of God, we greet you again from Jamaica where it is perpetually Spring. At this time of the year we are usually facing dry times, with its attendant low water pressure and often lock-offs. However, this year the Lord has been gracious and the showers have not ceased. As a result we had an outburst in recent weeks of flowering trees: the yellow Pouii, and a purple shrub in our garden whose name I am ignorant of.

The national election I mentioned last time went off peacefully, and resulted in a change of government. But the results were close, as there was only a one seat difference between the two major parties. The transition has been good, with acknowledgements of the need for cooperation in government. The cabinet of ministers chosen is a good mixture of youth and experience, with two of the members of the upper house (the Senate) being members of Lloyd's denomination. There are many nominal christians, and a few evangelical members on both sides of the parliament. Your prayers are needed that all will seek God's wisdom to govern rightly and righteously.

Elaine returns on the 16th. from her New York visit for the funeral of a niece who died tragically. Lloyd's two weeks of housekeeping will thankfully come to an end. With all of his other responsibilities many things did not get done. He would value your prayers for the following upcoming ministry involvements:

- His continuing teaching responsibilities at the two Bible Colleges in town;
- His supervising of the new Children's Ministry Course, with its 15 eager students;
- Good Friday preaching assignment at an Anglican church, over two hours drive away;
- Missions Conference at Spalding Brethren Assembly: April 3-5th;
- Lloyd's travel to Scotland for the wedding of our first daughter, on April 9th.
- Elaine's outreach, with her church, to needy male students from a remedial school;
- Her children classes and preaching assignments with the Methodist churches.

Let us remember to take every opportunity that comes our way to share the message of God's love with everyone we come in contact with. That opportunity was Lloyd's yesterday, as he witnessed to the landscape man who works for us. He attends church occasionally but is not saved. He said to Lloyd afterwards that "you know, you are the first person who has ever talked with me one-on-one about my soul." Do pray that he will soon ask Christ into his heart.

We praise God for His many mercies and blessings; and we praise Him for prayer and financial supporters like you. We would not be able to do what we do without you. Thanks again! Do keep lifting us up in your hearts and your prayers.

Food Testimonies





Gweru: We returned from Gweru a couple of days earlier than scheduled because of some mix-up over the dates with the Bible College. It smells a little bit like sulfur, since we had given our Gweru dates to the College in December and sent messages as well. So effectively, we miss this first term and are expected to pick up the slack in the second term.

The sulfur is even more apparent as the Church we work with there is in the middle of an unpleasant situation with a congregation to which it rented and who has not paid any rental for months. Nevertheless the "tenant" church has now moved their services to clash with our host Church's service time without prior discussion or notice. The host Church is a small, mainly white, congregation. The "tenant" Church is a large black congregation...... Thank God there is no intimidation in His Kingdom!

Chegutu: After seven years in the area, we think it may be time to move on. However, we had an especially good time with the host Pastor and are minded to see how the Lord leads i.e. to move or not to move! If we are not to move, it would be so we can pour into this pastor.

Goromonzi: The class in Goromonzi is both encouraging and challenging at times. We are still amazed at how little Bible reading is done in Christendom here, even though the people generally are avid readers. We also have an ongoing battle with the cultural norms which do not support interaction. A teacher or an elder within or without the Church is highly respected and therefore cannot/should not be questioned! But, this may just be an excuse for the bigger problem!

Domboshawa: The Domboshawa class has not come off the ground this year. We believe they have venue issues. Friday morning Pastors' prayer time and Monthly Breakfast: The weekly prayer time been on hold since Christmas but will resume at our home on Friday 4th March.

Monthly Pastors' Breakfast: Each month a different Pastor or Missions' group hosts this breakfast and share their work or use the time to promote an upcoming ministry which would benefit the Zim Church. This month it will be hosted by a group who will be launching a Bible distribution ministry.

Resthaven, **Rusape:** Although we no longer have a monthly group there, we visited the residents at Resthaven in January. They were quite happy to see us but it was obvious that many of them were facing health and other challenges. The place is still fairly well maintained but there was a sense of sadness there.

The founder of the group in South Africa who brought in food and other supplies to most of the retirement homes here, is now ill with cancer. Many of the residents were dependent on those food packages to supplement their meagre pensions. Most of them would have lost their farms and their investments during the hyper-inflation days so they can hardly afford the \$40.00 US needed to meet the monthly fees.

With little or no family support, their future does not look encouraging. The non-white Zimbabweans have a lot of family support and are hardly ever found in retirement facilities.


One on one: We continue to meet with individuals on a one on one. Mainly they are people who love the Lord and are dissatisfied with the lack of depth of the organized Church where they don't fit in anymore. So we meet with them and encourage them in the Word and trust that the Lord would lead them to a place of fellowship in His time.

