In June, Luther Hansley called to let me know that he and Carol were leaving Haiti and Harvest International, Inc. I was surprised but not shocked. I knew that someday Luther and Carol would leave the mission field. But as you well know, no matter how ready you think you are for that news, you are never ready for that news. I was sad, happy, stressed, excited, worried, and expectant all at the same time. The truth is that I knew that God had a plan and all I needed to do was to acknowledge that He was not surprised by this event and that He had someone already picked out to take over. Praise the Lord. The Wrays were God's provision for us.

We were very busy with hosting teams last year. At final count we hosted 33 teams to 5 countries. That is almost double the number of teams that we hosted in 2006. Most of the teams went to Haiti with several going to Romania, Uganda, and Ukraine. We sent our first official team to Kenya as well. We thank the Lord for our blessings in 2007 and are looking forward to what is in store for 2008.

Little did we know, that when we cele- brated Christmas 2007 in Eldoret, Kenya, it would be the last day of peace in our town for a while. The month of December, up till Christmas day, was a great month for us and the children of The Haven and Fresh Start homes. Early in December we said goodbye to a precious team from Ocala, FL. Pastor Jacobs, Kecia, Fred, Joan, Rosemary, Calvin and Stefanie came to visit right after Thanksgiving, and they were such a blessing to us and to so many children. Right on their heels, we received a team of three from the Memphis, TN area. Mike, William and Logan came

to help with camp. We had about 200 children from four orphanages and our local church. The children and the adult counselors were so happy to have these guys come to show them the love of Jesus. When William and Logan left, Mike's wife Suzanne and their son Daniel came to join Mike and visit us and their daughter, Sara, who has been with us since early September. The Studdard family went on safari, and then came to Eldoret to spend Christmas. They visited the children at The Haven, and on Christmas Day they visited the children at the Rescue Centre. The children were so happy to receive visitors. In Kenyan culture, visitors are considered a great blessing from the Lord. For the children of the Rescue Centre to be visited and showered with gifts of fresh fruit was very special. Our celebrations quickly faded. On the 26th we had violence in our town as an angry mob turned over a few cars and set them on fire to protest vote rigging they suspected to have already taken place before the elections on the 27th. From then on, our little town of Eldoret made international news as many people were hacked to death, burned out of their homes and even burned up inside of a church where they were taking refuge. All this has reminded me that we really will never know true peace on earth until the Prince of Peace comes again. Please pray for all of Kenya and especially for the orphaned children who have just one more chapter of fear, rejection and pain added to the story of their young lives. May the love of Jesus shown to them by their caregivers and US sponsors overshadow the realities of difficult circumstances, and may the Prince of Peace reign in their hearts and lives."



were viciously murdered. Alan and Pam May, our in-country missionaries, chose to leave their home and return to the United States due to the instability and violence in Kenya. We thank the Lord they arrived safely. Sadly, the children at The Haven had nowhere else to go. They hid inside the walls of the orphanage, praying for peace to return to the land.

On February 28th, 2008, we received word that the devastation that had plagued Kenya for over a month had finally died down. It is hopeful that the government is coming to some sort of peace terms. The children at The Haven are all well. Although at times they were frightened, not one child was harmed.

Since many store owners in Eldoret have packed up and moved away, there are limited places to gather supplies. Food costs have increased dramatically. Before the country's unrest the cost of four bunches of greens was 20 shillings. At times the cost rose to 700 shillings. It will be a long time before the economy in Kenya returns to normal.

Alan May recently returned to Kenya for a visit. The children are doing well and are on a break from school. They are enjoying the relative peace since Kenya has adopted a coalition government which has brought a near end to the post-election violence. The Haven took in several displaced children during the height of the chaos, and one little fellow, Dennis, is going to stay. He's quite a precious little boy who needs a permanent home. He seems to have fit in very nicely with the rest of the family.

The construction of the new children's home is still going on nicely. Allan visited the site during his visit and it looks as though it is more than three-fourths of the way towards completion. The dining hall is finished, the girls' dorm (Fresh Start) has two stories completed, and the roof is being put on now. The boys' dorm is about to have its second floor poured. As you can imagine, the cost of building materials (as well as food, petrol, etc.) has shot up significantly since the skirmishes in January, but we are still hopeful that the construction funds we have will complete the job. Please pray that it will.

Considering the great need to care for more children, we would love to be able to furnish the new orphanage as soon as it is completed and then bring in more kids. We'll have room for 80 more children after the Fresh Start and The Haven children

move in, but we cannot take in any of these additional children without funding to feed and clothe them. Please, please help us find more people interested in sponsoring children or generally donating to the support of the children's home.

Pastor Sam Kasule talked with Florence and we promised to supply milk and vitamins to help Stephen grow and stay healthy.

