
Help Us Grow In Social Media

Restaurant Encounter: Life-Giving Results

It was 4:15 p.m. on Tuesday and I had stopped in at my favorite fast-food restaurant, before beginning a three hour teaching assignment at the Graduate School in Kingston, Jamaica.

This was a new assignment at a Seminary where I would be teaching for the first time. I was a bit apprehensive and anxious to get going. As I placed my tray in front of a twentyish young man and began, (he was not eating, but was doing what seemed like school work) he asked me "What time is it?" I responded to his question, then dug into my baked potato and hot chili-con-carne. A few minutes later the voice behind me was overheard to say, "I just don't feel like going...!"

Was he addressing me, or talking to himself? It was not clear which, so I continued with my meal. Nothing more was said. But, as I continued eating the Spirit of God began conversing with me: "When you are through do not leave before finding out if he was addressing you!" The divine impression was strong, and the voice within repeated His instruction a number of times. So I determined to be obedient!

As I finished and prepared to leave, I turned my chair around and faced him: "earlier, after you asked me the time, you muttered something that I am not sure whether you were addressing me or talking to yourself. You said "I just don't feel like... Do you mind explaining what you said, and what you meant by that?" Yes, he said, and began a heart-rending tale of woe. He had lost his wife to cancer just before Christmas. His five year old daughter and he had not eaten for three days. He was studying to be a Chef, and was seeking a job to tide him over until his studies were complete. But he was in a deep pit of depression, and questioning if God really cared for Him and his daughter. He could not answer her questions about God's love.

I offered him words of Christian hope; gave various suggestions; and handed him certain funds I had on me for a debt I intended to pay and prayed with him. All that afternoon I thanked God that I was in the right place at the right time to be His instrument to meet this young man's immediate needs. I was unable to contact him for over a week, but prayed often for him. When I did contact him his mood was quite different. I enquired if he was reading the Bible as I suggested. He was. The next day I would again be in the city, 58 miles away, and arranged to meet him. As soon as we met I enquired of his spiritual condition. His reply was that he wanted to receive the Lord as his Saviour. This was without my prompting. With copious tears he confessed his sins and his needs to the Lord, and asked for His salvation. The Lord's Spirit again moved upon me to give him some funds. He went on a job interview that afternoon and is now employed.

Please intercede for your new brother in Christ; and ask the Lord to make you always aware of opportunities to be a witness for Him. People all around us are waiting to hear our message of hope and salvation in Christ. Let us not be afraid, or hesitant to share at every opportunity the Lord puts in our path.

Haitian Center for Inclusive Education with Dr. Don DeVito

"VINI ANSANM": COME TOGETHER FOR INCLUSIVE COMMUNITY MUSIC DEVELOPMENT IN PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI

We are happy to announce that the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education has been selected to receive an International Society for Music Education Grant to help to further the work of music education for children with disabilities in Haiti. Our Haitian Center for Inclusive Ed (HCIE) board is comprised of Gertrude Bien Aime, Donald DeVito, Hannah Ehrli, Jamie Schumacher and Sandy Jones.

Grant leaders: Gertrude Bien Aime (Notre Maison Orphanage and Founder of the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education and Dr. Donald DeVito HCIE advisory board member. The Haitian Center for Inclusive Education advisory board partners and works with Harvest International to help carry out the important work of inclusion in Haiti.

A recipient of the 2016 International Society for Music Education's World Conference Award, Gertrude Bien Aime stated at the conference there are currently no formalized community music activities available to children. Haiti ranks 149th out of 177 countries on the 2009 United Nations Human Development Index and 90 percent unemployment prior to the earthquake, hurricane and recent riots.

Dr. Donald DeVito is developing a special education program at the Notre Maison Orphanage in Haiti for children with and without disabilities. During this time, Bien Aime and DeVito have developed an inclusive music ensemble for the 50 children at Notre Maison, delivered inclusive education training through music for 400 Haitian school teachers and DeVito has edited the first book on inclusive education for Haitian teachers. Through their work, community music is now in a position to act as an exemplar for inclusive special education in Haiti and has begun to transform the perception of Special Educational Needs (SEN) children in the community. In 2017, Bien Aime and Devito established a team of six Haitian and four US educators who founded the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education, which in its first year served academic instruction for 60 children and nearly 100 this August, 2018. This work is partnered with Harvest International.

a. Innovation:

This innovative approach utilizes social media technology, best practice of special education and music education approaches implemented at Notre Maison, and a philosophy of social justice. As a result, community music is now in a position to act as an exemplar for inclusive special education in Haiti and has begun to transform the way that children with Special Educational Needs (SEN) are perceived in the community.

b. Direct impact:

We will have a direct impact on the strategic possibilities of this work by: identifying, training and professionalizing 10 musicians and educators from across all of Haiti to become music leaders (5 per year); creating an appropriate bank of musical and pedagogical resources for Haitian children both with and without disabilities; and raising the profile of inclusive music education within the whole of Haiti. The work led by Gertrude Bien Aime and Dr. Donald DeVito will primarily take place at the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education and Notre Maison Orphanage.

c. Potential for wider influence and/or sustainability:

This approach will act as a pilot for further development both in Haiti and as an example for implementation in other low HDI countries and settings internationally.

d. Cost-effectiveness:

The ISME grant provides a \$6,000 funding source, which given the economy in Haiti will be sufficient for implementation. This is due to the groundwork of social capital that has taken place through positive collaboration and communication leading up to the awarding of this grant. Outputs:

- Year One: Piloting of Community Music Training in partnership with Notre Maison through two separate week-long intensive courses and further training through social media (see attachment).
- Year Two: Piloting use of Haitian learning resources (SEN and non-SEN) across four orphanages and schools in Port au Prince and Cap-Haitien. Present a seminar on Developing Inclusive Music Education and Community Music. Continue dialogue with government agencies to consult on a draft curriculum for nation-wide inclusive music in Haiti.



