

A Traditional Shona Wedding



The Bride

One of the highlights of the past few months, was an invitation by a Shona family to attend their daughter's "Kuroora" or traditional/customary marriage. This is a ceremony where the bride price is agreed upon. Once agreement has been reached by the two families, and the bride price commonly called "lobola" has been paid to the bride's parents, the couple is considered married, and the husband can take away his bride.

Young Christian couples do the traditional marriage followed by a Church ceremony. Many brides like the pomp and ceremony of a Church wedding (or "white wedding" as it is called here). This is particularly so among the growing middle-class. And so, once the traditional wedding ceremony is over, they begin to prepare for their "white wedding", after which the bride leaves home with the groom.

The "Kuroora" is a big family occasion, attended by the bride's grandparents, parents, uncles, aunties, siblings etc. One of the bride's aunt's negotiates on behalf of the bride's family." The groom's family does not attend. The prospective bridegroom

is represented by some male family members acting as negotiators or emissaries who negotiate the bride price on his behalf. The bride has no direct role in this. She comes to the ceremony at the request of the elders/ uncles who ask her whether she knows the person who seeks her hand in marriage (apparently avoiding a Leah/Rachel situation) after which she sits among the women until the proceedings are over.


Since "there is no rush in Africa", this ceremony lasted three hours at the end of which a sumptuous meal was served. The whole affair was very formal, respectful and orderly, yet there was humor and at the appropriate times, unlating - a traditional sound made with the tongue, sometimes with the assistance of a hand, in the case of less adept 'performers'. The bridegroom was brought into the room towards the end of the proceedings.

Many people look down on traditional marriages and, in particular, struggle over the issue of a bride price. But some young ladies with whom I discussed this say they are worth a lot more than a prospective husband can pay for them; that they see the bride price as a token - one which expresses thankfulness to her parents for having raised their daughter who is now to become his bride.

As we sat through the ceremony, I could see a lot of the Old Testament* being lived out before my very eyes. The groom's emissaries reminded me of Abraham's servant Eliezer who was sent to look for a bride for Isaac, loaded with gifts. The emissaries also came loaded with gifts which were given to the bride's mother and others at the end of the ceremony, and like Eliezer, the emissaries did not eat or drink until the agreement was sealed.

Two thousand years ago, a hefty "bride price" was paid at Golgotha by a man from Nazareth named Jesus. Nothing but his very life would suffice, he was told by his Father. So Jesus struggled a great deal in a garden called Gethsemane and finally yielded to his Father's will saying, "Nevertheless not my will but yours be done." The rest is "His Story" which can be read throughout the pages of the Scriptures.

May all of us who go by His name, His bride the Church, ponder afresh this Easter season. May He also bless us with a growing understanding and wonder at our death with Him and our resurrection in Him, as we look with great anticipation of His return to claim us! That's why He said, "I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again, and receive you unto myself; that where I am, there ye may be also."





Life in the Haven has become more interesting in recent months due to an influx of boys from Kambiri who are temporarily residing in the Jua Kali home. A sister orphanage located in a village near Kakamega town, came into such a state of disrepair that it became necessary to relocate the boys until repairs can be made. So, the children and caregivers of The Haven and Fresh Start homes are practicing hospitality as these boys temporarily reside in the Haven. The children, who have so little themselves, generously open their home to meet the needs of the boys of Kambiri.

Hospitality is a cherished value of the people of Kenya, where visitors are considered a blessing from God. Over the past seven years Pam and I have had the privilege of leading nine mission teams to visit the GFE Home in Jua Kali. We are always amazed by the degree of welcome and hospitality we receive. On each visit I experience afresh the authentic Christian hospitality offered by our Kenyan friends, and I enjoy seeing my fellow travelers experience the same.

This month marks the tenth anniversary of the Haven. Pam and I are planning a trip in July with more than twenty people, our largest mission team to date. We look forward to celebrating the anniversary together. Please pray for the residents of the GFE Home as they continue to host the boys of Kambiri and as they anticipate our visit in July.

On September 3, 2014 I left Ocala, Florida and flew to Rajhumundry, India. Pastor Sharath is the Indian pastor that I planned to visit and minister with during my stay.

Sharath immediately put me to work by introducing me to his home church. I came to know these people well because the church in India meets primarily in homes in addition to traditional services. People will gather to celebrate in the Lord because of a happy event or to console one another in the loss of a loved one. People also would invite Hindus for a friendly home meeting in the knowledge that they were more likely to come to that than a church service. The baptism of a new believer was held in the local river but then moved to a home to celebrate the new life in the Lord. We were also invited to home meetings by people outside the home church who had an interest in the message we had to share and wanted to reach out to us.

