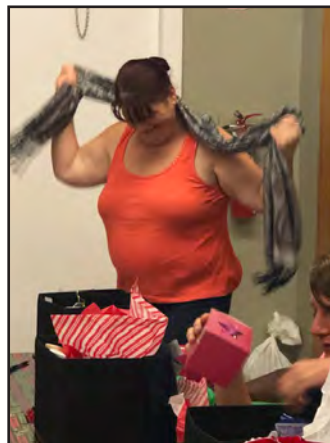


Harvesting at Home

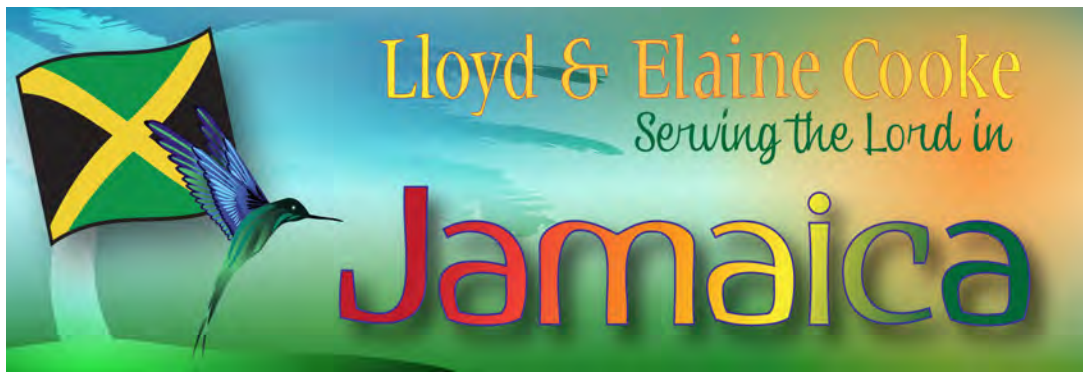

OUR RECENT VISIT TO THE U.S.

Elaine and I are back home after 10 days in February spent in Florida and North Carolina. The purpose of our visit was two-fold:

- To attend a Mission fundraising banquet in Ocala, Florida on February 22nd.
- We also took the opportunity afterwards to go on up to Raleigh, NC, to visit with our daughter Gail, son-in-law and grandchildren.

Our Ocala visit afforded the opportunity to share about our various areas of ministry in Jamaica. We also got to see, and stay with, a couple who were a part of our church in Miami, during our 21 years there between 1978 - 1999, before our return to Jamaica. We found a number of past friends from Jamaica, who now reside in the mid Florida area. One such couple drove all the way from Atlanta, GA (a 6 hr drive) to be at the banquet. We thank God for the opportunity we had to help God's people to focus on Jamaica and its spiritual needs.

After the Banquet, our trip to Raleigh did not go smoothly. We missed our flight from Orlando, due to the distance, and time to travel, from Ocala to the airport. We were forced to take the Amtrak to Raleigh, traveling overnight (a 13 hr trip by rail) arriving Sunday morning: in time to go to church with our daughter's family. The couple of days with our daughter - and with other family and friends in the area - was a refreshing period. But the temperature was not to our liking, as it was 42 degrees on our second day there. Our grandson and his father were both suffering from colds. Nevertheless, the conditions were better than what followed our departure, as they have since faced three "Nor'easters" with snow, wind and storms from their area up to Maine.

Since our return on March 1st we have resumed our various areas of ministry. Though the time away was precious times of renewing acquaintances and family relationships, it is great to be back home and occupying our God-ordained roles. We ask you to praise the Lord with us for:

- A new set of nine students in this, the third year of the Children's Ministry Course, learning how to win children to Christ by every means possible.
- Lloyd overcoming an outbreak of rashes, a few days ago. Elaine thinks it was my eating some 'old' fruit salad I had made many days before. We had to go to the pharmacy for some medication to assist.
- Lenten meditations, on Wednesdays, among the local churches are going well. Pray with us that the remaining weeks to Easter would see many more believers coming out for times of refreshing.
- A downturn in incidents of murder and other crimes in the western areas of Jamaica since the imposition of emergency police measures.

Do join us in prayer for the following prayer requests:

- A possible Medical Missions Team to Jamaica later in the year. This is the burden of a Jamaican doctor resident in Florida, who attended the Banquet in Ocala that we attended. Much planning still need to be done to bring this about.
- Pray for those the Lord will call to give of their time, finances and devotion to go on this trip.
- For a dysfunctional family next-door who constantly seek our help in various ways, that we would be always patient with them, and winsome in our witness.
- For Lloyd's invitation to preach at a traditional Good Friday service at an Episcopalian Church in the eastern region of Jamaica. He is asked to speak on three of the seven words of Jesus from the cross.
- For financial needs to be met, and to see an increase in our support level. Pray for the Lord to add some new monthly supporters for us.
- For our government as they continue wage-negotiations with unionised workers. There is a spirit of acrimony as the government says they are unable to meet increased demands of the workers.

We rejoice in your faithfulness in standing with us by your prayers, as we do our bit for the kingdom of Christ in this area of the 'Harvest'. May the Lord reward you abundantly.



Like many people in the world today our missionaries in India, Betty and Daniel, have trouble with internet security. Betty recently informed us that she has lost a large database due to hacking. This comes on top of increased pressure from the government on Christian ministries. And just in case their faith isn't being stretched enough, their home church building in Bangalore has started sinking into the ground on one side. Their response has been to adopt 3 new rural areas in Nepal and step up their church planting activities.

They are currently involved in two new churches in south India. Betty will be retiring in April from her position as a professor and will be full time in the ministry. She is looking forward to having more time to conduct educational classes and medical camps. She will also have more availability to travel with Pastor as he travels to the outlying areas where they have already started churches and continue to encourage those believers. As time for VBS approaches they request specific prayer for the repairs needed for their church building. It is a large building and without it they will not have a large enough facility for the huge VBS activities that start soon.

Betty writes me short emails as she is able and I try to consolidate the information to update you. Her two closing sentences from her last email say it all, "We have more resistance but we still carry on the work. Please pray for us."

PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

We are overjoyed to support Deputy Headmaster Patrick Kyomohendo of Hope Primary School in Ft. Portal for Advanced Education. In the very near future the current Headmaster will retire and we want Patrick ready to take over the leadership of the school. He has been Deputy Headmaster since his graduation from Teacher's College in 2004. He was our first college graduate from the Good Samaritan Project in 2004 after being in the program from 1999-2004. His wife Florence is a P1, first grade, teacher with 75 students with the aid of two helpers. A few years ago the Department of Education tried to replace the current Headmaster, Chris, with a Muslim. They were told that the school was founded and built and supported by the New Life Presbyterian Church and a Muslim Headmaster was not acceptable. They were convinced but we want to be ready if they try again.



Their children consist of the following:

- **Joseph** - The son of Patrick's brother who died from an asthmatic condition a few years ago. He has completed his Senior 4 exams and is awaiting to see the results.
- **Richard** - Has now gone to Primary 6.
- **Andrew** - Has gone to Primary 5.
- **Goergeius** - Has gone to Primary 1.
- **Patrick Jr.** - Has joined middle nursery class.

Patrick has completed his first semester of year one of the program on December 12, 2017. His second semester was completed in January 2018. He is able to attend school in Ft. Portal town and goes during semester breaks at Hope school and during Christmas break. He will continue with his third semester in May of this year which will finish his first full year of Masters work. He will then have one more year of study to complete his required study for the Masters program.

Please pray for Patrick and Florence and family. They would cherish you sending their names to God's throne of grace.



BLESSED RESURRECTION to all

***Dedicated to the orphans of Zimbabwe, with love:
"Let the children to come to me, and do not hinder them,
for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these." (Luke 18:16, NIV)***

We recently became aware of a 10 year old girl here whose hands were horrendously burned. Apparently the girl's mother had recently passed away and her father had taken another wife. He went away for a month, leaving the child in her step-mum's care. The child was apparently hungry and had taken and eaten some cooked rice and potatoes, without the permission of her step-mum. The step-mum set a pot of oil on the fire and dipped the little girl's hands (palms down) into the boiling oil. As if this was not enough, the step-mum locked the little girl up for two weeks during which time, the child received no medical attention.

We have seen a photograph of this child's hands and it is as horrible as it is shocking. The fingers on the left hand are completely gone and those on the right are badly burned. The palms are cooked.

My heart was so overwhelmed that I simply wept. I couldn't even begin to imagine the physical and emotional pain and distress this little girl has endured and still continues to experience. Only God knows what the future holds for her.

When I first shared this with a Doctor friend in the US, she immediately spoke of re-constructive surgery. While I have no doubt that there are capable medical personnel here in Zimbabwe or next door in South Africa, the current fiscal strain on this nation's health sector will not allow it.

Still burdened by this little girl's plight, I contacted a foster parent here who told me: "It's a very sad case. This is one of the many painful stories I come across a lot as a foster parent. Yes, and much worse."

"Hosanna to the Son of David" the little children shouted 2,000 years ago (Matt 21:14-17). So as we celebrate our Resurrection Life in Christ Jesus, and the hope of His soon return, please let us remember the 2 million, or more, orphans here in Zimbabwe and those who are working towards providing them with safe and loving homes. Pray, that God would use their pain to draw them unto Himself and also, that God in His mercy would draw their abusers to Himself.

Dhan and I do not have a ministry to orphans but a number of the churches that we work with do. If you would like more information on how you can be a part of a ministry to orphans here in Zimbabwe, please let us know.

Social media, email, Messenger, and WhatsApp make contact I have with some of the older kids and the caregivers easier and more frequent. Recently I received a message from a young lady who grew up at the home and is now graduated from college. She said, "I know sometimes you are not happy with us, and there are times you must feel like giving up." I assured her that though there are times I am disappointed in hearing a child has taken a wrong path, I love each of these kids as much as I love the ones who are doing well in school and behaving themselves. ***"God shows His love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:8.*** I was able to confidently tell my grown Kenyan daughter that it is only because God loved me first that I am able to love others. Please pray for the children, teenagers, and even young adults of the home to know God's love and to seek Him first.

The kids of the home will be out of school for the month of April, so we covet prayers for all! May their break be refreshing and constructive. May those who are inclined to get into mischief have a change of heart and mind. Pray for two of the boys who will undergo medical treatment during their school break, and please pray for the caregivers to have meaningful conversations and opportunities for giving godly guidance to the high school students returning from boarding school.

The work in India takes on many different flavors and directions yet they all lead to spreading the knowledge and love of Jesus Christ.. We cannot hope to influence lives for God when we leave the people with no hope and no comfort in this life. For that reason, Sharath has many ministries that deal with their lives now in order to win them to eternal life. Today I want to share three of the ministries that I have personally been active in.

One of his personal ministries is a sewing school for young women. On graduation day we gave away 14 machines in order to facilitate these young ladies being able to provide their own livelihood. The school is a six month program and includes instruction in Christian concepts and living as well as sewing and tailoring. The Hindus and Muslims that attend the class almost always accept Christ as their Savior before graduation.



Another ministry allows two young women who were abandoned as children and raised in Sharath's orphanage to pursue the dream of a nursing career. These two young ladies will be in a position to not only minister to others physically in their work but to share the Christian faith and doctrines that they have been taught their entire lives by Sharath and the caregivers at the orphanage.

Finally, the men's ministry. Men are very hard to reach in India and it is very hard to be a Christian man in India because of the cost. A man has to be willing to risk death, be rejected by family and friends and lose his job (if he has one) in order to follow Christ. These men meet each Tuesday morning at 5:30 in order to strengthen and encourage one another for their Christian walk. I am honored to be able to participate in this weekly meeting when I am in India.

Ministry in India is not confined to a church or building but takes place in homes and the street and the schools. Wisdom for Kaelee in making daily social decisions and language skills improvement . I find myself almost daily faced with decisions regarding the people who come into my yard. I ask myself things like, "Should I give this person what they are asking for or are they just begging? Is this culturally appropriate to-give, say or do?