The children of the GFE Home are growing up so fast. I have been thinking about the journey many of them have been on. When Pam and I met most of the kids, they had already survived very difficult and painful life experiences...deaths of parents, abandonment, abuse, hunger, etc.

Pam and I had the privilege of establishing the Haven children's home in Eldoret, Kenya in early 2005. Dickson was our first son. Cosmas, Allan, Hamisi, Hassan, Salim, Mulama, Eric, Kadaji, Douglas, Jacob, and Isaac joined the home within the first few months. Noting soon is ined the family as our first doughter follows:






months. Norine soon joined the family as our first daughter followed by Mary Mercy, Rosie, Abby, Milcah, Gentrix, Pauline, Brenda, Faith, and Susan Kanaiza. Mbarak joined us just before Chirstmas 2005. So, there were 23 children in the Haven that first year.

Our beloved Mary Bahati, Bishop Ben Bahati's wife, had established a girls' home called Fresh Start prior to our establishment of The Haven. The kids attended school and church together, and the two children's homes joined together as a Home Cell Group that met weekly for prayer, praise, and bible study. Within a few years, we constructed a permanent home in the nearby village of Jua Kali and merged the two homes together. The combined home is called the GFE Children's Home (Global Field Evangelism), yet we continue to call the boys' home The Haven, and we call the girls' home Fresh Start.

Here are some stats on the children to help give perspective today...

- 32 Primary School Students Living in the Home Full Time
- 03 Primary School Students Living in Nearby Boarding Schools
- 21 High School Students Living in Boarding Schools
- 11 Students in Polytechnic or Trade Schools
- 16 Students Currently Attending University or College
- 10 Students Who Recently Graduated High School Hoping to Attend College or University
- 23 Grown Kids Who Have Graduated High School, College, or University and Are No Longer at Home.



The primary and secondary students are doing well, and they are finishing up their first term of the new school year. So, pray for all the kids in boarding schools to be safe as they travel home for their school break. Also, pray for peace and harmony at the home during the break. Can you imagine so many teenagers in the home at one time? The college and university students are on a similar schedule as we have in the U.S., so they are more than halfway through this school year.

Some of the graduates are still looking for jobs or having to work jobs that would not have required an education. Please pray for them to become gainfully employed and not to become discouraged. Several of the young adults from the home are involved in the GFE evangelistic ministries and are actively involved in sharing the gospel in large crowd venues. Some have recently completed a campaign in Tanzania. Pray for these young adults to be used effectively for the the growth of God's Kingdom in this ministry.

As always, we appreciate your support, and we covet your prayers. Please consider supporting the children of the Haven as we continue to feed, clothe, and educate the kids. Every gift, small or large, helps send a child to school, provide medical care when needed, and meet other needs.









I wish to bring you a more formal update, but there have been strikes going on with the telephone and internet company here, making local and global communication almost impossible. I have some good internet this morning so wanted to catch everyone up.

We safely arrived in Haiti February 27th, and hit the ground running. My parents spent 2 weeks with us. That was a sincere blessing. My dad is amazing; he made our house more comfortable by adding a bathroom door and some much needed counters in the kitchen. My Mom worked the whole time being a grandma and cleaning.

The fundraising for the water filtration project is totally blowing us away! We took 200 filters with us and have funds for at least that many more. We won't purchase any more until we distribute what we have. We don't like to store items long due to mice and rat damage.

Last year, we were awarded grant money to re-start the nutrition program for malnourished children at our clinic. We already have the buildings, but lacked staff and funding to operate it well. There are currently 6 children there with their care takers.

Please pray for Austin as he makes decisions concerning the program. We are not interested in feeding unhealthy food, (namely white rice and white flour) to fatten kids up because this causes worse problems in the long run.

Please pray for rain; it's been really dry and our neighbors are just waiting for the rain to plant. Please pray for opportunities for us to meet all our neighbors. We have 7 homes within sight from our front porch and only have met 2 households so far. Please pray for complete potty training success for Mirette; I really need that to cut down on laundry. Please pray for patience in every moment, for my sanity and the childrens.

More than 2300 children came to Renault Sunday school at Christmas and they all received some very nice gifts. It was a huge distribution which took about 4 hours, so we were really thankful for the help from Deb's English class, who are also part of our volleyball club.







We also held a special day of activities for the young people in our volleyball club. They divided up into 4 teams and competed in many events including:

Anytime we have work projects we have a great crew of young people from our volleyball club who are ready and willing to work.

Our long time employees Roro and Nadair are learning carpentry and woodworking and they are

doing great. We are planning to make 200 of these chairs, Lord willing, to replace our rusted folding chairs. The chairs stack together and are made out of local Haitian cedar.



Pray for Haiti

In February of this year there were organized roadblocks and demonstrations throughout Haiti. The purpose of the demonstrations was to call attention to the needs of the common people. The price of fuel quadrupled almost overnight when Venezuela was forced to stop oil shipments due to their own political problems. This was the last straw for a people that are struggling to survive on any given day. Calls for the President to resign have not accomplished the change being demanded.