OM: Dhan continues to serve on the Board of OM. We have seen many changes in the past few months. The Field Leader of six years is moving back into the foreign mission field (to a country we are not at liberty to disclose) and a new leader has been installed; there have also been some changes on the Board and there may be more to follow as the older steps down and the younger steps in! But slowly and surely, young missionaries are being sent out most of whom are serving on the LOGOS Hope.

Preaching: Dhan continues to preach as and when he is asked to do so both in Harare and in Gweru.

Health Checks: Our annual check- up revealed that we are still very much alive and the aches and pains are not life-threatening! For this we give Him praise.

Spiritual Health: We thank God for keeping us. Indeed, He allows circumstances in our lives that daily send us running to Him.





New School Year

The new school year in Kenya began with the calendar year. The Haven and Fresh Start homes now have thirty-nine students in various boarding high schools around Kenya. Thirteen of these students are in Form 1 (that means they are Freshmen), eight students are in Form 2 (Sophomores), ten are in Form 3 (Juniors), and eight are in Form 4 (Seniors).

Though the primary school students are closer to home than the high school students, they, too, are in three different schools, and some of the Class 8 students (eighth graders) are also boarding at their respective primary schools.

All schools take a break for the month of April, so that means all students, including high school and primary boarding school students, will be home for the break. Please pray for them as they wrap up this first trimester and travel home.









Sponsorship, Advocacy, and Prayer

Sponsorship, advocacy and prayer are great ways to get involved in orphan care! Sponsorship provides regular financial support for a good home, nutritious food, clothes and medical care "to look after orphans...in their distress," James 1:27. The children are grateful for Cassie's work on their behalf!



Greetings from Ocala, to our friends, prayer partners and financial supporters. It hardly seems possible that the first quarter of 2016 has gone from us, but what a quarter of miracles it has been.

Our Mighty God continues to make his voice heard and His hand outstretched in so many ways and in so many places.

The first thing I wish to report on is a successful "Fund Raising" event at one of the malls here in Ocala. The Board Members rolled up their sleeves, cooked sausages and chicken, and we handed our gospel tracts and ministry information. Great day! Oh yes, Jamaican Gourmet sauces were served and sold.

In our last Newsletter we shared with you how that we were focused on prayer and that we were launched on a campaign to establish prayer groups at home and abroad. I offer a sincere word of thanks to those of you who have agreed to lead a group or be a part of a group. If you are willing to host a prayer group, please let us know.

Let me share with you one answer of prayer that was very, very close to home. It fact, it was at home. At the end of November Beverley and I went on a week's vacation and while we were away, she suffered a major seizure and in spite of medication continued to seize. She was hospitalized in early December and then released to a rehab facility because by this time she had lost her speaking ability and her mobility had deteriorated badly. (She was gone for seven weeks)

After two weeks of daily therapy, her condition did not improve and the institution advised me that her condition was irreversible and advised me that I should consider finding a Long Term Care facility because she had not and would not be able to stand or speak again. Without the details, all I can tell you is that, like Peter in prison and facing serious consequences from the Roman government "prayer was made of the church for her." Beverley is home, standing, walking and speaking. Glory to God. Thanks for your prayers.

Perhaps this next testimony will strike a responsive chord and you will be challenged to attempt great things for God, no matter how old you are, or how much you have failed. God is in the business of mending broken lives. We preach that to people who are not saved but we are inclined to write off a brother or sister who has made shipwreck of their spiritual lives. Jesus confronted people like that in the churches of Asia Minor and He offered them the hand of restoration.

The testimony from a listener was in response to my testimony given on the broadcast several weeks ago. I admitted to the world that I felt I had been a cast away of God, because I failed God and now I was too old and too stained. God brought to my attention several of his servants whose sinful failure derailed their lives and tarnished their witness, but they repented and returned and He graciously forgave them and recycled them.

Like some others, I felt I was just too old to get involved, and then God reminded me of Moses and Joshua and Caleb. Incidentally, we have made a CD of that message and you can obtain a copy by writing or calling the office.

While in India Sharath, his wife Shanthi, and I "Ray" went to a conference in Bangaluru. Following the conference we flew to Malaysia and then on to Cambodia.

We stayed in Cambodia for 2 weeks. We visited a church service for Cambodian youth. The church was Pastored by our van driver while in Cambodia.

We meet together with Cambodian missionaries and discussed how to reach the lost. Their lives reflected what they said.

We met with another ministry, "The Pink Ladies", and learned how they reached out to these girls and taught them a trade to support themselves.

