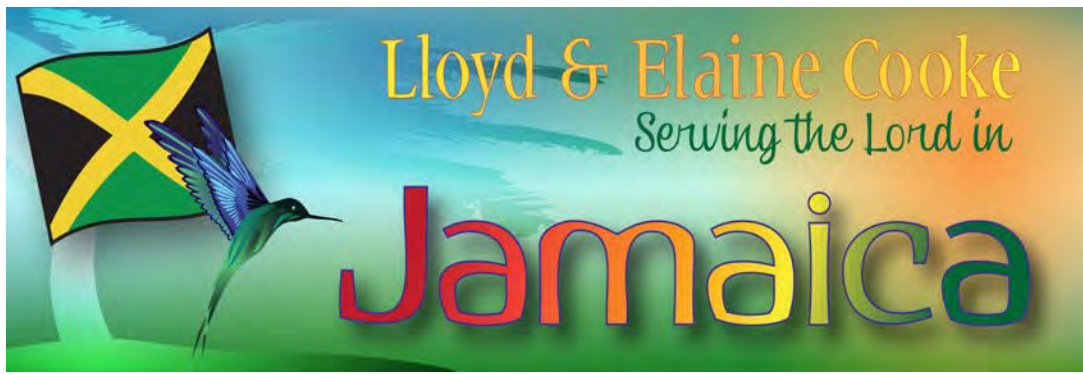

The cabinet of ministers chosen is a good mixture of youth and experience, with two of the members of the upper house (the Senate) being members of Lloyd's denomination. There are many nominal christians, and a few evangelical members on both sides of the parliament. Your prayers are needed that all will seek God's wisdom to govern rightly and righteously.

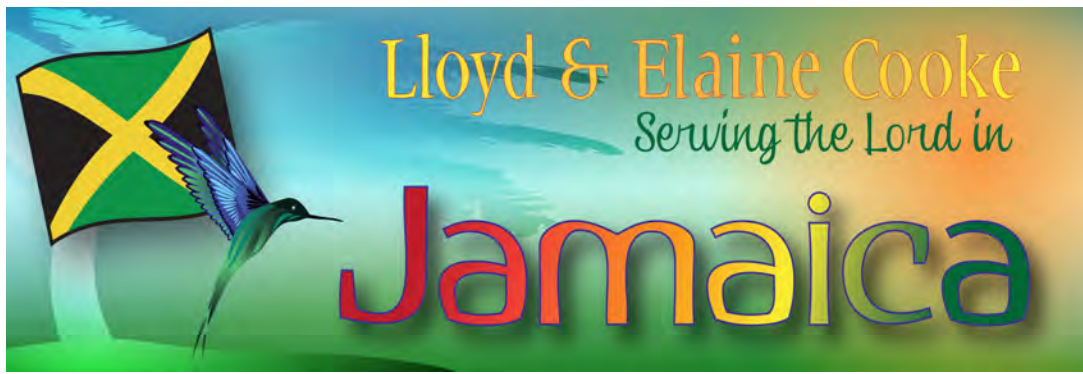

That opportunity was Lloyd's yesterday, as he witnessed to the landscape man who works for us. He attends church occasionally but is not saved. He said to Lloyd afterwards that "you know, you are the first person who has ever talked with me one-on-one about my soul." Do pray that he will soon ask Christ into his heart.

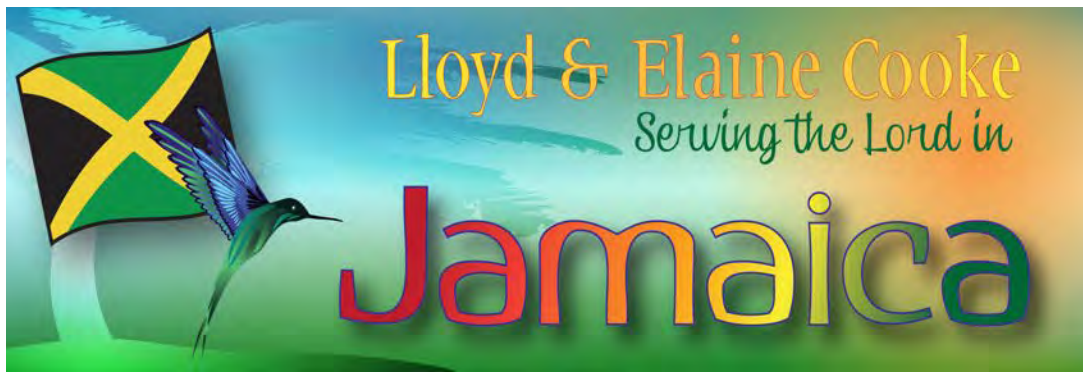

We just returned from Baileston United (Presbyterian, Congregational and Disciples in Christ) Church, in Clarendon near Spaldings. What a morning of blessings it was!