The result of the unrest and violence is that the US State Department has issued a travel advisory recommending Americans not go to Haiti. This has caused greater suffering to the poorest people because of the lack of mission and medical teams this summer. After much prayer and discussion it was decided that Harvest International could not send teams until the alert level is dropped from the existing level 4. This means the teams scheduled for medical missions in Les Cayes, who normally sees over 2,300 people in the week they serve, were unable to help even one patient that does not have access to a doctor. It means that all the camps and weddings that were planned at Camp Mahanaim for children had to be cancelled. It means that an outing to the local stores for food and supplies can turn dangerous without warning for anyone in Haiti. When the protesters are active, groups manning the roadblocks are hostile to anyone moving on the street. Most people only move during the early morning hours and use the back roads and dirt tracks to obtain necessary supplies and food. Trucks carrying supplies have to be careful to avoid roadblocks and move only during quiet times in order to make deliveries to towns. This has caused food shortages in many of the towns. These protests are organized and countrywide although the biggest impact seems to have been in Port-au-Prince.

The average Haitian, however, is a very flexible and creative person. The adversities that come from living in the poorest country in the Western Hemisphere have made them very resourceful. Most families have a garden and chickens or goats. When one route is blocked they accept the change in their plans far more graciously than most Americans would. And



the people who have a heart for missions have demonstrated that they want to help even if they can't be there to do things themselves. Many of the teams and members that have had to cancel their planned summer trips have sent funds for Rod & Debbie to use to do camps for the children using only the local people. God facilitated the delivery of entire container of food to Rod Wray this week so he will have food for the Renault Sunday School and local needs for several months. Every time we think the end of the unrest is near another event proves us wrong but the Haitian people and the missionaries that live among them have adapted and continue to persevere.

Introducing our newest Missionaries

Ron & Stacy Smith Serving the Lord in Haiti



Ron accepted Christ around age four. He had childhood aspirations to be a doctor and as he grew up, that desire never changed. Though Stacy and Ron were both raised in Arkadephia, AR, they didn't meet until Ron's junior high school year. They dated for three years, then were married in 1977. They will celebrate 42 years of marriage December 23, 2019.

In 1986, Ron completed residency and they moved to El Dorado, AR. Ron's training in Tulsa was very heavy in Neonatal Intensive Care and he continued that in his private practice.

The biggest challenge in their lives was not medicine. In 1987, our daughter, Laura Michelle, was born with Fetal Isotretinoin Embryopathy. Laura was developmentally and physically disabled. Until her death in 2014 at age 24, she was never developed milestones beyond that of a three month old baby. Her story is Ron & Stacy's story for sure and worthy of reading it here, https://www.amerechristian.com/laura-michelle/.

During those years in El Dorado, Stacy attended a local vocational educational school and obtained her LPN credentials. In those early years of practice, they were introduced to missions through their local church and a fellow physician. They made trips to Mexico, Guatemala, Paraquay, Kyrgystan and India.

Over the years Ron's medical practice bloomed tremendously. Currently Ron is working only one day a week seeing patients, however, he still manages all their computers, the office network, and the EMR database, mostly remotely. In 2018, Ron and Stacy went on a self-funded, three month sabbatical to Onaville, Haiti. Three days a week Stacy taught sewing classes to Haitian ladies while Ron maintained and fixed the sewing machines. Two days a week they ran a hemoglobin study clinic to try and determine if the years of short term medical clinics that have been held in Onaville were successful.

During that time, they worked with Joseph Similien (aka Simi), a Haitian pastor, and his wife Martine. Simi was pastoring a small church under another local 'Bishop' in Onaville. A school was his vision and he believed that he could help his fellow Haitians in Onaville through it. The school seemed to be the direction for Ron and Stacy too. In the course of the medical clinic and the sewing, there were two important things they discovered. The Haitians there need education to keep from getting sick, education on how to make a living, and education on how to manage their money. The other thing is that 19% of children five years old and under that they examined were suffering from severe chronic malnutrition.

Simi's school is positioned right across from Ron and Stacy's property so that they can help educate parents and families medically. They want to set up a small hemoglobin testing clinic called the Storybook Pediatrics Malnutrition Study Center. Education and medical data gathering are certainly worthwhile activities for which the Gospel is the overseer. They cannot simply provide humanitarian assistance alone. They never want to do that. Sharing Christ with everyone is truly their burning passion.

As we pass each new Birthday (Lloyd celebrated his 77th on May 27th.) we recognize our remaining years to serve the Lord are getting fewer and fewer. This creates a concern as to how much we are leaving behind: how many are we winning to the Lord; how many are we training to soon take our place to continue what we are doing? We tend to see our ministry under four headings: Educating, Discipling, Reaching Children, Assisting Socially and Spiritually.

Educating: As the summer months have come, we are also facing end of courses and graduations. Lloyd did not teach at regular Regent College of the Caribbean this semester, as he was tasked to teach a course module at the Caribbean Graduate School of Theology in the capital, Kingston. While the teaching sessions only covered a little over four weeks, the time for preparation to teach a completely new course, along with preparing quizzes and final exams and term papers made it as much work as teaching a full semester. In addition, Lloyd still did, occasionally, visit at Regent where the Children's Ministries Course he had developed was being taught for the fourth year. The numbers for the course this year were not as great as in former years, but the five students were very eager and committed. They will face their graduation, along with other graduates, on Sunday evening July 7th.



Assisting Socially: Though Elaine and Lloyd are not involved in large soul-winning efforts, yet that is the end product of all we do. But we are involved with fewer numbers, and work in more personal and individualistic ways. To put it in another way: we are seeking to win persons to faith in Christ and then to make them into disciples following in the footsteps of Jesus. Lloyd has been working with one such person since January.