We did some shopping and visited in Phnom Penh. We visited the Kings Palace, a museum where in the 1970's 300 million of the educated people were murdered. They had pictures of the people murdered and a memorial with 8,000 skulls in it. This was the Killing Fields. All you could do is cry.

Well, that's a short visit with me on what we did while in Cambodia.

Serving the Lord in Haiti



Tom and Josh were able to go to Haiti for two weeks in January. It was a busy time taking down all the broken and leaky gutters, cutting new heavy duty pvc pipe gutters, and installing them all back up. They also cut shields from the old gutters to help prevent heavy rain water from splashing out onto the wooden rafters (rotting them). Tom, with Josh's assistance, cleaned the existing three rainwater cisterns and 'epoxied' the oldest one in hopes of stopping the leaks! They were able to purchase a new cistern and fittings, level the new location and assemble two new double tank systems. Tom was also able to clean all TEN batteries & connections, for the truck and inverter (not an easy job, but especially necessary to get the inverter working). They replaced two rotting pieces of plywood on the porch and repainted the entire porch floor. They were also able to put pipes on all the boys bed legs to keep rats and mice from crawling up into the beds. Then they changed and painted the porch roof ridge connecting to main building, because mice and rats were running through there getting into the bedrooms, kitchen,etc. Tom and Josh were happy when the nightly 'ridge races' ended!!



















Tom also added new screws and re-screwed loose screws on the entire Shiloh Childrens Home roof! And was able to paint another 24' of the outside of SCH with a cement coating. This is a long slow process due to the lack of water. Each time he goes into the village he has to bring drinking water and often water for bathing and washing. When he has to do jobs requiring water, it has to be rationed from the available water. We are still hoping to build a cement cistern to store large amounts of rain water so we won't have to be so limited with water usage. We still have about 50' of outside wall to be coated and then the whole SCH can be painted!! Yay!!





Tom and Josh also enjoyed helping feed the boys at breakfast and supper time and playing with the boys on the porch in the afternoons. Josh was also able to take Jason on many walks around the property. They had a great time and accomplished a lot!

The most exciting news is that Dieulene is getting married in August!! We

are very happy for her! Her fiancé is a teacher/preacher and we are trying to work it out so they could live in Carabal. This may be the answer to our prayers and would be such a blessing to the community. If we can start a Christian Church and School in the village, Dieulene could continue to be in charge of the children's care and Nelson could be in charge of the spiritual and educational needs of the community! "Si Dieu vlé!"/ If GOD wills! To GOD be the GLORY!

Katie translated and helped patients select reading glasses. Katie also dresses the brides for the weddings that we do.







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



Another success story the Graduation of Dr. Tadeo Katuramu from Kampala International on June 4th and Party on June 12th.

Direct quote from Pastor Sam Kasule: "Among the Batooro, the name Katuramu is given to a boy born after the normal nine months of pregnancy. So Tadeo Katuramu the last born among four sisters and three brothers, was not only born after nine months, but never saw his father who died when Regina Nyanjara Tadeo's mother was still pregnant.

He was born in real stinking poverty. The late father left no land or any property. All his siblings went up to grade three and dropped out of school. His brothers were all hunters of small wild animals and had about ten dogs that would assist them in hunting. Sarcastically the name busoro means a place with many wild animals! Katuramu was initiated into hunting "profession" as early as at six years!



Our first Sunday in Busoro in 1993, we were scared to death by this team with their dogs, spears, nettings & bells, as they chased a helpless animal past our door as we were going to church. Tadeo was among them, he had dropped out of school in P2 and the best and only clothes he had was a torn old uniform of his former school.

It was at this time that God's love through Good Samaritan Project reached the orphaned hunter boy. He joined Hope school in the 3rd term in P3 of 1999 and lost his mother in 2009 when he was in his Senior 6. None of us knew that the former hunter, through God's mercy, love and compassion, was starting his long journey to becoming the first ever medical doctor from Hope school, his family, Busoro village and indeed Busoro sub county administrative unit. Indeed God's word in Psalms 113:7 and 1 Samuel 2:8 has come to pass.

Tadeo since he joined school has been a brilliant student and was always 1st in class at Hope save for one term when he was second and cried so hard for not leading.

Whenever we would give memory verses in the Good Samaritan Bible Fellowship like two or three verses, he would memorize the whole chapter! Such a brilliant young boy was going to rot in the village hunting and being a wasted drunkard if it was not for God's love through Good Samaritan! His two brothers up to now are hunters and drunkards. Praise be to God for Good Samaritan Project and the love of God's people that have reached and transformed many in this community. Psalms 115:1.