Safety and expediency to finish our home. One thing after another has put off finishing. Even though we know this is all in God's timing, we do pray to have a place where our family can call home. Our own home will surely provide some sanity and routine that our family badly needs.



Daily, God reminds us of His Will in all of this, and of his mission to spread the Gospel. Life gets messy, but God stays the same: our constant refuge. Thank you so much for your faithful prayers, your notes and gifts. In both victory and seeming defeat we are reminded of you standing behind us. 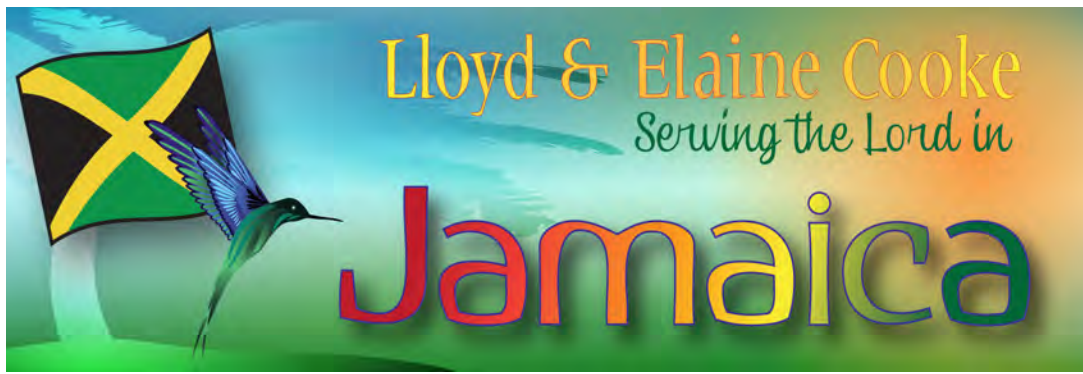
We hope that this update finds you well and that your summer is off to a good start.

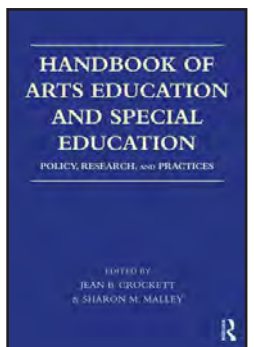

“In 2017 we opened the Center for Inclusive Education with mostly the kids of the Notre Maison Orphanage and children in the community that participate at the school. The parents are very happy with our program and especially happy to see that we include children with disabilities in our school. This is something new to them and they are also very satisfied with the education we offer to the children. We are beginning with the registration for the 2nd year and we are already crowded. I think 1st we offer a good education; 2nd we offer a decent price that parents can afford. The intention of opening the Center was to offer a good education and also to provide the poor children, with and without disabilities, to get a good education.”

Gertrude Bien Aime: “I have been coordinating the Notre Maison Orphanage for years and before that I was a nun at Mother Theresa congregation. For the last 25 years I have kept this orphanage going and the children with disabilities fed and cared for through faith and outside visitors who come to stay at our orphanage. I left the convent in 1993 with American (Ruth Zimmermann). We opened the Notre Maison orphanage for the children with disabilities We take in the children from the abandonment room of the general hospital or on the street. In

2001 Ruth got sick, since then I am running the house with helpers. I do not know from one month to the next what we will have available. I do all that I can to take care of 52 children, and I get so much joy in serving them. People who stay at the facility who are doing projects in Haiti stay at the orphanage which is how we support ourselves, buy food for everyone and provide care for the children, and I get so much joy in serving them.”

The children are now going to school five days a week at the Haitian Center for Inclusive Education! A goal that Gertrude has had that is now a reality thanks to the support we are receiving through Harvest International.



Jamie Schumacher has over 25 years of experience in education and has taught 6th grade through 12 grade. Most of her years in the classroom were spent co-teaching with special-education teachers, and from them she learned many techniques to use to meet the needs of all learners. She earned her master’s degree in counseling in 1998 and worked for many years as middle-school counselor. The skills she learned as a counselor made her a stronger teacher when she returned to the classroom setting! She currently lives in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and serves as School Administrator at the Haiti Center for Inclusive Education.

Hannah Ehrli, ED.D. is a National Board Certified teacher of over eighteen years in Exceptional Education. She has served Exceptional Learners as a teacher, consultant and advocate. She is currently teaching and founded a unique Preschool program for students with Autism, while also teaching High School students as teacher aides. She has worked extensively in Eastern Europe (Serbia) and Haiti, as well as an international speaker on Best Practices for Education of Special Needs children and the rights of Women and Girls.

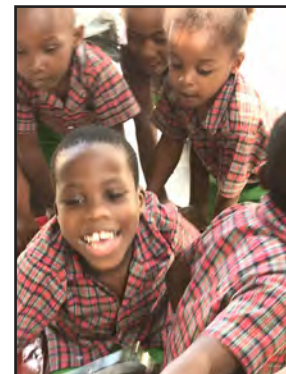

PREPARING FOR THE FUTURE

GRAND WEDDING OF DR. TADEO KATURAMU

Dr. Tadeo and Carol are now wedded and he has been looking for a job up to now unsuccessfully. Our friends the Myhres who are American doctors and have lived in Uganda and Kenya for many years came up with another option. They found an opportunity for him to apply to a Family Medicine Residency Program for East Africa based in Kenya, out of Kabarak University. It is a Christian program that trains young general doctors after their internship to become leaders at Hospitals. It takes 4 years minimum. The program asks students to get sponsors for \$600/month. But Praise the Lord he qualified for a scholarship program and the cost will be only \$200/month which will be manageable. Praise the Lord, God is good all the time!

TEN YEARS IN ZIMBABWE

On June 25, 2008, assured that it was the Lord moving us to our new assignment, we flew out of Miami bound for Zimbabwe in southern Africa. Our mandate was clear - we were to help believers grow in their relationship with the Lord so they too could participate in the great mission of discipling the nations.