Discipling: Meet Clayton: he turned up at Lloyd's Church on a Sunday morning in January. Clearly he was not a believer, and had come into the area to visit someone, and felt led to come inside. Lloyd chatted with him, and someone else called him forward for special prayers. He was clearly moved, and responded with tears. The Next Sunday he was back. We found out that he had to walk quite a distance, before getting a ride, right to the Church's door. Lloyd counseled with him and led him to pray for salvation. He was invited to join a new believer's class Lloyd was teaching. He has rarely missed since first coming.

He had lost his job and was needing assistance. Many men helped him to focus on farming, and Lloyd & Elaine funded his farming endeavours. But not everything has gone smoothly. Now he has picked up a job overseeing a farming operation some distance away from his home. Problems have also developed there, but with comfort, counsel, and much prayer, he is persevering. Pray with us for his growth in faith, trust and dependence on the Lord in every respect. He is doing well in a Correspondence Bible Course. We are believing God for his growth and development in the things of the Lord. Pray with us for him.

The other case we shared last time, with some similarities, has been handed over to a friend who is an elder at the church he is visiting. We believe he will grow in Christ.

Elaine – Children Ministries: Her visits to schools for devotions, and her weekly multi-faceted classes on Saturday morning at a local church continue, with occasional interruptions. But some are showing signs of encouraging growth. She faces upcoming Vacation Bible Schools in a number of Methodist Churches. In addition, she helps in a local community Sunday School. She sees many unchurched children that she wishes to reach. Your prayers will strengthen her resolve to will and develop the spiritual growth of children and youth.

We have been asked to work with a visiting Children's Worker during the summer. Many details of time, locations, etc. are not yet settled. Do pray with us for the arrangements and outworking of this initiative.

Neighborhood Contacts for Christ: we are often surprised at neighborhood people coming to us for aid, both for small income earning jobs, and to give guidance and counsel in family situations. Our response is not always as 'Christian' as we should be. But our help seems to keep them coming. But we also see this as opportunities given by the Lord for witness and counsel. Elaine is particularly helpful with them. We trust that we are drawing them to the Christ who is in us, and that some will come to seek His salvation.

Summer time-off: We have no plans, yet, for some vacation/rest time. While our souls look forward to spiritual refreshing from the annual Keswick Convention in July, it seems unlikely we will do much towards physical refreshing; especially as Lloyd continues to work on the historical research and writing of his denominational history that he is involved in. But, we are in the Lord's protective care.

We depend upon your prayers and financial support of our multi-faceted ministries, and the individuals who look to us for financial, social and spiritual assistance. We often need wisdom as to which appeals to respond to. Thanks for your prayers for us and for those we seek to help in their journeys through life.




Serving the Lord in Uganda

In our April letter to you, we indicated that we would be going on a furlough from May 20 to August 30 in order to visit and report to some of our partnering Churches, individuals and families. Our plans also included visiting family members and friends and of course getting some rest.

In London we had very memorable times with Dhan's sister and his widowed brother-in-law. The time was too short to visit friends who date back to the early days of Dolly's coming to Christ so phone calls had to suffice. Then we flew to New York. The next morning, Sunday May 26th, we attended the 11 a.m. service of a Manhattan Church after which we lunched with members of their Missions Council. This gave us the opportunity to update them, get acquainted with the Church's direction during a period of transition and better understand the heart of the Missions Pastor.

A week later, we left for Florida where we were hosted by a dear couple at Homestead whose genuineness greatly encouraged us. Over dinner, we gave a report to the Missions Committee of our former Church in Miami. We were very impressed by the interest of the attendees; and were it not for the Chairperson's timely intervention, our meeting could well have continued for several hours yet. At the service the following morning, we gave a brief report to the church. It was good to be "home again" and reconnect with old friends.

By the grace of our Lord, we braved the roar and anxious rush of the 5 a.m. traffic the next day as we headed to Ocala. Harvest's Director wisely arranged for us to be accommodated by a missionary, now in his eighties, who faithfully continues to present the Scriptures by radio to a growing listenership in the US and beyond. He had been widowed less than a year before and we were the undeserving beneficiaries of his generous hospitality. What a precious time we had with him as he opened his home and heart to us. He also arranged for us to speak at his Church's Wednesday Bible Study where the participants' enthusiasm really blessed us.

The highlight of our travels so far was dinner with the Harvest Board and Staff. We were encouraged by two testimonies which were shared that evening – one by a missionary preparing to go to the field and the other by a member of the Board. They reminded us of the story of Caleb in the Old Testament who gave the minority report by which Israel was encouraged to enter the Promised Land. Last evening, we received a voice message from a young lady in Zimbabwe whom we met almost four years ago while she was being trained for the mission field. 

During my trip to India this year I was blessed to be able to teach two classes with the help of a translator The men's meeting was at 5:00 am every Tuesday morning. It is very difficult to get men in India to come because of the persecution. I was working to teach them to get there on time, which in India is very difficult. If you say 9:00 am, they hear 10:30 am or 11:00 am. So I told them the meeting started at 5:00 AM with or without them

and if they came after 5:00 am they would miss something important.

Many would come without bibles, not that they didn't own one but because of the persecution they would suffer by bring their Bible. Then I taught them to use the notebook and pens I would supply, so something was said that they wanted to remember they could write it down with the date they heard it.

Many missionaries or Sharath (my host) would teach or I would bring the message if we didn't have a speaker, otherwise I would teach what the Lord gave me.