On 4th/June/2016, Dr. Tadeo Katuramu stood with 188 others to take the professional vows! It was great joy as Zoe and I sat among that big congregation to witness what God's love can do. On 12th June 2016, a Thanksgiving service was held in Busoro Church, with over 300 people attending and I preached from Psalms 118:1-7. After the service a grand party was held in the Hope School gardens and among the guests were twenty fellow doctors of his class.

In his speech, Dr. Tadeo Katuramu told his story from childhood, his hunting, biting poverty and confessed that the first pair of shoes in his life was from Good Samaritan Project and that since then he has never lacked anything: good clothes, school needs, fees etc. They started 320 students in his class but only 188 graduated as others dropped due to lack of tuition but he made it because of God's love, your support and prayers. Glory be to God. In my speech at the party I asked him to be a special, unique doctor with special character, service with Jesus' touch that will be "infectious" positively to his fellow doctors, nurses, midwives and the many patients he will attend to and that many will see and hear Jesus in all he does and come to the saving grace that has transformed all of us who believe.

Thank you so much all of you who have supported, sponsored and prayed for Dr. Tadeo Katuramu. May God's name be glorified for ever and ever."











THE AGONY OF WAITING ON THE LORD

A few years ago, we wrote of a young, single, white Zimbabwean lady, a trained nurse who, in 2000, left her friends and family in Harare and went to the Tonga people in obedience to the Lord's call. There in Siabuwa, she began a nursing/medical/etc ministry from her tiny caravan.

This is a small tribe in the Zambesi Valley whom the development in the Country seemed to have missed completely. The land is very dry and sandy. There's no irrigation so folks depend on rain to produce food for themselves and grass for their few animals. When there is no rain, they scratch the riverbed for water.

Electricity and telephone were things they only heard of when Vicky first went to serve her Lord in that region. There was no one of her ethnicity around; she did not speak their language nor was she familiar with their culture. Hers was the only medical 'facility' around. But the local Chief welcomed her and allowed her to park her caravan from which she attended to 200 to 400 patients daily. It also doubled up as her accommodation.

Over the years, Vicky has tried to train a few of the people so they could assist her. She also had a Sunday School for the children. All who come to her for help understand that it is Jesus Christ who, in her, is reaching out to them. In due course, she was able to arrange for Pastor Rikki from Harare to visit monthly to teach the pastors. Although churches abound, their spirituality is mixed with tribal practices and beliefs. Now over seventy-five, Rikki and his wife continue to make this eight hour trip despite the terrible roads. Dhan had the privilege of accompanying him on a few occasions. Four years ago, the pastors asked for Vicky's help in having a Missions Conference to which they invited many pastors from other villages – a first for Zim, we are told. This has been an annual feature since then.

At the beginning of the year, we visited Vicky's home Church in Harare who have always had a very significant role in this work. In a stirring report punctuated by graphic testimonies, Vicky emphasized that after fifteen years, she was only now beginning to see real change among the Tonga people............ Fifteen years!

This, in a nutshell, is Vicky's story. So why are we sharing it? Because it is the story of so many of us who serve the Lord in missions. Time and again, we labor and wonder if there are any results; whether our efforts count. We ask ourselves, "are these people benefitting from what we are doing? Are we really making disciples?"

We have been reading over the Psalms these days and looked at Ps. 126 recently where the Lord promises (vs. 5,6): "Those who sow in tears will reap with songs of joy. He who goes out weeping, carrying seed to sow, will return with songs of joy, carrying sheaves with him." That same day, we received a call from two pastors who, until recently, were part of our Chegutu group. They said, "Dhan and Dolly, we just want to say thanks for the investment you made in our lives; there is hardly a day that we do not recall and apply some of what......." We could only say "thanks" and encouraged them from 2 Tim. 2:2 – "The things you have heard me say in the presence of many witnesses entrust to reliable men who will also be qualified to teach others."

The Lord spoke to us, we responded in faith and that is why we are here. Though we stuttered at times, we have never really doubted His call upon our lives nor the validity of what He called us to do. We know only too well that "the race is not for the swift". Our task is not to judge the work by the appearance of visible, tangible results. On our part, faithfulness is really the only true test of success. So before His face, we must strive daily to be faithful.

We are very grateful that, whilst many of you readers have been faithful in praying and giving sacrificially, you have not demanded of us that we produce "hard" evidence of the success of our mission. We know it's tough not to do so. But even more tough is trying to put God in a box and to demand of us what we cannot of Him. Instead, you join us in waiting for the appearance of fruit in due season, and we deeply appreciate that.

But most of all, though, we give praise to our Lord whose work this is, for calling us and being able to serve Him in this way. Indeed, we are so very blessed. Thanks be to God for His abundant blessings!!