At that time, the Country was caught in record inflation with all the attendant problems. The local currency which, thirty years prior, was trading at two dollars to the British pound, was fast becoming worthless. The following year, it was officially abandoned when several billion Zim dollars were required to buy one US dollar. Trillion dollar notes were already in circulation. Severe shortages of food and other necessities were also the order of the day and, in fact, most shops were closed. In those days, you moved around with huge boxes containing whatever money you had. Everyone was, at least, a trillionaire and your status improved with each passing moment. Power cuts were also rampant, sometimes lasting for three or so days.

A few months before our arrival, national elections had reportedly failed to produce an outright winner and we landed here the day before the run-off election. Sadly, this was marked by much violence but, eventually, a negotiated national unity government received the blessings of the UN. The economy improved considerably and goods and services became readily available since; except for a dire shortage of cash during the past couple years. Fast forward to today, long lines of customers outside banks are again a familiar sight. But the people of this country are very resilient and we all learn to cope with these and other challenges. Another election is due here on July 30 and, following the change of President last November - the first in 37 years - most people are very upbeat about it.

Since our arrival in 2008, our base has been in Harare, the capital. For the first several months, we connected with pastors/church leaders in the City who introduced us to some indigenous pastors. We saw that Christianity and church meetings were very popular; and we were also quite surprised to discover how easy it was to start a 'church'. But, sadly, the Gospel was hardly ever preached and Discipleship was largely an unknown concept. For the next nine years, we worked with individuals, small groups, churches and Pastors Fraternal, sometimes travelling 300 plus miles away. Many times, a group would seem very excited by our meetings, but along the way we would sense a growing casualness as participants looked for preaching material rather than personal growth. Desperate, we cried out to the Lord to send us those whose hearts He had been preparing and in whom He had been planting a desire for Himself and His purposes. By this time, we had ended all our groups except Goromonzi (which we have since terminated) and Gweru.

Almost immediately, He sent us to more individuals. Now, we meet weekly with individuals, pairs and larger groups in Harare and in Gweru. Our venues include our and their homes, and conveniently located church facilities. We also meet via skype and phone (What's App). Of course, these appointments are more time-consuming and intense but, also, more fulfilling. Additionally, in September, (soon after the elections) we hope to begin with the Pastors Fraternal in Mvuri, a local assembly in Glendale and another in Mazoe, all in the same general area. Yet another group from, Domboshawa, is asking for our help and we have scheduled them for later this month. So, the vision is catching. We are blessed to be here at this time so we can be available to the Lord.

But, by far, the highlight of our time here is what the Lord has been doing in our lives. Paul, in Gal. 1:16, describes it as the Lord revealing His Son in him. We realize that we cannot be of any help to others unless we are receiving from the Lord Himself as He conforms us to the image of His Son. Today, He is dearer to us than ever before, and our hearts are full of praise to Him. Oh, how His grace abounds toward us! So we look forward to the days, weeks, months, years ahead - whatever the Lord wills - for He who called us is faithful.

It is now winter and this year's is quite cold. Homes are not heated so we use electric heaters which prove worthless when it is very cold or the power is off! We were at freezing a few nights ago. But our heavenly Father gives grace for this too and enables us to endure; and we see His purposes in this as well. Some have asked if we plan to spend the rest of our lives here. We answer that we are here as long as the Lord wants us to. We are truly thankful to Him for this privilege and are ever so grateful to you for your faithful and loving partnership by your prayers and financial support.

As another mission team prepares to visit the home in July, we look forward to talking to the kids about their dreams and aspirations, to pray with them, and to encourage them in the Lord.

A couple of folks with nursing experience are joining us on this year's mission trip, so they will address some common medical issues, nutrition, and hygiene with the kids and caregivers. Others on the team will engage the kids in soccer, arts, crafts, and bible studies. Some of the ladies on the team are preparing to lead the mamas and aunties in a women's conference. They have done this in Brazil and Mexico, and they are always well received. We anticipate the ladies of the home to be highly encouraged.

The Good Neighbor Project is something always done on these trips whereby we form teams of adults, teens, and children to visit homes in the village surrounding the children's home; deliver gifts of food staples, hard candy, and soap; pray with the families; and share the love of Jesus with them. The reception we receive as uninvited guests stands in sharp contrast to such a reception we would likely receive here in the States. Pray even now for the folks we will visit!

The wedding looks elaborate and it was, weddings in India are very important and 3,000 people showed up for this wedding. A lunch was served to all the people and it was a real celebration.

Being a Christian wedding and celebrating the covenants given to one another was a display of God's way. All the people who came enjoyed a delicious lunch at no cost to them. Sharath had no money for the wedding, he just believed God would provide for his son, and God did in miraculous ways. First Sharath prayed that the rains that were heavy every day would stop for the wedding, and the whole town was talking about how it stopped for the wedding. Secondly the Lord provided for monies for everything to be paid for, no debt. Every detail was covered with no debts. That was a miracle of God.

Sharath is a man of God and although he has responsibility to 70 churches, providing for the pastors, an orphanage of 30 kids, widows, a tailoring school, a bible training school and pastorate of a church himself of 700 people, he walks with the joy of the Lord and a love for people.

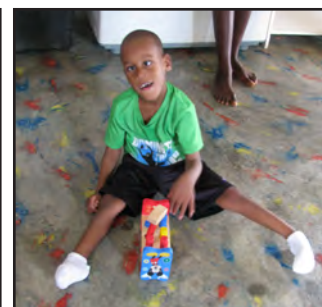
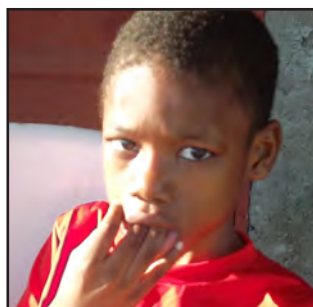

We would also like to bring some volunteers down to help improve the conditions of the home. One special Blessing is that there is a water pump near by and part-time municipal electricity.