Weddings in India are a far more formal and community wide event than those in the US. Preparations last for days in order to feed the huge crowd that can be expected to gather. Everyone dresses in their finest clothes and the bride is arrayed in the most stunning dress the family can afford. The event has been preceded by visits between the families and everyone in the community is expected and expects to attend the event.

The church in India has some different customs from what we are accustomed to. Men and women are separated in church. Men and boys are seated on one side and women are seated on the other. Christmas is not celebrated as a national holiday in India and is not even the most important Christian holiday. A small celebration may be held in the church with a few decorations but gift giving and all the excess that characterizes American Christmas is not present.

While I was there three different missionary groups visited the area. The first group of eight visitors hosted a women's conference followed by a men's meeting. The second visitor was Reverend Ron who came and blessed the commencement of construction for a new church. The cornerstones were laid and I received the honor on being part of that ceremony. We also held several pastor's conference in order to help train the pastors and leaders of the Indian church.

Reverend Ron, Sharath and myself joined together in a trip to the Leper colony. The government of India provides some assistance to the lepers in order to encourage them to live in specified areas. We shared the gospel with these people and then served them a meal. Sharing a meal in India has more significance than here. It demonstrates a love and companionship that many don't receive either because of caste or illness. It is a tangible demonstration that we are brothers in Christ and will not be separated by these things in heaven. This was one of the events that touched my heart and rendered me speechless before the Lord.

Thank you, each and every one, for helping me to make this journey and follow the prompting of the Lord which told me that I had to return to His India in September 2015.

It was a blessed time for all who attended the conference and a great outreach to a larger than expected crowd coming out to see the Jesus Film!

We praise the Lord for all who helped, through donations and prayer, making our first Evangelistic Outreach to the community so successful!

We are looking forward to the Geological Survey, which will tell us if there is water in the area. This will be scheduled for April or May, Lord willing! Many thanks to the generous donations that have totally covered this expense! Please pray they will find water near SCH! This will be a huge blessing not only to SCH, but to the community as well!



Charlie's Champions GONAIVES FEEDING PROGRAM

Since the creation of Charlie's Champion Ministry in 2003, it has been a very big struggle to feed the children everyday, even once or twice a day. After many days, months and years of prayers, God finally answered our prayers requests by granting us since November 2009, 50 boxes of a nutritional food each month.

From November 2009 to June 2015, this meal is a very big blessing for the kids. We realize that: all the children who are eating this nutritive meals are stronger than before, they are anemia free (very important for us). They are well developed physically, intellectually and socially. It prevents the kids from starvation more than ever.

The 50 boxes that we receive each month to take care of the kids in Charlie's Champion represents such a blessing so if we do not receive it anymore, we will be very close to starvation or famine. We only need charcoal/water/oil to cook these complete meals. We receive 50 boxes from Harvest International VIA Camate St Michel. We pay a transportation fee of \$300 HT to get them.

We feed 110 students in Modelle and 40 kids in Charlie's Champion. In total: 150 kids. This food allows us to feed the kids in Modelle three times a week. We feed the kids in the orphanage three times a day. Finally, we consider this important source of nutrition like a blessing. The only term that we can describe this food is a MIRACLE FOOD.

Not just a busy day but beginning of the month as we try to honor all the invitations in different locations for doing different celebrations for children.

This year I had the honor and the privilege to be in two different villages in the same day and see the joy in the children's eyes that we got to interact with. In the morning we had a special program for the gypsies in Dumbrava, it was the first time we did this, so they were very excited to participate in all the games we brought for them and also to receive balloons at the end. Let's not forget the ice cream because we cannot have a celebration for children without ice cream.

In the afternoon we did a big celebration for the children in Ceica. I was very blessed and happy to work and make all this possible with the help of the entire church. Parents, youth and even the older people got involved and made this day extra special for the children. We had many children from the village that had never been to church before that attend the program, and they all loved it. The children got to do their own smores...I know it doesn't sound special, but it was, because it was their first one. They also made their own pizza and at the end when they ate it they said it was the best pizza they ever had. 

We were encouraged to see that the spiritual values and legacy left to us, the 7 siblings, by our parents were respected, continued and passed on to our children and their children after them. Great contrasts characterize the Republic of Zimbabwe in southern Africa. These are immediately obvious to the visitor, especially in its flora and fauna. The latter includes multiple species of apes, deer, reptiles, birds, fresh-water fish; as well as lions, hippos, leopards, elephants, rhinoceros, giraffes, zebra, and so the list goes on. In fact, much of the tourism industry is centered around its wildlife.

But equally attractive, in fact stunning, is the vast variety of flowering shrubs and trees. It seems that there is always some kind of plant in bloom for there is always something coloring the landscape – whether along the highways, in the cities, shopping or residential areas. Many streets are actually lined with particular types of trees, which will in due course shed their petals to carpet the roadway beneath – a sight to behold!