The video was taken while I was teaching the Bible School, which was every day Monday - Friday at 9:30 am. I charged (10 Rupees to those who had poor excuses) and during the six months I was there I collected 500 Rupees, about \$8:00 US Dollars and bought a spiritual dictionary for the class. 10 Rupees was hard for the students to pay.

There were male and female participants. I taught for six months on GOOD NEWS FOR THE POOR. We all have areas where we are poor, as I got into the Word, the Word would identify areas that we were poor in, and we could begin to tear down the walls of our restrictions to the word of God, little by little.

When God fills our cup he fills it to over the top, onto the table, onto the floor and out the door. In the kingdom of God there are no shortages. What a good time we had learning what the Word says to us to believe.

Make A Difference Worldwide Institute

Onaville, once sparsely occupied by about 1,500 families prior to the devastating earthquake, is situated on an east/west range of dry, arid mountains to the north of Port-au-Prince. Simi (Jospeh Similen) was in one of the many tent camps that sprung up after the 2010 earthquake. The first Make A Difference Worldwide Institute was located there and lasted for about two years.







Simi's had a dream of a school educating his fellow Haitians in English, cooking, computers and mechanics among other things. He bought a piece of land in Onaville and took what materials the local gang didn't steal or destroy. For over four years, he used a hammer to beat large rocks into gravel needed for cement and slowly had about half the perimeter wall done.

Today, the school's first floor will soon be finished. It will contain a fully outfitted kitchen for cooking classes, a library and one large classroom area. Simi and his wife, Martine, are planning to open the school in January 2020. The plan is to build a second story for more classrooms and a third story as a dormitory to house visiting teams of teachers and others who will come to help in Onaville.








Simi is called a notab, a community leader respected because of his natural leadership skills. He is a man of many talents, being certified to teach English by the Haitian American Institute, a trained mechanic, computer teacher and a full time pastor to a small local church in the Croix des Bouquette area below Onaville. Simi's wife, Martine, has just started her third year in Law school and they have a four year old son, Jakim. The role of the school is to teach English and skills like cooking to keep the people from getting sick or computers to help equip them for job opportunities. His ultimate goal is to share the Gospel. Simi is a shoe leather evangelist at heart!

Storybrook Pediatrics - Malnutrition Study Center

Across the street from the Make A Difference Worldwide Institute, we will open the Malnutrition Study Center. Last year, we found that 19% of children under five have hemoglobins indicative of severe chronic malnutrition. Our study was published on the front page of Pediatric News.



The child pictured here had a hemoglobin of 5.4. You wouldn't think from his appearce that he suffers from severe chronic malnutrition. The study center will both monitor and devise specific treatment over specific lengths of time for children like these. Treatment can have an immediate effect in weeks. We will monitor hemoglobins so as to determine when the treatment is satisfactory and can be stopped. In addition to that, we have developed a mobile Malnutrition Study Kit which has all the necessary lab instruments and test supplies for up to 800 hemoglobin checks. Medreach, Inc. out of Alabama is at this moment in African bush using our first test kit.



The malnutrition Study Center and the kits can be duplicated everywhere. By monitoring and being more targeted with general nutrition resources like the typical manna packs, we can maximize the benefit of current funds and prevent more costly care in malnutrition rescue centers.

We would like to encourage any medical teams going to the field who want to do a malnutrition survey to contact us. We might be able to send a Malnutrition Study Kit with them. The software I've written can quickly process the data and produce graphs similar to this for the area they serve. If interested please contact Ron Smith at Ron@RonSmithMD.com.

After weeks of no rain, we have been blessed with some decent showers. We pray the gardens will still be able to produce a good crop, though the dry spell has done damage.

We have distributed 160 of the 200 water filters we have on hand. The first group of people has been using them for over six weeks, and our inspectors have indicated that everyone is comfortable with the system. Austin and I personally visited 50 homes for the Pecry distribution, inviting them to participate. It was the good excuse we needed to meet our closest neighbors and get an idea of their living conditions. I truly enjoyed seeing beautiful places so close to us, and observing normal family life going on.

Since moving into our home we have planned to build a cistern. The one we have in mind would be 15K-17K gallons, since digging a well in our area is nearly impossible. The cistern would provide us water through the dry seasons, and be used for local building projects. We have begun stockpiling the necessary materials. We hope to finish it by the end of the year.

The clinic has restarted a nutrition program that Austin's parents had managed. Since March, more than two-dozen malnourished children from newborn to five years have received care. Six of the infants were hospitalized due to their initial condition. Gratefully, they have all returned home, and the staff follows up with the families to ensure that the children continue to grow healthily. Monthly support for this program would be greatly appreciated. We estimate an annual budget of \$3,500-\$4,000 will be necessary to maintain the program.

In the capital of Port au Prince, most everything is shut down and there are roadblocks in locations throughout the country. On Sunday, we were able to get through 2 barricades and arrive safely at Renault Sunday school, but on the way home, we couldn't get through the roadblocks, so we took 4X4 trails and finally made it home.



We are so thankful for your generous response to last month's request. With the support of your "Camp" donations, we have been, and will be able to host groups for camps this summer. This particular school came from an area up in the mountains and the young people didn't know how to swim. Some of the kids were afraid of the water. They all had to wear life jackets, but by the end of the day, they were loving the water and the water slides.





Hurricane Season - 'September Remember'

In primary school we learned a poem concerning the hurricane months:

"June, too soon; July, stand by; August, look out you must;

September remember; October, all over"

This seems to have changed: now the second to third weeks of September are considered the most busy hurricane weeks, no longer August. While all of the Caribbean is in danger each year's hurricane season, we in Jamaica have been fortunate that since 2007, (when hurricane Dean took off our roof) Jamaica has escaped being hit. But, we sorrow with our Bahamian brethren as they suffer and seek to repair after being hit by 'Dorian'.