In April we gave God thanks as we marked 30 years as full-time missionaries and this month we give God thanks for seeing us through 8 years of ministry here in Zimbabwe. We thank God for all of you who have partnered with us over the years, some of you all of the 30 years! May God richly bless you for your faithfulness to His call.

If you are anything like me, being still is often a challenge in our busy, rat-race lifestyle. In fact, Pam and I fondly remember the slower pace of life as one of our favorite experiences living in Kenya. A slower pace of life is not at all equivalent to laziness, on the contrary, my Kenyan friends work very hard, yet they are not pressured to keep strict schedules. As I look over my planner, most of my days have several, if not many, appointments to keep and deadlines to meet. In fact, I honestly do not know how I would function without recording my commitments and referencing my planner throughout the day to be sure I get where I am supposed to be on time. In Kenya, I often hear, "you have watches, but we have time." As I reflect upon our culture as it relates to time, some of the thoughts and sayings that come to mind include, I don't have time...don't waste my time...time flies...I'm against the clock...make time to do it...time is money...etc. One lesson I learned from the experience of of living in Kenya is that life is full and meaningful without constantly looking at a planner, and I must be intentional in "making time" to reflect, to meditate, and to be still and know that He is God. I wonder how often God is speaking, yet I am too busy, too hurried, or over-committed to keeping appointments to hear Him.

One reflection I have pondered lately is that when I was preparing to move to Kenya, God gave me a vision of African children singing praises to Him in a language I could not understand. When Pam and I finally moved to Kenya, I recalled that vision often as I had the privilege of worshiping with Kenyan children and seeing how they poured out their praise and thanksgiving to the Lord in song. One of the favored experiences of mission team participants is to witness this firsthand as the children of The Haven sing and dance in unfettered worship to the Lord. Though their worship is unrehearsed and free flowing from the heart, you can get a taste of their singing and dancing by way of social media. The children of The Haven and Fresh Start Homes, a.k.a. The GFE Children's Home, have a few music videos on YouTub.



Two weeks before I was to leave India, Sharath (the Pastor I work with), his wife Shanthi and I took a special trip to Cambodia from India. We had to take a flight from India to Malaysia, and then from there to Cambodia. We landed in Phnom Penh, a large Cambodia city.

Sharath and Shanthi stayed with some missionaries that had been to India in the past from the USA, Roger and Sarah, and I stayed at a motel named the Green Pastures Inn.

Roger and Sarah had been working there for about 4 months and were very helpful introducing us to local missionaries. We met with them and found out how to reach the people of Cambodia with the gospel.

The Cambodian leaders in the 1970's murdered all of the people that had an education, about 10 Million people in all. We visited a memorial for those who were murdered that had a shrine with 8,000 skulls in it.

We took a bus all day to get to go a large city named Siem Reap, we were met by a Pastor of a orphanage who also was a van driver for us. He had a church full of orphaned children. We had church with them and Pastor Sharath taught a simple message on being born again. Many of the children responded to the message.

While in Siem Reap we visited the largest temple in the WORLD, ancient Angkor. It was so large that you had to walk up an entrance 500 meters long. The walls were covered with stone carving of what life was like during the time. The town was filled with temples so we stopped at one other and went on.

Our two weeks were filled with activity. The people there didn't seem to hold on too any hard feelings for the past. We came back to India.

He shared some very encouraging things about the Westbrooks family and their ministry to the church. Steve teaches the adult Sunday school class (about 30 in attendance) before church services.

Danny spent Monday at the home they are renting that was built in the late 1890's, and they had a chance to talk for several hours about what the Lord is doing through the Westbrooks family. He was most encouraged finding out that God has granted Steve favor with many Muslims. On the way to his home on Monday, Steve had to stop and give a Muslim friend a tract about Jesus. His friend was leaving for a trip off island and Steve wanted to give him Jesus reading material for the flight.

Steve's outreach extends to teaching young Muslim boys and girls about Jesus on Saturday after-

noons at a public park as well as in private schools. Steve and his children come to the park and roundup all the children that are there and play games. In the middle of the games they take a break and Steve does a Bible lesson. He shared with Danny the first time he taught the Muslim boys. The mothers of the boys were all sitting together wearing burkas staring at Steve. It was intimidating and rewarding all at the same time. Praise the Lord. That has turned into a regular meeting every Saturday morning.





On Tuesday, Danny went with Steve to see his ministry to 3-4 year olds at Georges Christian Academy. The children went wild when they saw Steve. His method of teaching is very positive. He tells a Bible Story using picture cards. After the story, he plays a game with them. He asks a question about the Bible story he just shared and whoever can answer the questions gets to participate in the game. It is a very effective method of teaching. After the Bible lesson, they went to McDonalds for coffee and he shared the Gospel with the woman that took our order. Gave her a tract and told her that Jesus was the way.