Although there are officially two seasons – the rainy and the dry – there is, in fact, a winter from May through August when night-time temperatures can fall as low as freezing. So, there are summer flowers and winter blooms, colors befitting the wet months and the dry months too. We have the purple jaracanda, the red, pink or white varieties of the poinsettia, the white of the snow-on-the-mountain, the reddish purple/pink/ white of the bauhinia, the yellow of the cassia, plus numerous wildflowers, etc, etc. And as if to bid farewell to the winter, the young leaves of the msasa will appear in all their glory – reds, pinks, rusts, yellows - all merging into one another in a wild and breath-taking, panoramic display. No, there's never a dull moment for the flora here. One country, yet such rich variety!

Diversity in the midst of unity. Perhaps nowhere else is diversity so richly demonstrated as in the Church. There are big believers and there are small ones, tall ones and short ones too; some are black others are white, still others are a variety of colors in between. God has given to some great wealth; others, He is teaching contentment with little. Some are known internationally, and there are others who are hardly known save in the relatively small areas where they serve. To some, God has entrusted great responsibility; to others, He has not done so. In the matter of gifts and abilities, He has greatly endowed multitudes. But many are there who are not, or whose gifts and abilities keep them strictly backstage, away from public view – like some parts of the body.


We see this variety among the people we work with in this Country. We appreciate the diversity which they exhibit. However, one thing we do pray for is that each would have a growing desire for the Lord, to make Him their undisputed Lord and to follow in His steps. In this, we find unity in diversity.

We also see and appreciate your diversity in the body of Christ. As you pray for the work of missions, and for those of us with whom you are particularly familiar, one may wonder what your cumulative prayers sound like to the Father's ears! Yes, we are assured the Lord hears and answers your prayers, made in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ, in your own individual way, according to your own vocabulary and style of speaking (and praying), with your own God-given vision, burden and passion.

You may never know how deep a need was met, how encouraging was your communication, or how meaningful and effective was your spontaneous but unsolicited prayer on our behalf for a need that you didn't even know about, but the Lord did. We believe we can speak on behalf of all of us on the field in saying how much we appreciate that there is this intentional and rich diversity in the body of Christ and, particularly, among all of you who make such a vital contribution to the Master's work of Missions – each doing his/her part, as the Lord prompts us, for the advancement of His kingdom and the glory of His Name. Jesus says to each of us, "Follow me". Following Him is a high calling and privilege. May our Father continue to bless you who color the landscape of His kingdom with your diversity in so many ways, and as you labor for Him in singleness of heart and with a unity of purpose, "with one mind for the faith of the gospel." Pam and I, and 16 others, are looking forward to seeing the children and caregivers of the Haven and Fresh Start homes in July. Our team is comprised of teachers, tutors, college students, a high school student, a veterinarian, an engineer, a physical therapist, a counselor, a plant supervisor, a fashion retailer, a customs broker, and a clinic coordinator. We all have identities closely aligned with our jobs and professions here in the U.S., but in Kenya what we do is not so important as who we are. Our Kenyan friends have a way of reminding us of the more important things in life...and our careers are not high on the list. Of course, we will exercise our gifts and talents as we minister to the children and others, yet we will experience stark reminders of the importance of loving and being loved.

The children, caregivers, and all of the mission team members covet your prayers as we come together – reuniting old friends and making new friends. 
One such opportunity is in the ministry of Guyana Mission Outreach Program and Wesleyan Bible Camp. This ministry in Guyana reaches out to youth and adults through Bible Camps, Bible Conferences and practical ministries of life skills and basic economic development. The mission is currently undertaking the challenge of providing electricity to the camp site where men and women and boys and girls are ministered to. Some of you have been praying about a practical mission to which you can lend support. This may be just such an opportunity.

President of the program, Albert Bruce, explains the project and the need below.

Al Bruce writes:

The main phases of the Electrification Project are as follows:

- 1. Connection to the National Grid by Guyana Power and Light that will bring power from the Linden Highway to our power station with established poles. GPL will complete this phase.
- 2. Construction of an underground grid to take power to every building on the current campsite with future considerations also planned and connections for them.
- 3. Connections of power lines from the grid to all currently existing buildings.
- 4. Wiring of existing buildings as required. There is a five year development plan available to any who requests it. The current aspect of the electrification program is estimated to be \$40,000.00. (US)





Indian culture stems from Hinduism, the largest cult represented by 80% of 1.2 billion people. The second cult in India, at around 10%, is Islam. Christianity is said to be 2%.

There is a Hindu temple every 50 feet or so, at least it seems like that.