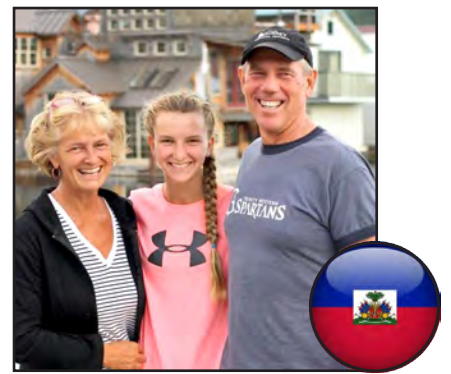

Haitian Center for Inclusive Education



More students are attending HCFIE, we're up to about 65 kids now. I saw firsthand this week why we need to have an inclusive school. For many of our students this year, it is the first time they've been around people with disabilities. A couple of times, when one of our special-needs students walked by, the boys backed away as if frightened. Another day during recess, some of the boys didn't want to let one of our girls with Down's Syndrome play on the playground equipment with them. I insisted that she could, but they didn't look happy about it. Then, when she got down, they wiped off the seat she had been sitting on. It just about broke my heart to see 7-8 year olds acting this way because they had learned this attitude from somewhere. We have our work cut out for us, but at least the Center is a place where kids (and their parents) can learn to think differently about people with handicaps.



One little guy, Alvarez, has many emotional needs. He causes more trouble than anyone I know, and he has the reputation at home and at school for being the one causing trouble. I'm not sure I've ever heard him get any positive praise. So, last Friday after chapel I asked Alvarez whether he would "help" me memorize the Bible verse so that I could recite in this week at chapel. Every day we sat together up on the roof of the orphanage and worked on the verse. Friday in chapel, he "helped" me recite it, and he got positive praise! The smile on his face was priceless.

Another student who struggles, Kethia, sat next to me during Chapel. I had my hymnal and Bible with me, and as I was singing, I noticed her moving closer and closer to me—she wanted to read, too. Then, while the group was praying, Kethia took my Bible and started reading from it. She helped me find the memory verse for this week in the Bible, and when I asked her whether we should recite it together next week, she smiled and said yes!

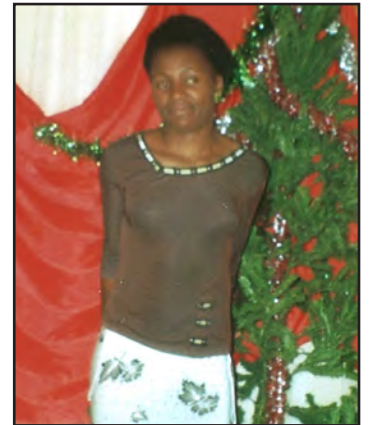

“If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow me.” (Jesus - Luke 9:23).

“No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment, for the patch will pull away from the garment, making the tear worse. Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do, the skins will burst, the wine will run out and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved.” (Jesus - Matthew 9:16).

In our more recent updates, we mentioned that we are currently meeting with two church groups in our Discipleship ministry – one two Sundays monthly; and the other one weekend monthly. Additionally, we also meet once weekly with a number of individuals as well as small groups. Each group is different and so it is often quite a challenge to prepare for their particular needs. We have learned that what works for one does not necessarily work for the others. Our continuing challenge is to keep ourselves focused on Christ, who is both the Subject and Object of our discussions – “fixing our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith...” (Heb. 12:2). And we are learning that it is only as we remain submitted to Him, He is able to minister in and through us.

One church group is in the small town of Mvurwi which is rural and where most of the folks are very limited in English. They are a very welcoming group and we have spent the last several weeks getting to know them and how we can best serve them. Some walk several kilometers to Church while others come in by bus from neighboring farms when the \$4 bus fare is available.

We have discovered that most have had very little exposure to even the rudiments of following Christ. Many do not own a Bible so, whatever their faith, it is grounded, not on the Scriptures but on what they were told or the clichés they have otherwise ‘overheard’. Really, it is like sewing a piece of new cloth onto an old garment; or like pouring new wine into old wineskins. As we share both the new wine and the new wineskins, we find that the tendency is for them to hold on to both the old and the new! We know that only the Lord can sort this out. So, we must trust Him to reveal Himself to them. At a recent meeting with the Pastor, we agreed to focus on helping the leadership who would afterwards work with the others in the Church.

We praise our Father for you and for your labor of love towards us. You continue to be an absolutely indispensable part of this ministry. The Lord has used you greatly in providing for our material and ministry needs without which we would not have been able to remain on the field these past ten years; nor could we even look forward to renewing our residence permit when it becomes due early next year! Many of you have also spent much time praying for us and for those whom the Lord has sent us. Additionally, you have sent us occasional notes or emails, just to keep in touch. We deeply appreciate all your efforts. But, may we ask one more thing? Please step up on the prayers!

The need for Discipleship here, even at the most basic level, is critical and urgent. The destiny of many rests upon our joining together in prayer for this specific need. We are assured that as you do, our heavenly Father will hear our prayers and grant them according to His riches in glory. Surely, we will begin to see vital changes. Thank you so very much!



Ready, Set, Go!

Kenya Team 2018, a group of thirteen made up of young, not-quite-so-young, and those in between; men and women; first-time and repeat visitors to the Haven set out for a two week encounter with God on July 18th. After 24 hours of travel, we arrived in Nairobi and spent the night before heading up to Eldoret.

Upon our arrival at the home, we were greeted with handshakes and hugs for every-body...literally, every child and caregiver greeted each team member individually. It's a process. Afterwards, we got settled into our comfortably outfitted bedrooms in the boys' dormitory. Then we prepared 30 gift bags of sugar, salt, shortening, corn-meal, flour, tea leaves, soap, and a few personal items to deliver to surrounding homes.



After breakfast the following morning, we divvied ourselves into teams of visitors, caregivers, teenagers, and children to make our deliveries and home visits. Most neighbors were home on this Saturday morning, and the warm welcome showered upon us remains unsurpassed. "Karibu!" (welcome!) was the sweet refrain from house to house. Crowding our large teams into tiny homes was in no way uncomfortable...we were ushered in with sincere gratitude for our visit. The cultural difference between the reception of uninvited visitors in Kenya and the U.S. is stark. We offered prayers for homes and families. One poor lady had just lost her sister that very morning, and in the midst of her tremendous grief, she welcomed us. It was our honor to pray for her and her family in the midst of such a trying time.