Many Jamaicans reside in the Bahamas and work in their hotel industry, and some were affected in Marsh Harbour and Grand Bahama, but we suffered no loss of Jamaican lives. Thank God! Many Jamaican businesses, social and Church groups are preparing to send aid. The Jamaican government has sent a large group of our military to help in search, relief and recovery work. Lloyd wishes he were twenty years or more younger, so that he could be on a relief team over there, helping in relief and recovery efforts, as he often did in other Caribbean countries in the 1980s to 2000.

While the summer is over, we are still here, doing all we can to advance the Kingdom of Jesus Christ. We will surely miss the lovely colours of 'Fall,' but we will certainly NOT miss the winter and snow. While we took no 'holidays' nor went anywhere for rest time, we did have a number of family visits: one from a younger sister of Elaine with her family, and one from a younger brother of Lloyd's and his wife. They were here nearly a month apart. Lloyd's brother and sister-in-law visited from Tanzania, where they are using their training and former technical and business experiences to help the local people and government, aiding Small and Medium Business persons improve their procedures and thus their income. In chatting with them we recognized they were really doing 'secular missions' work. Please pray for their physical enablement and spiritual growth.

Elaine and I, and our church, also benefited from the visit in early August of two female Jamaican medical and educational missionaries to Liberia. Lloyd had them to share with the church their photos and training activities, and how God is using them to prepare Africans to serve their own people. Do keep them in your prayers as they return to Liberia at the end of September.

Lloyd continues in his work of research, interviewing and writing the history of his church group. He hopes to finish by the end of the year. Meanwhile he is also involved with three different Colleges and Seminaries. While not teaching at Regent College of the Caribbean this semester, he assists sometimes at Midlands Bible College, and just finished as a reader and adviser of a graduate student's Theological Thesis. He is also preparing to teach an online graduate course on Caribbean Church History at the Caribbean Graduate School of Theology in February upcoming. Do uphold him in your prayers as he prepares for this venture.

Elaine continues with her various children and youth interventions and outreach ministries in the new school year just beginning. She reports "The summer is over, and what a hot time it was, but God in His love has sent us several recent showers of rain." She was kept very active helping out with Vacation Bible Schools (V.B.S.) in two of the smaller churches. She was also kept busy fellowshipping with and caring for three groups of family member visitors. She also continues to assist two preteen boys in literacy and numeracy, and takes them to church on those Sundays that she can get them to go along.

We thank you profusely for your interest in what we are doing for the Lord, and for your prayers and financial support of us. We rejoice in the good health that the Lord gives us, even as our years increase and our bodies grow somewhat weaker. Keep praying for us to be able to continue doing what we do here, and more as we are able.

Greetings from Zimbabwe! We returned from our short, whirlwind furlough on August 30th. It was a joy to meet some of you during our visits to your local churches. Sorry we could not meet more of you. Our thanks to all of you who made us feel welcome and gave us quality time at your homes or restaurants over meals. Deep appreciation to all who hosted us, and even beat Dolly at Scrabble by all of 5 points - but hey, a win is still a win!

There were many highlights of the trip; among them our debriefing evening over dinner with members of the Harvest Board and Staff, as well as some fellow missionaries. Our time with family members were also very special. It was the first time we were visiting Dolly's home Island (Dominica) since the devastation of Hurricane Maria two years ago. Although much restorative work, both public and private, has already been completed, a great deal more is yet to be done. Many are still under tarpaulin 'roofs', mostly because of the great demand for skilled workmen at such a time. As you can imagine, the personal stories are heart-wrenching!

Our return to Zim was bitter sweet. Yes, we are happy to be back although re-settling has not been free of challenges. Some of you have expressed concern over what you read and hear in the media. Indeed, the Nation is going through several challenges, among them an awful drought. In our eleven years here, we have never seen so much brown all around as plants take a beating. All three boreholes (wells) on the property where we live have dried up. Electricity rationing continues but we do get some power from about 10.00pm until 4.00 am. During the day, we also get limited power via a solar feed from next door and a neighbor graciously supplies us with some water. Dhan left home at 4.30 this morning to join a fuel line and returned with a full tank at 8.30am, so we are good to go. Naturally, the lack of water and electricity has a ripple effect on many other areas. Then, there is the matter of the steady decline of the local currency. When we left here in late May, the US dollar was equivalent to seven local dollars. Today, it is down to the low twenties!

Today's world is filled with challenges of all kinds. At the service yesterday, the Preacher reminded us that we must set aside our fears and belly-aching and get on with what God has called us to do; that when we set forth in obedience, God by His power accomplishes His purposes in and through us. He shared how God called him, an ill-equipped, uneducated guy whose only hope was employment as a farm hand or, if he really made it, a gardener. He told us of his difficulty at school with English, the punishments he received because he could not grasp the language and how he prayed and fasted when he was called upon to deliver his first message in English. But he also testifies of experiencing the empowering of the Spirit throughout that message. Today, in his desire to be true to God's call upon his life, he sees the necessity to leave his comfort zone. Indeed, as believers, we are called to die to ourselves repeatedly that Christ might be manifested in our daily lives. Is that what our Lord means when He calls His disciples to "take up their cross daily and follow Him"?

May God grant all of us grace during these challenging times to look past our personal comforts and faithfully keep our eyes on the Lord of the Harvest. Thanks for standing with us.