Ministering to Hindus is the biggest job we have in India. How we reach out to them is through home meetings. We have home meetings for various reasons, Praise the Lord meeting, the Lord has blessed our house in some way meeting, we need Him to bless our house in some way meeting, someone dies meeting, the list goes on and on.

When a Hindu accepts Jesus as their Lord and Savior and is baptized it's a big thing. He or she can accept Christ as one of their 300,000 gods, but to be baptized is the public way to accept Him. When a Hindu accepts Christ Jesus as their Lord and Savior and is baptized he or she may become the outcast of the family and/or community.

We have several different ways of meeting people. One is by other missionaries coming in and their agendas. They usually have different types of church meetings that we can reach the lost. They'll have large home meetings to reach people, or they will have meetings in our home church to reach out to people.

Sharath's brothers will have meetings that we can use to reach people. Our home Church with large meetings every Sunday reaches visitors. There is an orphanage on site with around 20 boys and girls. There is a school with around 30 students training for ministry. There's usually something to do every day somewhere to keep us busy and we love it.

We are Praising the LORD, our long awaited water survey test was done in May! What an exciting time! They spent 2 1/2 days checking for water everywhere within a 4-5 mile radius from Shiloh Children's Home. They checked wells and springs to determine where the water comes from and how reliable a source it is. Many of the nearer wells (w/in a mile or 2) have run dry this year which has caused a great deal of extra hardship for the local people as well as our own staff. The three surveyors even checked rock formations for any potential of water. Most of their time, however, was spent putting these electrodes in the ground and in the air above the ground (under tents @ 1/2 - 1km away). They had sensors that would record timed electrical impulses sent simultaneously to the ground & air which graphed out a picture that must be interpreted by computer to determine whether water is to be found in that area at all. It was quite an interesting process that brought many onlookers young and old, all offering their 'expert' advice! Now we wait for the results, which will take another few weeks. We continue to pray for the possibility of a well in this area; that would bless so many.

Rainy season started the beginning of MAY which is a blessing as it fills the cisterns; but also adds the complication of slip-pery roads and therefore harder travels in the remote areas. But the SCH children are doing well and our new porch is such a blessing! They can be outside rain or shine and enjoy it so much! Jason loves to walk out there all by himself and Maurice can now travel on his own 2 knees! His legs are not strong enough for him to walk as yet, but he is able to 'walk' on his knees which gives him much pleasure! Caleb also loves to be on the porch when he can be brought out.

I recently found an especially fun activity for Jason and Maurice. The LORD gave me the idea to take both boys for a ride in the SCH truck. Maurice was enthralled and watched all my movements. It wasn't long before he was reaching over to help me steer and shift; giggling all the time! Jason had a grin from ear to ear and was very happy. Both boys thought the horn honking was the funniest thing they'd ever heard! Such a small thing to bring so much delight to two little boys. This will definitely become a coveted prize at SCH. And we'll see if Caleb will be able to enjoy this as well, next time.



The girls were very disappointed as we all are, but we will try again some other time.

Rather than leaving early and boarding a plane for the U.S., the girls returned for practice. We had a good time together. After practice, we headed to town and had some fun together at the market.

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
Charlie's Champions Needs Your Help

Charlie's Champions is an orphanage in Gonaives, Haiti and was started in 2004 after Hurricane Jeanne destroyed most of the city. Many children were left on the streets with no family or home to go to. Pastor Charlenour Dieudonne took it upon himself to open an orphanage where these children could have a home, food, clothing and an education.

Having enough money to meet the needs of these children has always been a challenge. With the money that Charlie receives from supporters he buys food, clothes, medicine and whatever else the children may need. This isn't even accounting for education expenses which aren't cheap.

In recent years the support has gone from being just enough to more recently falling woefully short of their need. Last month they received \$200 for the monthly support. Imagine caring for 35 children and your family on \$200. Charlie is currently not able to put the children in school as a result of the loss of support. Charlie started a peanut butter business a few years ago that was maintained by the orphans to help with their expenses. He has also tried other ventures in recent years to offset the loss of support. These efforts have not worked as planned. They need their American brothers and sisters to join them in this work with support to sustain the ministry God has trusted to them.

Stephen Self's Mission Trip to Haiti

At the end of March I went on a mission trip to Gonaives, Haiti. On this trip we had an eight person team of mostly veterans but also a couple of newbie's to Haiti missions. We had plans to do a small scale VBS with two different orphanages (Charlie's Champions & In His Hands). We also planned to do a Bible study with the teenagers at these locations as well as an afternoon study with some men and women from local churches. We planned to do house to house visitation in the afternoon and then have services in the evenings where Richard Sego our pastor from Trinity Baptist Church would preach and the team would share our individual testimonies. We had a very well developed plan. Leading up to the trip we had lots of communication between us and the missionaries on the ground in Haiti to ensure that our plan would flow seamlessly.