August 2008 – So here is baby Stephen, now a young boy who we have placed in Primary one at the Hope Primary School. On the first day of school Stephen cried, for you see he had seen so many others going to school leaving him behind but, no more!

Dick and I have no children of our own, but each year when we visit grandmother Florence, who by the way takes care of so many other grandchildren, comes with Stephen and says to us, here is your child! God has blessed us through our prayers and His love for each one of us.








he Mays Kenya, Africa



Cassie's Children's Corner

The average family in Haiti cooks one meal a day. They begin by placing sticks or charcoal in the middle of three rocks on the ground. When the fire has started, they then place a 5 to 8 quart aluminum pot over the rocks to heat and pour in rice and beans.

A year ago a 50 lb. bag of rice cost \$50. Today that same bag is \$80. The rising cost of food and fuel has not only hit Americans hard, but has damaged Haitians who depend on imported supplies.

In a country where unemployment is high and families earn less than \$2.00 a day, food is *UNAFFORDABLE*.

July 30th was an exciting day for me. Ann Farquharson, Coordinator of Garden of Joy School in Haiti, was visiting in Florida and came to meet me for the very first time. It was wonderful to finally be able to talk face to face. We discussed many things about Garden of Joy. I am happy to give an update to all our supporters.

The construction at Garden of Joy is still under way, but moving along nicely. The children have finally been moved out of the church section and into classrooms. The church is now being used for services.

This summer Ann's daughter and granddaughter visited her in Haiti for the first time. They spent a week seeing all that Ann does. During their visit, Ann conducted a food giveaway to many Haitian families. There were many happy faces as they gave out 120, 41 pound sacks of food. Families came thinking they were only getting financial help to buy the children's textbooks, but what a surprise awaited them! They had a praise service then made some announcements regarding school opening. Then they made the announcement that the supporters had helped with giving food in the middle of the summer. Each family received rice, beans, corn meal, millet, sugar, a half gallon of oil, garlic, tomato paste, tinned fish, tinned milk, toothpaste, soap, and chicken boullion cubes. Many children and their families had enough food for more than three weeks depending on the size of the family. Every parent said thank you many times. During the praise service every sponsor or sponsor group was prayed for. Each parent is very thankful and appreciative of your support. They always pray for you and ask God to bless you so you can continue to help. Ninety-five percent of these parents could not afford to send their children to school without your generous gifts. We are thankful for your out pouring of love to help these children during the summer.






The Johnsons with Sam & Zoe Kasule

Pray that God will give us enough financial support to help us in the remote area and for provision of our primary needs.


Pray that God will prepare a place for us to live with our children in Mapou. Pray that God will send people to help us on this Journey.

The entire South of Haiti, including Les Cayes, remains somewhat cut-off from Port au Prince and the rest of Haiti. We are thankful for the small airline service but travel by road has been difficult ever since the four hurricanes this year. At first, people and big trucks were shutting off their engines and having their vehicles pushed through the 300 meter long section of flooded road, but now it is too deep and unsafe, so everybody is relying

upon the bypass detour which has been built. Unfortunately, it is a very steep road only suitable for 4X4's so the large tanker and container trucks are still not able to come out to Cayes. Fuel, and many supplies have been difficult to find. As I write, it is raining again, and we have had non stop rain since yesterday at about this time. Things are starting to flood again.







St. Martin, but the river was still flooded where you have to cross at the beach, so we unloaded the food in a nearby house, and Pastor Voltaire made arrangements to take the food across by dugout canoe, and then the rest of the way by donkey to St. Martin. I am really glad that I went when I did as the rains have returned here this week and the roads are probably not passable at all again.

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The orphanage for children who are HIV positive is progressing extremely well. Together with Max, we are planning for October 24th





as the date when we will move the children in. Earlier this week a director from Cayes General Hospital contacted Max after she heard about the orphanage. A cute little two year old boy named Giberson was abandoned at the hospital and they didn't know what to do with him. The poor little boy has no parents, (they both died) and his grand-mother abandoned him as soon as she found out that he has the HIV virus. The director at Cayes General hospital was very excited that we will take Giberson into the or-

phanage and she will work together with us in the future.

The Sunday school program at Renault is going very well. Tom and Ginger visited the new area with us, where an older man has given us a piece of land to use. We had the land closed in with Palm branches and now we have much better order and respect from the children. Pray for the direction of the Sunday School ministry. It seems that God is perhaps leading us to build a more permanent type facility for the children in the Renault area.

This morning, I am being reminded that we can be so wrapped up in our personal lives that we fail to grab the way out that the Word of God speaks of in I Cor. 10:13 or the rest in Psalm 23. I woke up to get online when all sane homo sapiens were asleep. This has worked well for me in the past so this morning I was rearing to go. There was power, the phone was working and I thought everything else would be a breeze. But this was not to be. Daybreak came and I still could not get a connection.