They ended the day with Steve and his children sharing another Bible Story at a nursing home for physically & mentally challenged adults.

Because they are living in St. Croix, most people believe that life is easy and fun. Danny came away with a new understanding of the sacrifice that our missionaries make in serving the Lord. He believes that the Lord is using the Westbrooks family to reach people that are overlooked (Children of all ages, Handicap Adults and the Muslim community). Steve has a special gift from the Lord to teach those people. We fully support what the Westbrooks family are doing and ask that you consider supporting them as well.







Thank you so much for your prayers and encouragement! This morning we returned to the Renault Sunday School program and it went very well. The entire road was lined with people on both sides welcoming us back into the area. The children surrounded our vehicles and sang as we drove into the yard. We thank the Lord for His care and direction and pray that He will continue to lead as we are definitely out of space in the existing location.

Many people came and visited us at the Camp and encouraged us, including this group of 19 teen aged boys who came in the pouring rain and were completely soaked. Deb squeezed all 19 into the Toyota and gave them a ride part way home.

Katie was very excited to be back in Sunday school and it was great to have the Yordy's with us again also.

This lady walked all the way out to see us at the camp last week and explained how she has seven children. Six of them attend Renault Sunday school (the older boys aren't in the picture). She told us that when they get their six small bags of rice each Sunday, they save it and use only one bag per day. Even though, they only each get a few spoonfuls of food, they at least eat something each day.

This lady brought her baby into our yard this week with a big smile and thank you! She was brought to us, when we had the large Missouri medical team here in late Feb. She and her baby both were on death's doorstep. They both hadn't been eating and were so weak they couldn't move. The medical team cared for them, and then we took the lady to her little hut and showed her neighbors how to feed her and her baby. It was really encouraging this week to see both of them doing so well, and thankful that kind people from Missouri had cared enough for them to save their lives.

We are doing well and were so thankful to find the camp well cared for and in great shape when we returned from Canada. Thanks again especially for your prayers about the Sunday school.

The Pastor of the church then asked Harvest if we could find a home for the supplies and we are happy to report that a new hospital in Sierra Leone, Africa will now be blessed with it. We were able to load twenty pallets of medical supplies and a car.

Our missionary, Tom Schmidt, was in country and spent the week driving Danny all over Haiti. House of Hope Ukraine



The newsletter below was written by Viktor Migo. Viktor was Lela's driver, guide, protector and friend for many years while she lived in Ukraine. He is proficient in Ukrainian and Russian and speaks English quite well. He sent an update on what is going on through House of Hope and we left it in his words. Please realize that without Viktor and House of Hope, many of the activities the orphanage children enjoy would not happen. Working in the orphanage gives the children a chance to see Jesus in action and allows Viktor to get to know the children in order to choose the best candidates for House of Hope upon the end of the orphanage years.

Good afternoon. I want to tell you about Harvest organization in Ukraine.

Orphanage # 5

We help children to buy new shoes and clothes, create celebrations and little festivals, buy products for the celebrations. We organize excursions, trips. Children participate in various activities outside of the orphanage. We organize hiking with tents for 2-4 days, we cook food on a fire (we buy products for children and provide transport for children) and we have fishing. We call this Camp "Victory" (Orphanage 5). We help with minor repairs in orphanage, plumbing works, we buy cleaning supplies and medicines. We buy clothes for the summer(hats, shoes, T-shirts). We buy bed linen, sports equipment(balls, rackets, hula-hoops), medical supplies. Also we buy ice cream, tea, cookies and products on little holidays.

House of Hope

Every weekend I take 3-5 children from Orphanage 5 to House of Hope, they have the opportunity to talk with students from House of Hope. They go to church on Sundays, ride bikes, play mind games, play computer. I take the children back to the orphanage on Monday morning. I also continue to build houses for graduates House of Hope. Pasha and Tanya already live in a new house. Dima and Yana, they can move in their house but we need to buy only furniture and that's all. For Alex and Bogdana we need establish sanitary ware, paint the walls, buy furniture and they will be able move into a new house. Maxim began his study in Christian college and he lives there with other students now.







God is good all the time! This has been a great summer in Romania. As the Lord worked in the hearts of so many children, and is continuing to work in the hearts and lives there. The first camp was awesome with the team from Rich Fork Baptist church. This camp was for the children from Hospice, it was unique in so many ways. To watch these children, play and worship all week long with the struggles that are going on in their lives is amazing. It was a challenging camp this year, nothing bad just little things kept popping up sickness and runny noses, and oh oh's, but God had it all in control. We give God the glory! I want to Thank everyone who had a part in making this a great and awesome week for these special children.