Travel to Haiti and then to Gonaives went very smooth. We rode in comfort in an air conditioned bus. Our 1st full day in Haiti was Saturday. We planned to have VBS with the kids and then do house to house visitation followed by church in the evening. We did the VBS and then stopped by a local pastors home to pray for his sick daughter. We all got off the bus and walked into a group of homes. We went to the pastor's home and then went inside. The room was probably 12' x 12' and it was about 98 degrees in there. We all stood around the perimeter as they brought the daughter in. She was lifeless as the father carried her in his arms. He laid her on a sheet on the floor. The Doctor on our team checked her vitals only to realize that she was already dead. This was a very intense moment as the father then had to carry the mother out of the room as she was dealing with this news. We prayed as a team with the father and Pastor Charlie. They cancelled the rest of the evening's activities. We had a team meeting that evening but everyone was struggling in dealing with the emotions from the day.

Day two was Sunday. Pastor Sego preached Sunday morning at Pastor Charlie's church. In the afternoon we did some house to house evangelism. We split into two teams and went out with translators. Each team saw someone come to accept Jesus. Everyone took part in sharing the gospel. It was great to get out and meet the people in the community and share our faith. Sunday night was at a much larger church with about 400 people. There was standing room only. Pastor Sego was set to preach again. During the worship service Pastor looks at me and lets me know he isn't feeling well. He soon transitioned to feeling very sick. We prayed for him outside of the church. He eventually went to a nearby home to lie down with a fan on him. We now believe that he was suffering from heat exhaustion. The show must go on. Three of us shared our testimonies as scheduled and we shared very transparently and from our hearts. Pastor Charlie then preached based on our testimonies on hidden sin. He had three come forward to repent of sin in their lives.

Day three we planned to start our day at In His Hands Orphanage doing a Bible study with the teenagers. We were under the impression that he only had teenagers. When we got there we realized that we were wrong. He had about 20 younger kids also. So we brainstormed. We happened to have some other teaching materials with us. We had not studied it yet but God provided grace for the moment. We realized after we were done there that the days were not long enough to do the house to house evangelism with everything else going on. We then did our 1st adult Bible study of the week. It went great! They are very hungry for God's word. They had a lot of questions about the Bible and the Christian life. In the evening Pastor Sego preached and we saw one more come to know the Lord! Day four was basically the same as day three. We just had Charlie's kids instead. We were supposed to have a completely different set of kids from our first day with them. As we were boarding the bus we realized that this was not true. We had 20 new kids and 20 kids from the previous day. This was a problem because 20 of the kids had already heard the lesson that we were prepared to teach. So we regrouped, we did a recapped of the previous lesson and taught a new lesson. The rest of the day flowed like the previous day. Adult Bible study after lunch, followed by Pastor Sego preaching and some testimony sharing. We had two more accept Christ in the service!

Day five was our last day of ministry. We had the In His Hands group. We did Bible study with the older group and Bible lesson w/ crafts with the younger group. We then did the Bible study in the afternoon. This day was supposed to be just ladies. We showed up and it was mostly ladies but there were about ten men as well. We decided to go with our previous plan and have one of our young women teach. She did a wonderful job. We had evening service with Pastor Sego preaching and the team sharing testimonies. There were three saved in the service!

Day six was spent traveling to Port au Prince and staying at World Harvest Mission. Day seven was spent traveling home. This was a great trip! There were more moments of regrouping and trusting God then I can remember being on one trip. This was also the most emotionally tasking trip I've been on. 

SHOWERS

Elaine and I are seated at our front door enjoying a heavy shower of rain. She is thrilled whenever rain falls: reminds her of her youth, when she would go and curl up in bed once rain began to fall.

The long drought has afflicted most areas of the island, and has devastated our agricultural areas and crops. Our vegetable producing parish has been especially hit hard. This has caused in some cases a doubling of prices in the market and supermarkets. Our already over-stretched dollar is about to burst, having devalued to a rate of J\$1.00 to US\$118.00. Meaning that the Jamaican dollar can only buy us 1.18 cents US. We thank God that some of this rain has also fallen in the catchment areas around Kingston, but not enough to end the drought. They have had to suffer lock-offs every other day: some had water only every two days. While we thank God for the drops, we wish that the showers may truly fall, and especially in the spiritual realm.

While our government is still resisting foreign political pressures to change our laws to allow legalization of homosexuality and same-sex marriage, many of our North-American and European influenced intelligentsia have rejected Bible-based morality, and see Christians and others who seek to maintain Biblical morality as old-fashioned, and behind-the-times. The recent visit of the President of the USA was partly to add his voice to the others, and to push our government to change our "old-fashioned attitudes." Pray we be strengthened to believe that spiritual showers will continue to fall upon our land, and that the spiritual drought afflicting many countries may not come our way.