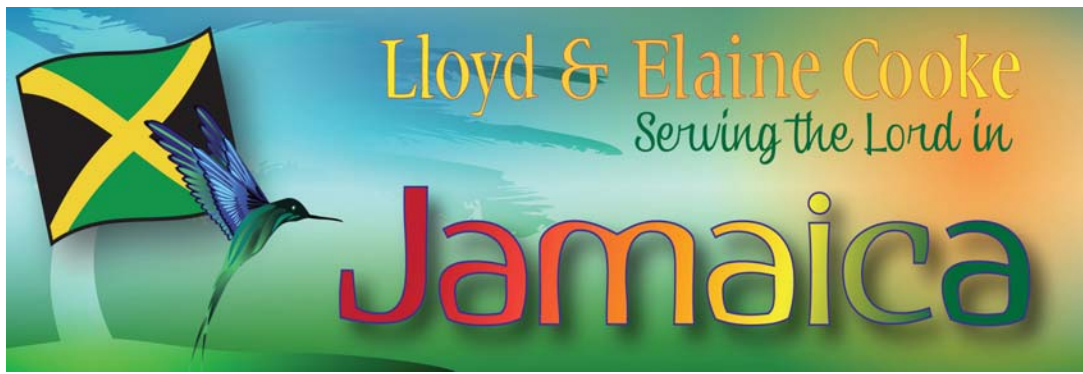

A Joyful Christmas, and a very Happy & Prosperous New Year to All!

A recent visit by Elaine (with three (3) others) to a local Elementary and Junior High-School resulted in much blessings and salvations. She goes into local schools to speak on the dangers of early sexual activity; and to encourage the students to "Wait & Win."

When she initially contacted the Principal and explained her purpose, he asked her to speak with the entire Grades 6, 8 & 9: a total of 14 classes. These were covered over two days when each did two sessions. With an average of 35 - 40 in each class, this means that about 500 students heard the abstinence message, together with a clear gospel presentation. Of those hearing the dual message of the dangers of early sexual activity, and of the power of Christ to save and help them to wait until marriage 237 children, and one teacher, prayed to receive Christ as their Saviour.

- for the opportunities we still have in Jamaica to present the Christian message in our schools;
- for open hearts among the children to receive us and the message;

- help in the follow-up process, to lead these kids to maturity in their faith;

The prophet Jeremiah once lamented concerning his generation, that “the harvest is past, the summer is ended but we are not saved.” We will offer no such lament, though it is true, the summer is near to its end, and we have not been able to take a break and get some rest. Yet we have seen God’s hand in blessings and in salvation constantly. And Lloyd will be leading a weekend salvation seminar in a traditional church next weekend, after which he will lead the listeners into an outreach effort. He also teaches on missions this Sunday at his local church. Please hold him up in your prayers.

After Regent College of the Caribbean’s graduation exercises on July 3rd when a new President was installed, with Lloyd being asked to write and also read the testimonial citation prior to the installation, we welcomed our grandchildren Annika and Tyler the next day from Miami. We took a few days off to welcome them and enjoy their brief visit with us. It was a treat having them, and exposing them to some of the local attractions. They toured the Green Grotto underground caves on the north coast, and learned something of Jamaica’s history at the same time. A visit to the ‘Black River Morass’ wetlands on a boat cruise the next morning was an ecological adventure. This was followed by an afternoon of rugged watery fun at the Y.S. River Falls. Lloyd took the risk of allowing them to do the rope swing over, and plunge into, one of the pools below a cascade of water. Regretfully we had to share them with relatives in Montego Bay, where they had many more days enjoying local sights and attractions in the western end of the island. Unlike on their last summer visit, there was no repeat of the ‘goats at church’ experience.

At the end of June Lloyd had received good news from his doctor, after a PSA blood test, that there was no need at this time to do the proposed biopsy, as his prostate numbers were reduced. Elaine’s high blood pressure is under control. We praise the Lord for continued good health.