The next camp for the summer was with the children from Dumbrava, this was our second year with these children. We had a team come from First Baptist Ocala to lead this camp, and we had three cooks come from Thomasville NC to cook for the camp. Words cannot describe what these two groups did. It was amazing as they worked with these children all week long. The energy and excitement that was put forth to make this a very special camp for these children. I want to thank Dani and Lavi for allowing us the opportunity to work these very special children, as these children are gypsy, and most of them don't have the opportunity to go to camps. Dani and Lavi are doing a wonderful work there in Dumbrava working there at the center for the children in that village.









We ended up the summer with a Handbell workshop with the children, youth and young adults from Beth Adoni church.

I want to once again say Thank you to everyone who had a part this summer in the camps, I pray that the Lord will continue to use you and bless you in your journey of serving Him. I want to say a special Thank you to Harvest International for their support and hard work for making all of this possible. Pray for Romania, for all of their young people and leaders, who are there on the front lines, leading out and pouring their hearts and lives into these children. Thank you Lord for your Grace and Mercies which are new and fresh each Morning!






ANOTHER SUCCESS STORY

Earlier this year, we quietly celebrated thirty years of ministry with praise and thanksgiving to our Lord for the privilege of serving Him these past years, for leading and keeping us, and for all He has taught and continues to teach us in our journey with Him.

Undoubtedly, despite the many challenges, this has been the highlight of our lives as we grow in our relationship with our loving, Heavenly Father.

We are as convinced now as we were in 2008 this is where God wants us to be right now. As we grow older, there is an added sense of urgency to share Christ, to make Him known, and to help prepare believers in this land for this mission. So we continue to work with the leadership of different assemblies, as well as individuals and other groups, in spiritual growth (discipleship) - knowing the Lord and taking the Gospel out.

We are ever deeply grateful to our Lord and to all of you who have been a part of this process. Some of you have been partnering with us throughout these thirty years and we celebrate you and your faithfulness. Others of you later came on board and have been no less faithful. You all have been a very special blessing from our Lord to us. You have been more than supporters – you have become our dear friends. We thank God for your friendship, prayers, encouragement and financial support without which we certainly could not remain on the field. We pray that our journey with the Lord has been a growing experience for you as well.

Hurricane Matthew RELIEF EFFORTS



Buckets of Love for Haiti Update

December 7, 2016

On November 7th we sent the first container of Hurricane Matthew relief supplies to Rod & Debbie Wray. The container was filed with 250,000 meals and 358 "Buckets of Love" for the people in and around Les Cayes which received the worse of damage from the Hurricane.

The container arrived in Port-au-Prince, Haiti on November 23rd, but could not be delivered because of the violence that many of the relief containers have experienced. Gangs have attacked the containers and drivers have been threatened to not come back. Rod appealed to the UN for an armed patrol to escort the container to them.

On December 4th I received an email from Rod and the following is what he shared with me.

"Hi Danny. We are thankful for the Lord's direction regarding the arrival of the container. This morning at 5:30 am the container arrived in the yard. By 6:00 am we were unloading and it was great to have the help of the 11 man team. At 7:40 am the container was empty.

We quickly loaded the red truck and headed to Renault. At Sunday school we gave out some samples of the new food that you sent, so we will have reports back by next week.

When we got back to the camp we did a big distribution for the local community. Every family got a box of lentil mix, a bag of rice / bean mix and a bucket. **They especially loved the buckets.** We have just a few remaining, (it was a pretty big distribution). " - Rod Wray

At this time we are working on sending a second container. I have another 215,000 meals and 300 more buckets to send.

Once again thank you for being a part of this successful evening.


















Joy To The World!! Good News!! Good News!!

A Joyful Christmas, and a very Happy & Prosperous New Year to All!

A recent visit by Elaine (with three (3) others) to a local Elementary and Junior High-School resulted in much blessings and salvations. She goes into local schools to speak on the dangers of early sexual activity; and to encourage the students to "Wait & Win."

When she initially contacted the Principal and explained her purpose, he asked her to speak with the entire Grades 6, 8 & 9: a total of 14 classes. These were covered over two days when each did two sessions. With an average of 35 - 40 in each class, this means that about 500 students heard the abstinence message, together with a clear gospel presentation. Of those hearing the dual message of the dangers of early sexual activity, and of the power of Christ to save and help them to wait until marriage 237 children, and one teacher, prayed to receive Christ as their Saviour.