Showers have also been falling in our Caribbean region recently, in the form of Hurricane Erica. Though, fortunately, Jamaica was not affected, nevertheless our Caribbean neighbours were. For us it was especially difficult to hear of the damage and loss of life in the Eastern Caribbean island of Dominica, especially since this was the Island that we spent three summer holidays and over two years as pioneer church-planting missionaries in the late 1960s to early 1970s. The most badly affected location, Petite Savanne, is only a few kilometres from (Berrecoa), Grand Bay where we lived and planted a church.

We are in touch with a Dominican brother, whom Lloyd met at the Conference he attended near Rome in June. He shares that though none of the Church-members were killed, many lost relatives. Some bodies are still under the rubble and landslides in the village. The village is cut off from the rest of the country, and is accessible only by sea or by helicopter. The government has taken the decision to evacuate the village until roads and other amenities can be restored. If Lloyd were twenty (20) years younger he would surely be on a plane leading a team heading to Dominica to help in relief work, as he had done many times in the past after hurricanes in Haiti, Montserrat and in the south of Miami after hurricane Andrew in 1992. Do stand with our fellow believers and others in Dominica, and assist practically where you can.

Lloyd is preparing to resume teaching responsibilities at Regent College of the Caribbean. He will be teaching a new Missions course. He has also been asked at short notice to teach another course (O.T. Survey) for three weeks until the lecturer returns from India, where his sick father has delayed his return. Do pray that Lloyd will handle this double responsibility successfully.

Much of this summer Lloyd spent finishing up a new missions book on a Jamaican planter family and their exploits for God, both in Jamaica and in many other countries beyond our shores. He has been doing the research and writing for over a year. The book is about five cousins who were missionaries, simultaneously, during the early to late 1900s in Africa, China, Ecuador and Peru. He completed the book last week and is now preparing it for publication. Pray that he will find the right publisher who will assume the costs and responsibilities of publication and marketing.

Elaine was busy through the summer with Vacation Bible Schools and other children ministries through her church. With schools reopening this week she is ready to contact schools again concerning her medical and spiritual sexual abstinence program. Pray that opportunities would be given her to share in the schools again this year.

We ask you to give thanks with us for all God's mercies, provisions, and blessings showered upon us. For the opportunity Lloyd had to visit Rome and London this summer for a conference in the former place; and for the blessings of the Keswick spiritual life conference here in Mandeville in July that so blessed God's people. Pray that we will have the vision and strength for each day, to allow us to go on serving the Lord and people in all the varied ways He allows us to do. May you all walk with Him as closely and faithfully as you can each day, and may you do His will as he shows you how, for His glory.



Twenty years ago there was a great beginning of the Good Samaritan Sponsorship project, supporting orphans with school fees so they can attend school. Now the end of this journey is upon us. As of the end of this year, GSSP will come to an end. Our Lord Jesus has seen fit to use it to educate over 280 students in so many levels of education, from primary school to University, graduate work, pastor preparation and doctor preparation. As of the end of this year there will still be only a few students under our support. Pastor Sam and Zoe have had to move on to live in Kampala, over 160 miles from Ft. Portal in order for him to take care of his ailing 94 year old mother. He has given up the pastor-ship of the new Life Presbyterian Church, but in God's perfect timing his son in law has been called to pastor the church.

We want to thank all of you who have supported this wonderful ministry of mercy for all these years, in so many ways: prayer, financial, material goods, and trips with us to our adopted land. We have grown as a couple because of our association with this project and have success stories to speak of, but of course there are also disappointments from our standpoint, but from God's, nothing is lost in His economy of things.

Your support would be appreciated until the end of the year. We have a reserve of funds which will carry all the students that are finishing to the termination of their education. We cannot thank you enough for what you all have done to support us. Words fall so very short but our hearts are full of joy for you and you've all accomplished through our Lord Jesus Christ.

A movement has been started in Ft. Portal with many of the graduates of the project to accumulate their money on a monthly basis to support orphans, in effect to pay back to God for others for what God has done for them. How beautiful is that, they have caught the vision for mercy. With that we say THANK YOU AND JESUS BLESS!























These past three months have been among our busiest this year. July marked the end of our three years of ministry at the Eastern highlands town of Rusape. We met at several venues and under different conditions during that time. We also held our last Bible study with the residents of the senior citizens village in Rusape where we rented an apartment these past three years (much cheaper than staying at a guesthouse). They said farewell with tea, followed by Bible study, after which they served soup and rolls. We'll return sometime, in the Lord's will, to encourage, challenge and fellowship with them.