Prison Ministries - "Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body." Hebrews 13:3. Visiting prisoners to share the good news of Jesus Christ and to demonstrate His love for them is a worthwhile undertaking. This year we were able to include visits to both the Eldoret Women's Prison and the Eldoret Men's





Prison. The atmosphere of these prisons was not so oppres-sive as anticipated because the Women and Men were excited about having visitors, singing and dancing in praise to God, and receiving gifts of toiletries and food.





Sunday Morning Church - The Spiritual Life Center is the name of the local church of which Pam and I were members and the home church of our kids and their caregivers. As a body, they have had a rough go of it over the years...victims of 'land grabbing,' malicious demolition of their church building, court battles, tragic death of their beloved Bishop Ben, forced relocation...but through it all, the people maintain their faith in God and demonstrate total dependence upon Him. The Living Hope ladies led the

various Sunday School classes for the younger children, and I taught the teenagers' class. Our time with the children and teenagers was sweet and rewarding for all involved.



Cheramei Primary School - The primary school around the corner from the kids' home has a special relationship with the GFE Children's Home. Each year we are invited to share the gospel with kids in the school. This year we sang songs and taught about the cross of Christ with the first and second graders. We visited the special needs class and invited them, along with their parents, to have lunch with us at home. During lunch, our ladies made a card with a photo for each child and parent to commemorate our time together. We also fitted the students with shoes. A wonderful time was had by all, and our relationship with the school has grown in love and affection. "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do

not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or your rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. For you will be repaid at the resurrection of the just." Luke 14:12-14.

Kamkunji Slum Visit - Rhoda cares for her own children and other kids who would otherwise be living in the streets. They all live in a typical slum dwelling comprised of walls made of mud and sticks, dirt floors, and a rusted tin roof.







We have come alongside Rhoda for years to help her with the purchase of food, school uniforms, and the payment of school fees. Rhoda makes purses, shopping bags, backpacks, and other sewn items to sell, so our team members do some of their souvenir shopping by purchasing from her. It is always a blessing to visit with Rhoda and family, pray for them, and deliver food and supplies.





August has been the culmination of a lot of things that we have waited for. As you know, it takes time to establish oneself in a new home when you have moved across town. It takes longer to establish oneself in a new city or even a new state. It takes longer to establish oneself in a new country as a foreigner. I wanted that to just happen; I had unrealistic expectations of how fast that would happen and it never occurred to me that change in general takes time. We have been waiting as we work. Now, God is rewarding the waiting with his good blessings.

All this month, Austin has been hauling materials, supervising work, and getting in on the roofing and pouring the concrete for the house he started plans for several months ago. We asked for prayer that the home would fall into the budgeted money, and praise God, it was within \$50! On the house site, pure white sand (which is of considerable value since the closest sand would have come from a river several hours drive away) was found and workers dug it out as needed. This



saved us the cost of sand and the transportation of it. Half way through the project, chunks of our tires were literally ripping off with every load. We prayed that God would keep them intact until we could finish and purchase new tires. He provided both longevity for the tires, and the procurement of new tires for a reasonable price.



One more answered prayer of many is that we found a neighbor lady who is teaching our children Creole. She is a kindergarten teacher, but this has been quite a challenge for her since she knows very little English. We love to hear the children singing the Creole songs while they play. She has also been a quite helpful to me in my language study, as well.

With our major project completed for this year, we do ask for prayer and support to continue the water filtration project for which we have received funding for 300 of 1000 filters. With this break, Austin has agreed to help me with school while he continues his translation and development of the biblical finance course. He hopes to build relationships with local pastors and school directors in order to get the program started. We are blessed and appreciative of your prayers and generosity.

This is the church in Panevezys that we built and it was still in great condition, just the way we left it 23 years ago.















Tom was able to make a trip to Haiti even with all the turmoil going on in the country now. There is very little fuel and many businesses have closed because of all the roadblocks and lack of travel in the country. The port, where commodities are shipped in, is closed. Sometimes whole areas are cut off by protesters. The conflict between the president and legislature is at an impasse with no end in sight until some time in January when some political dissident's terms expire. There are so many things regulated by the government: fuel prices, water, electricity, schools, teachers, police, area leaders. The government has no money source since the port is closed; customs funds are not coming in due to the government shut down. Fuel is normally subsidized by the government and black market fuel is available at double the price from the Dominican Republic. It's a volatile situation throughout the country.

At Shiloh Children's Home, Dieulène and Nelson are able to care for the boys because it is a small home. Tom was able to bring in clothes and food to help encourage them. The boys still sleep in the same beds/cribs they've been in for nine years. This is definitely a project we need to work on this year, to make or get proper beds for them. They all live in two 10' x 12' rooms that they rent in Hinche. They do have electricity most of the time which is a great blessing! They have a water faucet in their yard, as well as an outhouse. Nelson's brother and his family rent the two rooms above them, and his two younger brothers have a small 6' x 8' room each off the courtyard.

They've had some hard times as Dieulène's dad passed away a few weeks ago, and their 2nd daughter is due any day. Nelson is now in his fourth and last year of Bible school to become a pastor. Tom was able to spend a few days with Nelson and the boys. They are well and continue to grow and learn. Please keep them in your prayers, as life is not easy in Haiti. We are blessed to have such a loving and caring family managing Shiloh Children's Home. We would like to see this model duplicated in other communities around Haiti. Living in Hinche gives them a better platform for sharing the love of Christ and Christ's love for orphans.

We sincerely thank you for your prayers and financial support of this valuable ministry in Haiti. May you be blessed richly, as you have so richly blessed others.

