We here in the islands, tend not to follow too closely the models of North America and Europe. Elaine and I have no vacation-time planned, although we are less active at this time. Exams are over, and all papers are marked and turned in. That pressure is now over. Regent College had its graduation on July 1st, when 42 young people gained Certificates, Associate degrees, Diplomas and Degrees in Continuing Education, Early Childhood Development, Early Childhood Care and Development, Business Studies, Theology and in Theology with a Minor in Business.

Other ministry activities have continued into the summer: as Elaine has Vacation Bible Schools, and Lloyd involvement with Keswick Convention in July. Keswick has been happening in Mandeville since 1902, as the many churches and denominations come together for a Christian-life conference under the theme "All One in Christ Jesus". This year's renewal of Keswick was particularly blessed of God, especially on the Youth Night, Friday, and the closing Sunday evening.

In the midst of our many activities we do try to keep ourselves spiritually refreshed. The Keswick convention mentioned above was truly such a time, with Bible Studies in the mornings and the public preaching sessions at night. It was good to see the wide cross-section of churches and denominations represented each day, and the good fellowship among them.

Thanksgiving is not a tradition of ours in Jamaica. But it certainly should be for every believer in Jesus Christ. We want to join with you, as you will do on Thursday, in recounting some things from this year that we have cause for giving thanks.

1. In the midst of the unexpected passing of Elaine's sister in August, we look back and thank God for the special privilege He gave us to house, care for and share with her the things of God during her final six (6) months. We feel the Lord allowed us to help prepare her for her homegoing. So we rejoice that she is now free from earthly cares and sickness, and has received the ultimate healing: happily rejoicing in her Father's home.

2. Weather: we do not have to worry about shoveling snow as many of you are doing: but the temperature is turning cool, and our Christmas flowers have turned colours. The poinsettia now has red leaves, and the hydrangea leaves has turned white. Our tanks are overflowing with rain water as the drought is over, and we are told that the reservoirs are over 90% full. The country is still being asked to conserve water, as we could face another 6 months drought in the New Year, we are told. We thank God for the rains.

3. Health: Our general health has been good, though we are both still feeling lingering effects from the Chickungunya virus in our joints. We thank God we were spared from Ebola, though our country has had to spend much-needed funds on preparations.

4. Health workers in Liberia: But we thank God that Jamaica has contributed to the fight against Ebola in Liberia. A missionary doctor and her Administrative Assistant have been in the forefront of the fight over there, in preparing and assisting in training Liberian health workers. We help to support them, and did much to make their mission known in our churches when they were first going out years ago. Do uphold them in your prayers.

5. Ministry efforts: We count it a privilege to have been able to share at two different Christian Colleges in training young ministers, and others for witness in the world of work. The joy in witnessing their growth in knowledge and maturity has been gratifying. We have also been asked to share in Missionary Conferences and meetings. Lloyd has one coming this weekend, and another the next weekend. Another Jamaican couple left this month for work among the deaf in Haiti. We will be helping them in support and in our prayers. It's a privilege to do so, and to try to help others go into cross-cultural missions.

Lloyd had one of those "Wow, Praise God" moments two Sundays ago in church. Just before his time to preach, a sister was asked to share about an outreach Sunday School she had recently started, in a hillside village above our church. She was among those ladies from our church who attended some sessions last year when the Evangelism Committee of the local Ministers Fraternal offered training in children's work. Lloyd was a main influence in planning this training to win unchurched children to Christ. She responded to the challenge to begin outdoor Sunday afternoon classes in needy communities. With occasional help from others in the church, she began such a class in Top Bellefield, near the church. She has persevered against various frustrations, and now near 25 children attend each week.

Plans are afoot to hold similar training classes to prepare some of our young people in how to bring children to faith in Christ. They will then be available to:

- help with Vacation Bible School in the summer
- augment the few Sunday School teachers who have training in child evangelism
- be led to start other outreach children classes
- be available as counselors during the expected Children's Crusade in early November

Our family had another funeral in April, as Lloyd's older sister lost her husband. The passing of these relatives, and other friends in the last year, remind us of our humanity, and of how short may be our time left here on earth. We therefore need to redouble our efforts to turn people to the Lord, and prepare them for eternity.

Satan also uses these funerals to torment our minds, at times, with fears of our own passing. While our souls are secure in Christ's keeping, these fears are usually about our bodies as we age, fail, and weaken. Nevertheless, we are in generally good health: except for battling high cholesterol and the side-effects of statin drugs to control it. Lloyd has been trying various non-drug alternatives in order to get off these statins. He has convinced his reluctant doctor to do this. Pray for help for him in this matter.

This is end-of-semester time, and Lloyd has set exams and will soon be marking term-papers, projects and exams. It can be quite burdensome, but is a necessary part of his teaching, moulding, and mentoring the next generation of pastors, missionaries and other Christian workers. It is, in the end, a most satisfying engagement. Do please pray for the students at the two different Colleges where he teaches.

Elaine's ministries to children continue to bear fruit. This is also being seen in the increased numbers of children and parents attending at the Porus Methodist church where her efforts are concentrated. But so many others remain unchurched. The unspiritual conditions in the homes, and the lack of proper parenting, complicate her efforts. This is an area of spiritual need in our communities. The ministers fraternal with which Lloyd is involved, as Secretary and PRO, is trying to address these very concerns. At the last as well as at the coming meeting, they will be examining methods and approaches for interventions for the sake of our children and parents.

Evil is ever increasing here, as it is worldwide. Yet, God has placed us where we are to be His instruments to win souls and help prepare them for eternity. We thank God your friendship, prayers and provisions so we may give ourselves to this ministry.