In August one of our appointments was an invitation from one of the past attendees of our classes in Chegutu. This Pastor had started a ministry in Makonde District, a rural area of Mashonaland West, and asked us to speak at a Church Conference there. What we were told was a l.5 hour, 45 km. drive from the town of Chinoyi, turned out to be 65 km. and took us almost 3.5 hours over the most horrendous roads. Those more acquainted with the area wisely use donkey carts – they travel faster than us too! But the beauty of the countryside and the thankfulness and hospitality of the residents made the trip worthwhile.



This hut serves during the week as a school for 65 of the community's pre-school age children and Church sanctuary on Sundays. Please pray for Pastor & Mrs Muchena as they serve in this community with very little resources.

In September God gave us much grace as we got back on the road, to Chegutu and on to Gweru, all the while trying to get as much news as we possibly could about Dolly's home island of Dominica that has suffered terrible infrastructural damage and the loss of over 30 lives from severe flooding and widespread landslides in the aftermath of the Erika and two other tropical weather systems. After about three days, our children were able to make contact with us and confirm that they were all well and are now part of the relief and restoration process. Please pray for Dominica and its people whose livelihood depended on Eco-tourism.





The children of the Haven and Fresh Start homes enjoyed a visit from a mission team of eighteen in July. This was our largest team to date, and many of us agree it was the best trip ever. Nearly half the team members have visited the home multiple times, so there were sweet reunions as well as new friendships formed. The ministry activities and divine appointments were too numerous to list, so here is a sampling without elaboration: Tire swings hung from trees; soccer cleats distributed to players; murals painted on walls; the sick received medical treatment; abundant craft projects enjoyed; neighbors visited; food distributed to the poor; gifts exchanged; Sunday school lessons taught; good meals shared; celebrations made; cooking lessons received; The Lion King viewed; ropes jumped; marbles

shot; books read; students tutored; and lots of photos taken. God is so good to provide such opportunities to minister, to share the gospel, and to encourage one another.





This year we reached the 10th anniversary since Pam and I moved to Kenya to establish the Haven, so it was befitting to have an anniversary celebration while we were all together. The menu included kuku and chips (fried chicken and french fries), sodas, and cake. The celebration was complete with lots of dancing and singing; testimonies from two of our university students, Allan and Pauline, who came to

the Haven in 2005; glow sticks for the little kids; and the launching of sky lanterns that landed in the nearby cornfield... oops. A few of the our students in a nearby boarding school were granted permission to come home for the celebration. We invited Mary Bahati, the founder of Fresh Start and the overseer of the home, but we intentionally did not invite other special guests because we wanted to give our undivided attention to the children. The celebration was a big success!

Please keep the children and caregivers in your prayers. In November the eighth graders will take the national comprehensive exam to determine if they will be invited to attend high school. Financial needs continue to grow as more and more students enter boarding schools, trade schools, colleges, and universities. We thank the Lord for the recent provision of scholarships for four students, Allan (political science), Florence (education and library science), Mary Mercy (secretarial certificate), and Hassan (auto mechanics). The Lord has also provided new school shoes, sweaters, and uniforms. Outstanding needs to be met include electrical rewiring of the home, a mini-bus, and school fees for the new school year in January.

We had our geological survey done this spring and just recently got the results. The team came and checked many spots around SCH and the surrounding areas. So we are now focusing efforts on collecting water in a large cistern. We could make a 10-15,000 gallon cement holding tank, above ground, it would solve much of the water needs and the surface would double as a mud-free area for washing & hanging laundry. I want to say a big "Thank you" to my two summer interns this year, Ruth Anna and Sara Johnson, for all their help and patience. It was a difficult summer with the van breaking down and plans having to be adjusted and walking and taking taxis. Great job...Thank you!! Also for the Romanian team that made everything flow and come together, with translation, discipline, and guidance.....Thank you!

Thank you to everyone who has been a part of the ministry this year. Your prayers and gifts have had a big impact on the lives of so many children in Romania. This year we have seen so many conflicts around the world, with wars and battles, and it has left a lot of people displaced. This summer and fall we saw firsthand the refugee situation Hungary. As this situation grows we are looking for ways to help and reach out. I'm asking that you will pray with us as we search for ways to best help in this situation as each country tries to help these people. I'm reminded of Matthew 22:37, 39. 37 Jesus said "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind." 39 And the second is like it; "You shall love your neighbor as yourself".



Just three days ago, we returned from our two-month trip to Grenada and Dominica which the Lord graciously made possible through the generous gift of airline tickets from a partnering Church and friends. This came when we least expected it, but at a time when we felt a compelling desire to visit loved ones, particularly in Dominica which had just been struck by a storm that dumped record rainfall. The result was mass destruction of roads, walls, bridges and buildings, and the loss of almost forty lives.