Meanwhile, life continued outside! As I stood in the doorway and took in the beauty of it all, I could feel the peace of God ministering to my heart and peeling off my hours of frustration. "This is my Father's world, the birds their carols raise, the morning light, the lily white, declare their Maker's praise."

Here in Zimbabwe, we Christians are daily learning that "all things" in Rom 8:28 means just what it says even if we do not understand where God is taking us. For many of us, Luke 11:3 is our reality yet there is nothing as beautiful as the blend of Shona voices singing "Wakanaka, Jesu;" (Jesus is wonderful) or "Tinotenda Jesu" (Thank you Jesus) at a worship service giving God thanks for the daily provision of food items, bus fares, water and all the basic commodities that overnight have become luxury items. This is my Father's world, O let me ne'er forget that though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet.

The world's economy is imploding around us, bringing with it fear, uncertainty, and untold human misery. Like Jacob (Gen 42:6) it would be easy to give in to despair and say, "All these things are against me". But our hope is in God who sits on His throne bringing all things in heaven and on earth together under one head, even Christ (Eph 1v 10). God has been so faithful. It is so awesome to watch the Lord work in the hearts and lives of these children and young people in Romania.

I would like to share with you a little about the Hospice Camp and the fact that this year, Shannon Lyles, a young lady whom we have watch grow up in our church; she is a Pediatric Nurse who works with diabetic children; and loves kids, was able to come to Romania to help with this camp.

One of the children, Geta (Get-a), is 11 years old, she has leukemia; has lost most of her vision because of chemo; and she needs help getting around. This

was her second year of coming to camp and last year she was very shy and didn't participate much. This year, because there were extra youth from England helping, I asked them to try and encourage her to get more involved. That's all it took and she was unstoppable from that point forward. She played games; participated in water day; she got involved in the small groups asking questions and answering questions; and did the hand motions to all the songs. The neat thing is that even though she could not read the memory verses, she first listened carefully then just kept repeating them to herself over and over. She was the always the first one to raise her hand when it came time to recite them. WOW! On the last night of camp, Geta accepted Christ as her Lord and Savior! We were all so excited, but this is not the end of the story. A week or so after camp, Lidia, one of the Hospice nurses, went to the village where Geta lives to give her some medication. Geta's Grandmother (who is Geta's caregiver) was so excited to see Lidia and with tears in her eyes she asked Lidia what happened to Geta at camp because she is not the same as when she left to go to camp. She is now having to read the Bible to Geta and Geta is praying. Lidia said that she then had a chance to share Christ with her.

Another child is Fabiana who is 8 years old and has Dystrophic Epidermolysis Bullosa which is a skin disease and is very irritating. She does not have the use of her fingers because they are fused together. On Thursday all of the kids go on a hike up a mountain behind the camp to a fortress that was built in the 1500's. We take it slow for these kids because of their illnesses and for most of them it is the first time they have the opportunity to walk through a forest and up a mountain. Fabiana's mother came to help her at the camp and was concerned about her trying to make the hike. We encouraged Mom to let her come and volunteered to help with Fabiana if she needed it. We didn't get far before Fabiana got tired so her mother started carrying her. We stopped and wanted to help but Fabiana didn't want anyone to carry her but her mother. Her mom was so tired and we kept stopping to give her a rest. Finally, Fabiana let someone else carry her up the rest of the way and Mom got a break. What is so amazing about this story is the love and patience Fabiana's mother had for her daughter and she was prepared to carry her all the way to the top of the mountain even though she was physically exhausted. She gave all she had for her child.

This was Fabiana's and her mother's first time at camp and their first exposure to Jesus Christ. All week long they were like sponges – soaking in every word. Marinella, the Hospice Director, had an opportunity one day to talk to Fabiana's mother about what she had heard and she had a lot of questions. The last night at camp Fabiana and her mother came to accept Jesus Christ. What an amazing experience that was. All week, Fabiana's mother fleshed out God's love for us at camp and that is exactly what our heavenly Father wants to do for us. He wants to come into our lives to help us with our struggles and carry us when we can't go on.

Praise God, there are now children who have Jesus walking and carrying them through their journey with their illness!! Yes, it was an awesome summer.