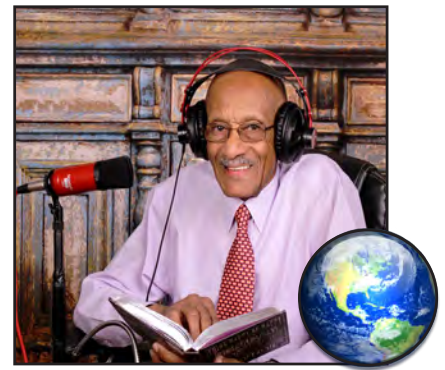

Greetings in the name of God our Father and our Savior Jesus Christ! We are so thankful to have you on board with us as we strive to be Christ's hands and feet in the Santrain/Percrey area of the Far North West of Haiti. In fact we could not do it without the loving prayers and support of the Saints.

August was a month of prayers answered for us personally and for Faith Medical Clinic. This entire year, the clinic has been struggling with insufficient electricity. As there is no electric grid out here, all the electricity needed must be provided by generator or solar. The solar panels on the clinic were about 20 years old, so they put in a lot of good service. That being said, they needed badly to be replaced due to inefficiency. Austin has been charging the batteries from another building and lugging them over to the clinic every couple of weeks. On our giving report at the end of July, we were surprised with an outstanding gift that allowed us to purchase new panels. Austin and a local electrician installed them and did the rewiring required.

The prices of goats are best at the end of August, so the deacons of the church purchased and distributed the animals then. Six nanny goats were given to six different families. The first kid of each animal will be given back to the church to ensure the continuation of the program.

Our best friends here in Haiti, Terry and Carolyn, left for their time in the states. It was hard to see them go, as we meet with them several times a week. Before leaving, they offered for us to purchase their ATV. What a blessing it has been. All of us fit, so we can take it to church or across town. It's Austin's daily transportation.

Austin took a day trip mid-August to visit with missionary friends about two hours away. He returned greatly encouraged and uplifted by their fellowship. As the busy work often leaves us with little energy, it's good to be reminded that God's will is more than work. It's the attitude and spirit in which we do it that marks our work His.

*Merry Christmas
and Happy New Year!*





As we face Christmas I thought it might be interesting to share how, as Jamaicans, we celebrate Christmas somewhat differently than in North America or Europe. Especially as we are in the semi-tropics, and so have no winter and snow to look forward to.

As children (kids) we eagerly looked forward to Christmas. So we had no TV nor even radio, though our parents were avid newspaper readers. The way we knew Christmas was near was when the weather would get a little colder. This for us was the Christmas Breeze: It would arrive late November or early December, and we would shiver a little. We would watch certain plants begin to change color, or their leaves would turn either white, red or yellow for the season. The ubiquitous sugar cane would begin to flower, that is the mature cane. To us this was a sure sign that Christmas was near.

Church: in church Christmas was the time for special practices to enact Christmas plays and Cantatas. Lloyd remembers his first such play, as a shepherd. His only words were 'me too!'

- Caroling was especially fun. Older children and young adults would go on early morning walks singing carols in the village at the front doors of older residents and shut-ins of the churches. We would be cold, yet had few sweaters for warmth, but the joy of the responses warmed our hearts and made it all worthwhile.
- Christmas Mornings meant early church services. Lloyd's father, as an Episcopalian (Anglican) minister who supervised six churches, would begin his travels and services to three or four different locations at midnight. Another service would begin at 3:00 a.m., one at 5:00 a.m., and the other at 7:00 a.m. He would arrive home exhausted just in time to share breakfast with us at about 9:00 a.m. The night before Mama would be engaged in baking of the heavy, black fruit cakes that are an indispensable part of our Christmas. The children's part was to help in the rubbing of the butter and brown sugar until Mama could feel no grains anymore. We loathed this part of the job. What we also criticized her for was how many tins of cake we would have to take to neighbors or needy persons in the community.
- Christmas Sunday was the time for singing many carols, and for the special choir numbers or cantatas, together with the minister's Christmas message. Christmas Sunday was usually the Sunday following Christmas day or, in some churches, the Sunday nearest to Christmas day. The children would wear their new clothes and all their fineries.

Home Preparations would be many in anticipation of the day.

- Rat-cut coffee was how we children would earn money for toys, as our parents/grand-parents would not be able to afford to give us much pocket money. But as there were many coffee plants in the gardens around the house; and rats would attack the berries and chew away the skin covering them, the adults would leave these on the ground for us to gather, put out to dry, and sell for us to the factory. Our portion of money received would augment the foods and few frills our parents could provide.
- For the girls it may be a new doll, for the boys we would buy Chinese crackers, or larger 'bombs'. Even our father would delight in exploding his 'fire-crackers' on Christmas morning.
- Christmas trees were not yet a common part of our Christmas, but if we could find in the forests a willow tree, or some fir-looking branch, we would cut and take this home to be decorated. Balloons and bright lights (after we had gotten electricity in our villages in the mid '50s), along with ribbons and some cotton for snow would festoon the branch we had brought home.
- Food and Drink was the most important part of Christmas for us kids. Our Aunty Myra would be sure to bring us each a bottle of 'aerated water', it was never called 'soft drinks' yet. We would travel to the home of our grandparents on 'Boxing Day' since our father would be busy in the churches on Christmas day. All our cousins would be there, and we would show and share our toys. The meal would be sure to include rice and peas, (specially 'gungo peas') and Daddy would bring along the specially ordered 'duck bread'. It wouldn't be Christmas dinner without that. Then there would be the 'Sorrel drink' made from the boiled fleshy leaves of the rose-like bush that bore in time for Christmas. Some homes would flavour it with ginger boiled in, and some would add 'spirits' to that consumed by the adults. The children's own would be 'virgin'. And yes, roasted breadfruit would be a part of the meal.
- Junkunoo (John Canoe) dancers were a regular part of Christmas, in the 'olden days'. This was an African dance, left over from our cultural heritage, that was brought to the Caribbean. The actors would dress in frightful costumes. We would be scared of them in their African costumes, yet strangely attracted. These cultural dancers would appear on Boxing Day, the special rest day for servants the day after Christmas. Yes, those memories are precious!