We praise God that He kept our family there safe but they too had anxious moments. Just a mere thirty yards away, they saw a bridge (their footpath from the main road) being washed away by the flood waters. Normally very quiet stream, it had become a fierce and angry torrent. Thankfully, our family did not have to use the escape route they had mapped out had the flood waters risen any higher. We are grateful to the Lord for the good times we shared together, including hearing their stories. Thanks for all of you who prayed for them and us during this time.





The damage to the island was unbelievable but now most roads are now accessible, although some villages are still cut off. Yet, the resilience and determination of the people are exemplary and life is returning to normal although there is still very much to be done. We pray that this experience will drive them to a pure faith in the Lord.

The re-dedication of the Church building in Grenada went very well. We were amazed at the high quality of organization and execution of the program. However, they understand that the real

work is now ahead of them – that of "teaching the Word and reaching the world"; and that this would be accomplished, not by natural ability or human enterprise, but by the Spirit of the Lord empowering and using them.

We are grieved at what we see in so many parts of the Church today. It seems that we work so hard at settling down into a life of ease and comfort that the rigors of the Gospel call are greatly diluted. Perhaps we have created a brand of Christianity with a jealously-guarded space around ourselves, and anything that threatens it is seen incompatible with the faith and therefore offensive. Worse yet, we call upon the very Lord for preservation from such encroachment, and this becomes a cause to which we dedicate ourselves. Christ, therefore, has at best a secondary place in His own Church – perhaps, for some, He is no more than a convenient figure-head.

One of the things that struck us on our recent trip was how warmly we were received wherever we went. Surely, the Lord must have prepared their hearts beforehand. Yes, God is good and we do not exaggerate when we say we feel very, very privileged to be His missionaries. And you, dearest friend, are being used by Him to bless us in so many ways, not least of which is your generosity in friendship and love.

The children of the Haven and Fresh Start homes are out of school for the month of December, and the government of Kenya urges orphanages to make provision for the children to visit their respective home places at this time. So, Christmas Day will be quiet at the children's home in Jua Kali because most, if not all, of the kids will be visiting their extended family members. We have often wondered about this practice. It is what the government wants, so we comply. In many cases, it is good for the children to maintain connections with their relatives, but we always wonder about the conditions some children are subjected to when they are sent home. Please join us in prayer for the children to travel safely and to be protected from any unsafe environment or unsafe people.

A friend of the ministry has taken the initiative to raise support for the children to have a kuku and chips (fried chicken and french fries) Christmas dinner when they return from their home visits and to provide a small Christmas bonus to the staff. We are grateful for such expressions of love!

I am currently reading LOVE WALKED AMONG US, Learning to Love Like Jesus by Paul E. Miller, and I am learning new things and relearning old lessons, namely that the children of the Haven and Fresh Start are the Lord's children, and it is my privilege to be a part of this ministry. While I often feel the heavy burden of wondering (worrying) how the children will be fed, clothed, and educated, such provision is completely under the jurisdiction of Jehovah Jireh. Each year as the children grow older, more and more of them enter into high school. We are anticipating thirty-six students to be in high school in the new year. That's a full 1/3 of the children of the home! I have no idea how the children are going to be fed in January, much less how \$36,000 will be supplied to pay school fees at \$1,000 per high school student, but I take comfort in knowing their provision will be from God's hand. Christmas is a special time for many in Haiti! Haitian Christians celebrate by rising very early for worship services to celebrate the greatest gift to mankind: our Savior, Jesus Christ! In some cities and rural villages throughout the country one devout believer will leave their little home at 3-4 AM and walk to the home of the next closest parishioner, singing Christmas Carols along the way. They continue on, serenading and adding members until they all reach the church. They then have a 2-3hr worship service (before the work day begins) praising GOD for his Mercy and Grace in their lives! This will go on for several days or more! until Christmas Day. It is very exciting and refreshing to be a part of such sincere 'Christ worship' that is heartfelt and not connected to any sort of holiday materialism.

At Shiloh Children's Home the children feel loved and cherished every day! Still they do get a special meal on Christmas Day with extra treats, which they truly enjoy!

Our greatest need continues to be getting water for the Home. Tom will be going down with our son, Joshua, in January for three weeks. We will work on upkeep of the building as well as replacing gutters and adding another cistern. This is necessary since the geological survey showed that drilling a well in our zone would be a wasted effort.

Our goal, Lord willing, in 2016 will include constructing a large cistern to hold enough rain water to meet the needs of SCH during the dry season. If possible we even hope to have extra water, that we can filter, to sell (for a very modest price) to the community. That would not only bless the community, but would provide a little extra money for fresh fruits & vegetables for SCH; a constant need.

May the LORD bless YOU each day as you Live for HIM!