The Woodalls



This had been a wet year before hurricane season arrived and then four storms came one right after the other. Haiti experienced heavy flooding, erosion and much wind damage; several bridges washed out and many homes destroyed. The low lying areas were the hardest hit and could only be reached by boat or helicopter for weeks. We teamed up with the Haiti Baptist Mission in a relief effort to help meet the needs. Samaritan's Purse purchased 21 tons of food: rice, beans, salt, canned fish, corn meal, sugar, spaghetti, cooking oil. 1200 families received the relief kits which consisted of two bags of rice, one bag of beans, one bag of sugar, one bag of cornmeal, two packages of spaghetti, one bot-

tle of oil, four aluminum plates, cups and spoons, a bottle of water purification tablets and Christian tracts. Over 1000 buckets were purchased/collected for distribution. Several hundred kits were flown into remote areas that could only be reached by air. The recipients were very thankful for the compassion shown them in their time of need. We want to thank those of you who contributed items in the Ocala area. In Miami, Cullie, with the help of our son Ryan, packed over 4200 lbs of buckets, tools, clothes, hygiene kits and food that is being shipped to Haiti. Thank you to those who contributed funds to help purchase and ship these items. We are grateful for your prayers for our safety through the storms; we were

aware of God's presence.

Recently, my wife Ginger and I went to Haiti to visit the families and projects Harvest is a part of. Because of the hurricanes that have devastated areas of Haiti, I was concerned about getting to the places we needed to visit.

Our first stop was to Les Cayes where our missionaries, the Wray's, live. This area was hit hard by the storms and had been cut off from the capital for weeks. There were shortages in everyday products such as food, water, fuel and cement. The hurricanes washed away land, crops, bridges, vehicles

and homes. We visited the MEBSH Hospital projects Rod is working on as well as the children's new Aids Orphanage where teams have helped. We looked at the erosion that took place at the Canadian sponsored dam Rod built with his crew. The dam withheld most of the flood water, protecting many families, but it needs to be repaired before the next hurricane. We visited the river areas, seeing some of the washed away river banks, that took parts of the stick pole built homes of the poorest people in Les Cayes. Lastly, we visited the village were the Wray's Sunday School feeding program is. They give hot meals to between 500 and 800 children weekly.



Next, we traveled to Gonaives where the most devastating hurricane damage occurred. The roads had just re-opened after many bridges and roads had been washed away. There were hundreds of people in lines waiting for food. The damage to walls, homes, cars and trucks was severe. The roads were barely passable. While visiting with Pastors Charlie (Charlie's Champions orphanage) and Sylvestre (In His Hands orphanage), we saw the school/church buildings first floors were being cleaned out of mud and sediment left by

receding waters. School was postponed until November because of the damage and displaced people living in the school/church buildings. I visited the Pastors and their wives, along with the orphan children they care for. They have lost all their belongings and some do not even have shoes and clothes. Pastor Charlie's home is still under water and severely damaged.

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We returned to Port-A-Prince and visited with the Woodalls who have been helping people in the areas of destruction high in the mountains. There were many trees, utility poles and wires down and many homes destroyed with large amounts of erosion visible. It was clear that the storms and heavy rain effected Port-A-Prince as well as the people living there. Lastly, we spent time at World Harvest, the orphanage that we lived in for a time with all our children. We saw growth and positive changes in these children's lives.



Harvest will continue to help with supplies, teams and funds as God enables us through your support. After seeing so much damage, it was encouraging to see the strong faith these families have living with no basics that we take for granted. They have only water, a little food and their faith in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and His provision through fellow believers. Seeing them faithfully reading their Bible and trusting by faith that it is His Word that sustains us all inspires hope. Please pray for not just the turning of Haiti toward Jesus Christ and from voodoo, but that rebuilding of the many destroyed lives and property would happen soon.


We have also been looking into other ministries in the area in order to better understand the needs, as well as their approach to meeting these needs. We visited a homeless center downtown for street kids, a ministry run by Canadian missionaries. They have three feeding programs per weekday, one for the younger kids, one for the teens later on, and then one at 7:30 p.m. for the older teens that have jobs. They have a clothing storehouse that keeps a large supply of clothes, shoes, coats, blankets, and other personal needs. These children can come and sleep,

take showers, get haircuts, eat a hot meal, and most importantly have a Bible lesson followed by prayer. They are taught how to read and write and may even sit and color. Many of these children have never known what it is like to simply be a child. In exchange for the help they receive, they do chores around the center. At night the center must close their doors and the children go back out on the streets. This is due to the fact that the government does not allow children outside of the Internots to be housed overnight. Though



these children are encouraged to go to the Internots to receive permanent housing, many of them refuse because they have either been beaten or heard stories of others that have. It is difficult to know whether these stories are genuine, or if they just do not want to give up their freedom to do as they please. Many of these children are referred to as sewer kids. They hide out in the underground sewers at night or in abandoned buildings, seeking shelter while trying to hide from the police or just cruel people. The police pick them up because they steal from food stands.

They may spend an entire year at a children's detention center while awaiting a trial. It is so sad to see the oppression here!