A Year of 'Great Things'

One year ago, it seemed to us that the Lord was reducing our monthly inland travelling and getting us more involved in weekly discipleship meetings with individuals and families here in Harare. While the latter have surely materialized, He has also added on a new group – Mvurwi, two hours away. Although we have been meeting with individuals and small groups almost since our arrival here, it has never been on this present scale. For this, we truly praise God.

Discipleship is, generally, not very appealing because it requires a lifelong commitment and discipline. So unlike many in the Early Church who took seriously the Great Commission, today there seems to be a growing desire for “quick fixes”. But, we thank God for those Pastors and Leaders here who are now looking beyond the large numbers, extremely great singing and dancing and popular preaching, and see the need for building the Lord's Church through discipleship. Praise God for the courage of these men who are going against the flow. It is an uphill task, as they work with their flock whose faith often includes aspects of their ancestral beliefs.

The highlight of this year's ministry was the mini Retreat which was held December 3rd to 6th under the theme, “Instead, we will in all things grow up into Him who is the Head, that is, Christ” (Eph. 4:15). Praise God, everything went according to plan – accommodation, participants' arrival, every session, every meal. Now that it is over, we are even more certain that the Lord led us in this - selection of invitees, every detail of the program and every topic that occupied our time together. The interaction and responses were amazing, the conviction and brokenness telling. We believe that we have not yet seen all that the Lord intended from it.

This is the first time we have attempted anything like this. So, for the future, should we consider a similar annual event when we bring together key persons with whom we have worked over the years? In so doing, they would not only be encouraged and strengthened but we would also compensate for being unable to regularly communicate with some of them because of the remoteness of the areas where they now live and minister. But until the Lord gives the green light, we cannot plan to move in this direction.

So, in this snapshot of our 2018, we trust you have a sense of what the Lord has been doing in us and through us, for, “it is God who works in us both to will and to do of His good pleasure.”

But over and above all is how privileged we are to belong to the Lord and to know Him as our Father. His grace continues to abound towards us in every aspect of our lives. This Country is again going through a very difficult time, politically and economically. There are very few who are not being seriously challenged by the inflated prices of goods and services (could be as many as five times the normal) and the resulting scarcity of necessities like food, fuel and even medicines. But we believe the Lord has His purposes in all of this and He is working out His sovereign plan for His eternal glory. What opportunities for the Gospel!

Thank you so much for the vital part you play both in our lives and in the lives of those with whom we work. Each time we meet with a group or individual, or are able to hand a participant a Bible, we are reminded that we are part of a team which includes you. Indeed, we are so very blessed by your continued partnership, friendship and faithfulness in prayer and giving. Special thanks to all those who prayed us through the preparation for and the Retreat itself.

As we celebrate Christmas, we thank God for placing His Son in us that we might become His children. In this unique relationship we can all, with grateful hearts, rejoice in what He is doing in us and through us, as a team, to achieve His purposes in this Nation.

Throughout 2019, may each of us be filled with a fresh revelation of this “Christ in you the hope of glory” who lives in our hearts.

The Tassel's Worth the Hassle. Allan May Oluoch, one of the first boys to join the Haven in 2005 is now graduating from Moi University in Eldoret, Kenya with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science and Public Administration. Allan has persevered through life's difficulties and disappointments. He was abandoned by his father, and his mother died of typhoid when he was about six years old. Allan suffered with a debilitating skin condition, and after the death of his mother, he shifted from one abusive family member to another, until he decided to hit the streets in search of a better life.

In God's providence, he came to a feeding program being held at the Spiritual Life Centre one day in 2005. He still had a sparkle in his eyes, unlike most of the street boys who were addicted to glue and given up on life. So, he was invited to become a member of the the Haven children's home. Allan adapted to life in the home quickly. He did not speak much English, but he was a voracious learner. He quickly excelled academically and athletically. He accepted Christ and began writing Christian songs. It would not be too long before he began performing in music videos. All the while, he readily gives thanks and praise to the Lord because he recognizes that *"Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly lights, who does not change like shifting shadows."* James 1:17.

Please pray for Allan as he navigates life as an adult. He desires to pursue a Master's Degree, yet no one but the Lord knows how this can be accomplished. Pray for divine guidance and provision.

Home for Christmas. This warm sentiment is not always what one hopes it to be. The Kenyan government encourages children's homes to send their kids back to the towns and villages of their origin to visit extended family members and clans during the Christmas break from school. There is always the concern that some children do not have a safe place to make such visits. Many of the Haven and Fresh Start children and teenagers have 'gone home' for this annual visit. Please pray for their safety and well being. When they return to the the Haven and Fresh Start homes after Christ-mas, they will begin preparing for the new school year in January. Pray, too, for provision of school fees, school supplies, new uniforms, shoes, etc. as they begin a new school year.

I love you and our Heavenly Father who loves you more, knows the part you play.

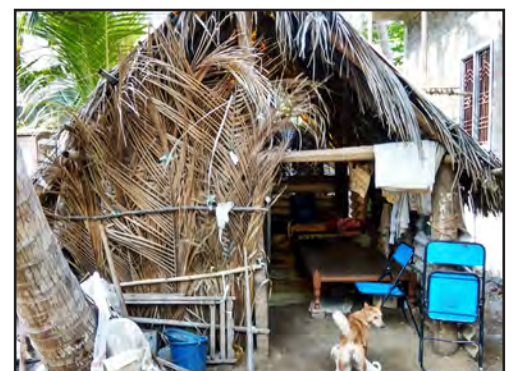

On December 6th Tom flew into Pignon, Haiti with MFI. He paid an unannounced visit to Nelson and Dieulene in order to bring some Christmas gifts and supplies and check on the boys, Jason and Maurice. He stayed with Neil VanDime and his wife Roberta. Neil has a ministry that is endeavoring to provide good water and sanitary outhouses throughout Haiti. His wife, a doctor, is endeavoring to open a small medical clinic in the area.