- for the opportunities we still have in Jamaica to present the Christian message in our schools;
- for open hearts among the children to receive us and the message;

- help in the follow-up process, to lead these kids to maturity in their faith;

- for one child, who spoke with Elaine afterwards, about the physical condition of the house her family lives in. Elaine, and persons from her church, has since visited and are trying to aid them;
- for the family of Lloyd's cousin, as they mourn the passing of their father. His funeral was on the 10th in Kingston;
- for Lloyd's students at Regent College as they take their end-of-term exams between the 12-16th.of the month;
- for Elaine and I as we travel to Miami after Christmas for the wedding of our first daughter on the 30th.





Betty and Daniel continue to minister in India. As the Christmas season approaches they prepare to open the church to women and children that are not allowed to celebrate Christ's birth at home. Many believers in India are married to Hindus and they must be circumspect in their celebrations. The church will provide a worship and prayer time followed by a celebratory meal.

To make matters more difficult, the government has instituted a plan to replace the traditional 1,000 and 500 rupee notes with new bills. Long lines to exchange the bills for the new redesigned 500 and 2000 rupee bills has led to poor people having to choose between working to earn money for that day's food or losing the funds they already have. The supply of new bills is much smaller than the demand and there are restrictions on how much cash can be withdrawn from bank accounts or exchanged at one time.

Please pray for the believers in India as they celebrate Christ in these troubled times.







Ray Nelson has been serving in India since September and it has been an exciting time for him. He has been assisting Pastor Sharath, his host, with pastor conferences to help educate and equip the native pastors in their ministry. He has been part of several weddings which are very important events in India. They have been ministering to the churches that Sharath pastors and traveling to meet the needs of the flock.

In November he was the lead speaker for a series about "Good News for the Poor". They meet with groups in homes on an almost daily basis in order to encourage and strengthen the brethren in a country that is sometimes hostile and always difficult.

Please pray for him as Christmas approaches and he continues to share Christ and the "reason for the season".

















Tom spent two weeks with the Shiloh Children's Home boys. The road in was in such bad shape he left the truck six miles from the home, just off the main road. We have been praying this whole year about selling our truck and trying to raise money to provide a means for water to care for the boys. Each time we have driven in to SCH we have had to spend hundreds of dollars on the truck. Our last trip cost us \$800. We found a man that would buy the truck and even wanted to help us even though the truck is almost 20 years old.

Our home manager has been working around the clock because of the boys all having colds and the staff staying home because of being very ill. We have had a proposal by our home manager, Dieulene, and her husband. Nelson and Dieulene, newlyweds, wanted us to consider moving the children to Hinche. The most important changes this move would make are: easier access for teams, better access to medical care, water, food, electricity (that we don't have now) water for bathing, and good drinking water. We would also be able to hire staff that have a great church background and even take the boys to church. We don't plan on replacing the truck, but will fly to the town of Pignon which is only one hour from Hinche by motorcycle. This will make our costs less by not having the truck to maintain, upkeep, and operate.

We do feel this is best for our boys and would also open a possibility to care for more children. Caleb has been doing well with less meds and has become more attentive. Jason is very independent and walks around always looking for something to get into. He loves to eat and is about the same developmentally. Maurice is still the happiest boy, always smiling and making sure Jason doesn't take his toys from him. He flops around the room on knees to feet and also rolls to get around. He will play with wheels on wheelchairs, pull himself up on all the crib/beds and wants to make sure you notice he did it. He has a great mind and can solve toy games. I bring in shapes and pegs and he tries to say words. He knows all of staff by name and when you say their names he points to them. And of course he knows the other boys' names as well. Our family feels he will continue to improve and the sky's the limit with God's help and our prayers.

Thank you for your help caring for these boys and know it has made a great difference in these boys care. Pray that we will be able to move the boys into Hinche by the end of January. Caring for them will be much improved because of the availability of electricity, water, diapers, food supplies and Godly staff. We are very thankful to Duielene and Nelson for their love for God and care for the children.

Merry Christmas! Thanks so much for your care and encouragement these past two months. We are going to try to show some of the transformation that has happened at Camp Mahanaim since hurricane Matthew struck just over two months ago. We are so thankful for your help and support as you have stood with us to make this recovery possible.













With the help of a team of 11 men we installed wire cages in the river and filled them with rocks. We are rebuilding the protective wall along the river on these rock cages. The river wall is 7 to 8 feet tall and is made of rocks cemented together. We have already brought in more than 110 truck loads of rocks.

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We are really thankful for the help and care from so many people in the village. They have been a huge encouragement and support to us. Thanks also to the team at Harvest International who have helped us greatly, including sending containers of food and supplies. We have been able to carry out distributions every couple weeks for the people who live near us.



Please continue to pray for us that God would direct us regarding the Renault Sunday school. This past Sunday we had more than 1,500 children. They really want to learn and are very well behaved, but we just don't have enough space in the existing building and hardly in the yard.

It's great to have our son Tim home for Christmas with us.