Storybook Pediatrics with Ron & Stacy Smith





Hello, everyone. Stacy and I are officially new this year to Harvest International though I have been friends with Danny Thomas for at least twenty years. In 2018, Stacy and I spent three months working in Onaville above Port-au-Prince, Haiti. Our focus was on two things: teaching sewing to the women there and performing a malnutrition study in children age five and under.

The sewing ministry was a great success and Stacy was the star of our three month stay. Two teams of women from our church came and helped in our first few weeks there. The malnutrition study was intended to answer the question: are the medical teams going to Onaville doing any good? We examined almost 400 children in the community and found little external evidence for malnutrition. However, the simple hemoglobins that we did on every child revealed hidden malnutrition. About 19% of children there are severely, chronically malnourished.

Our good friends, Joseph Similien and his wife Martine, helped us with both the sewing and medical during our stay. "Simi" was a tent leader in Delmas after the 2010 earthquake and the founder of Make A Difference Worldwide Institute there. Simi already had 2 1/2 years of English study with the Haitian American Institute before the earthquake. With the support of two organizations, one of them a church, he taught ESL, computers, cooking, and many other things in the wooden school building.

Several years went by and a disagreement between the organizations resulted in all withdrawal of support. The school closed and Simi managed to salvage some school materials and furnishings before local thugs tore the building down. He purchased land in Onaville which only became available as a result of the earthquake. This was to be a retirement area, but since the earthquake the population has risen from around 1,500 to now over 250,000.

When we met Simi and Martine, their wall around their property where he hoped some day to build the school was barely a few feet off the ground. The Lord moved our hearts to help and before our three months were done in Onaville, the wall was complete, gates and metal doors included. Over the last year, we have seen the school building rise within the compound walls. The first floor the three planned is finished and classes are to start January 20, 2020. There is already a waiting list of Haitians wanting to attend classes. They will have to pay something for the classes and the school should be self-supporting.

The goal of the effort with the school is to teach locals so that we can address the poverty and thus improve the nutrition of the children there. We have been very careful to stay away from toxic charity. It is a proven fact that outside giving can kill local business and ruin Haiti's fragile economy. The school is an appropriate response. Across the street we have property where we hope to build the first Malnutrition Study Center where we will routinely check hemoglobin levels and give measured nutritional support as the labs dictate. Our goal for the next year is to add the second floor to the school which will give about 8 more classrooms. The third floor will be a dormitory to house those visiting to teach in the school or work in the Malnutrition Study Center. Each floor will cost about \$25,000 to complete. The Malnutrition Study Center will probably be less, since we have already completed the wall, including the gates, on the property perimeter.

As soon as I walked into the yard, I could feel that I had walked into our next home project. After a quick visit, I had seen quite enough. I returned home to give Kaelee my report. After she saw the pictures, she agreed with me. That

same day we got a message from a sup-

porter telling us to expect a special gift. After expressing our thanks, we revealed what we had just decided to do. The supporter increased the gift to equal 2/3 the cost of the home! Feeling God's leading, we brought the project to the attention of another supporter, who agreed to give the remainder. Within a few days, the home was fully funded!

With the experience of the first home, we used the lessons learned to adjust the

home plans and got our construction team on the project as soon as the family had cleared the worksite, which they did in three days. With hard work, good weather, and timely material delivery, our construction team finished the home in 17 days! The weekend before we left for the US, the family moved into their brand new home. God be praised!

As can be expected, we are solicited for help quite often for many and varied needs. My brother, Gilbert, has already completed a site visit for our next home project. Related to this next project, I experienced a great blessing. We had decided to build a home for another family, but when I mentioned this to the man, he said, "While it would be nice to have a nicer home, I believe that this family [whose home is pictured left] is in much greater need." This deeply touched my heart, because we don't often find people with that level of selflessness.

As we face the uncertainties of life, we realize that we are limited, but we serve an Unlimited God. That is why we continue to do for one what we can't do for

all. We continue to request prayer for Haiti's political situation, wisdom, and for financial support to continue meeting the needs of our Haitian community as we focus on the water filter and home building projects this coming year. We are so thankful for your prayers and generosity throughout this passed year and look forward to what God has planned for us this coming year.

Here in Southern Haiti, the weather has been beautiful and we've had no hurricanes this year, however, life has been and continues to be, difficult due to the unrest in the country. There has been no school since last June and we haven't been able to purchase fuel since August. We are very excited and thankful that the Camp Mahanaim gymnasium has become a focal place for the children and young people of the area and we have more than 250 that come several times a week to play volleyball. We have given more than 20 young people including our "Angels" jobs as volleyball coaches and referees and they are doing a great job of training the younger players. With the team of 6 people and the help of our Haitian youth group (Deb's English class), they were able to meet the needs of almost 2000 patients during the week. Many were very sick and some would have died had the medical team not been here. The Haitian people were so appreciative. We held the medical clinic inside the girl's dorm and it worked great. Each morning of the medical clinic, there were hundreds of people lined up outside our gate before 6:00 am hoping to see a doctor. More than ever, we have appreciated the ministry of "Agape Flights", which is our missionary mail service. They fly regularly into the Cayes airport bringing our mail and supplies. This has been so helpful since road access to Port au Prince has been cut off most of the time. Last week Agape flights brought us over 1000 lbs of granola bars, and snack foods that we have been able to share with the youth and children that we minister to each week. These food items as well as the "Manna Packs" that we give out have sustained many people in our area. We've been giving approximately 5000 manna packs per week, and the people really appreciate