Tom found the family settled into a home in Hinche, as planned, and was pleased with the conditions. The home has a spigot in the yard with a good water supply. The outhouse was in proper working order. And, most amazingly, there is electricity 24 hours, 7 days per week. Lack of good water was one of the primary factors in moving the boys from the old home and although they have to carry water from the spigot, by Haiti standards it is very convenient to have the tap in the yard. The power in Hinche is supplied by the local hydroelectric plant and is more reliable and affordable than in Port-au-Prince. This allows them to use the washing machine to keep the boys clothes and bedding cleaner than ever before.

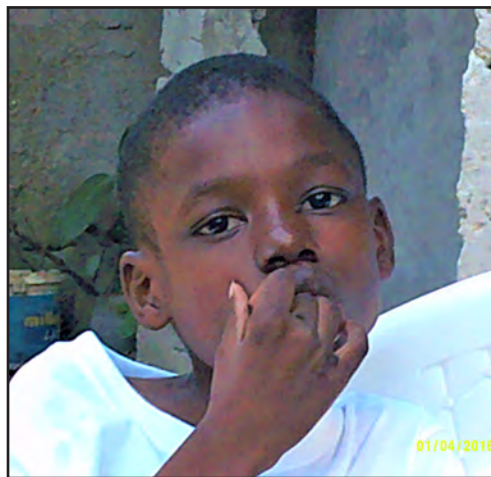
Both boys had grown since Tom last saw them, both in stature and in weight. Jason, at approximately 13, is taller and thinner. Maurice, at 10 -11, is stockier and more responsive. Jason is able to walk with someone holding his hand and responds to hugs and physical stimuli and input. He is not able to respond to visual or verbal signals. Maurice is very responsive to verbal signals and interacts very well with any and all visitors. He immediately started playing with the new toys and mastering the new skills they teach. He can walk but only while wearing shoes to keep his feet positioned correctly. Nelson and Dieulene have a two year old daughter that was wary of Tom but, like all American children, very proficient with using a smart phone.

Nelson is in his second year of training to become a pastor. Teo Babun, of Outreach Aid to the Americas, donated a laptop computer from a supply that he had received for his ministry. Tom delivered that to Nelson on this trip to aid him in his studies. He hopes to complete his training in just over two years and be able to minister as a pastor as well as helping with the children of Shiloh Children's Home.

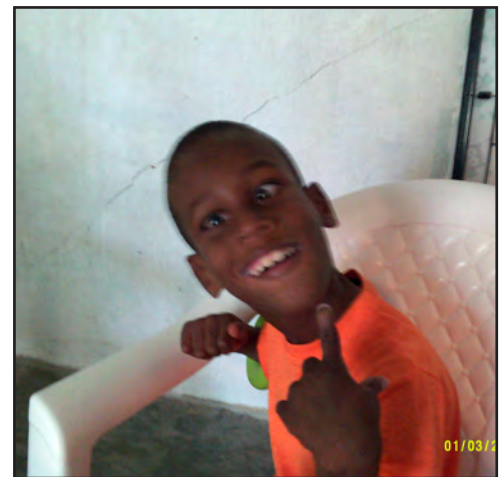

Our trip to the States with our Doctor was a great success. The final phase, the flooring, of our home is nearly complete. Austin’s brother, Odelson, says the tile should be finished this week. The tile came in our new truck which went through the Haitian customs while Austin was in Haiti in November.

Many of the needed upgrades and improvements for the clinic are completed. We have repainted most of the buildings, upgraded parts of the electrical system, and installed a gate to hospitalization center.

Our 2019 Projections- We look forward to continue our improvements such as: a new roof for two of the hospitalization center buildings, a new roof for the clinic, a complete rewiring of the clinic. Also, due to the increasing number of Typhoid cases, we would like to raise enough funds to provide 1,000 water filtration system to the people in our area.

As large as these goals may be, we are certain that if God wills it and with you help, these tasks and many more may be accomplished in 2019.

The kids at Sunday school this morning singing Glory to God in the highest. Today's bible story was about David and Goliath, and I thought for a moment about 3 people doing a Sunday school for 1500 children each week and just

as God fought for David, He also has given us what we need to continue this ministry. Each Sunday as we arrive, Deb greets the children and exchanges money for coins that they have found. Katie organizes the kids as they get seated and Rod sets up the equipment. At 15 years old, Katie does a great job of leading the singing.

We are so thankful that the Lord is really working in the lives of Stanley and Joseph who have been in the Sunday school for 10 years and are now taking leadership roles. They both read the bible and give a short talk and prayer every week. We would appreciate your prayers for Stanley and Joseph as God seems to be really working in their lives and they both live in difficult situations.



Deb always finds time to care for even the smallest needs. Rod does the bible story, Katie helps give out the Manna packs and Deb does a short medical clinic every Sunday as we finish up. As the children leave, there is always a group of

adults that come in with medical needs. Deb is giving antibiotics to a young man who might lose his middle finger. It is very swollen and these people have no other place to come for medical care. We are very thankful for the Missouri medical team who leave enough meds with us each year so that we can help serve the people.



Several times we have had to use our Dewalt cordless shop vacuum to remove rocks or bugs that get trapped inside ears. This little guy today wasn't too excited about the procedure once he heard the sound of the vacuum. I use a small tube to reduce the suction of the vacuum.

We had a very special visit with our long time friend Max whom we hadn't seen for many months. Max has aids and we worked together with him 15 years ago, helping people who have aids and also building an orphanage for children who have aids. Max recently had a stroke, but thank the Lord, he is recovering well.

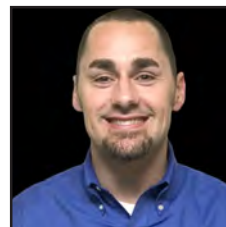

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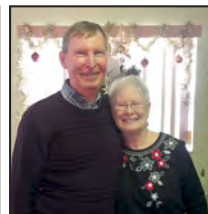

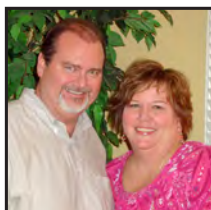
