### Celebrating Jeanne Maryse as the 1st annual Haitian Center for Inclusive Education's student of the Year



Maryse was born one year before the devastating Earthquake in Portau-Prince . Orphaned and born with physical disabilities, her future was bleak, but she was taken into Notre Maison, an inclusive children's home, by Gertrude Bien Amie at the age of four. When she arrived she could not walk due to the deformity of her feet, but Bien Amie made sure she had the surgery needed to repair her feet soon

after her arrival.

Maryse was determined to not only learn to walk but to become the best dancer at the new inclusive school that she began to attend in 2017. Prior to that she was educated at the orphanage as children with disabilities rarely have the opportunity to attend school. Despite the challenges she has had to face at such a young age, Maryse continues to approach her life as if there were no barriers.

Maryse is an inspiration for all her classmates and teachers. She is vivacious and has a cando attitude despite her physical and learning challenges. She speaks up in class proudly when called upon and shares her knowledge and spirit with visiting teachers. She absolutely is a leader for the other children in her academics and school activities celebrating her customs and celebrations. She sings and dances and approaches any activity in the school with a creative, skilled, and inclusive spirit. Even despite her ability to safely attend school during the past violence in Haiti, Maryse is determined that school and her peers succeed with joy in their hearts. She is an inspiration not only for all her peers at the orphanage but an example as well at her school that with the right support and guidance she can transcend her circumstances and continue to succeed in her endeavors.



After eight years at Notre Maison orphanage and having limited opportunities for adoption due to the environmental and political difficulties that plague Haiti, Maryse has grown and blossomed into a remarkable young woman and has become a leader and mentor. She has become a surrogate teacher and role model to the younger children both on an emotional and academic manner. She spends countless hours supporting Gertrude's mission in offering an inclusive

education for all children and exemplifies the power of perseverance and the power of the human spirit. She is my hero.