Excitement is building in Jamaica towards the Olympic games, which begin in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, this weekend. Jamaica is again expecting a fair haul of medals in Track & Field. We also have entrants in Swimming, Diving, and Gymnastics. All Jamaica will be eagerly watching during the next couple weeks, as will we.

Elaine has just concluded two good weeks of Vacation Bible School at both Porus and Waltham Methodist churches. In both places some visiting children were reached with the gospel, and quite a few surrendered their hearts and lives to Christ. One young boy of a hardworking single-father home accompanied her to Waltham last week. Both he and his young guardian received Christ as Saviour during the week.

While Elaine ministered to the children, Lloyd was participating in and helping give leadership during the annual Keswick Christian-life conference in Mandeville. This was the 116th year of this united inspirational gathering of the churches around Mandeville. The morning ‘Bible Readings’ and the evening expository messages from the book of Acts, were a challenge for faithful christian life and service. They were wonderfully blessed of God to the hearers, and the response to the word saw many making dedication of their lives to follow the Lord more closely. The cooperation and participation of the churches in the town was greater than has been seen in recent years. The Ministers Association was encouraged by the new spirit, and trusts this will bear much fruit for eternity. This convention has long been the highlight of Church life in central Jamaica.

The dangers and vagaries of the tropical hurricane season has again imposed itself upon us. Monday evening saw the island in high gear preparing for a Tropical depression, turned storm, Earl. During last night and this morning the southern part of the Island experienced heavy rains and intermittent squalls. Fortunately, it passed to our south and gave us only rains. It is now headed for Honduras and Belize on the Central American coast. We pray they are also spared any great destruction, like we were.

Our sincere thanks go to you all for your prayers, interest and financial support of us. The last few months have seen a drastic decline in our financial support, while our currency's value plummets. But this is the summer when missionary support usually plummets. So we trust in God and depend on him daily for the supply of every need. Please keep us constantly in your prayers . We depend upon it!

Our dear and precious friends and family,

September 2016

With the passing of summer, the beginning of the new College year, and the continual calling home to heaven of more of our dear friends and choice servants of God, we are often led to consider our increasing years, and diminishing strength. But praises be to our God, He allows us continuing influence for His Kingdom here upon earth.

Elaine recently celebrated her 73rd birthday, and Lloyd his 74th, earlier in May. We continually talk about the mercies of God in allowing us extra time ('brawta', for the Jamaicans) to be able to reach out to and influence others for His Kingdom. Psalm 92:12-15 encapsulates our musings in this regard. We have indeed been like "palm trees... planted in the house of the Lord."

- Our roots are deep and firm,
- God is taking care of us, and
- causing us to flourish;
- we desire to continue to "still bear fruit in our old age"
(grey hairs, moustache and thinning hair...notwithstanding)
- we continue to "declare that the Lord is upright; and there is no unrighteousness
(unfaithfulness...) in Him."

While Elaine and I cannot report a multitude of activities, great numbers of recent conversions, and numerous calls upon our time from multiple places for ministry, we do continue to do those things which the Lord has placed before us. We also seek to assist others in their ministries, but mostly we seem to be acting more as consultants, guides and purveyors of 'Influence' to many to help them serve our Lord, to the best of their abilities.

Elaine's passion remains undiminished to see God's glory revealed in Jamaica, especially in the lives of the younger generations through the children in our location who seem to flock to her and to our home for various reasons. People in need seem to know that they can come to our door for a meal, a chat or for a few dollars to assist them to school or for some other need.

Our neighbour's son (bound by drugs, and having psychological episodes) recently attempted suicide by drowning. Thank God that Elaine heard his mother's cries and, together with the Police who were passing at the time, were able to rescue him.

Pray for her as she performs multiple functions in her local Methodist Circuit as pulpit preacher, children and youth worker; secretary of a number of church committees; and general instigator of outreach efforts to the needy with the gospel.

Pray also that her current mission to muster the Christian Church in Jamaica to rise up and confront the monster of crime and gun murders will find good response from our national Church leaders whom she is lobbying to act.

She has written an open letter in the Press to them about these issues, and is awaiting their response.

Lloyd's influence seems to be trending towards becoming a consultant in the areas of Church History and Missions.

A local Baptist church recently asked him to speak during their "Missions Month" on the topic of "Contemporary Mission Trends." One trend he shared about was the multitudes of Muslims who are turning to Christ in the Middle East and other areas, such as Africa and Indonesia. As Christians from North African countries, Iran, Iraq, and Syria are facing persecution, this is also causing large numbers to become Christians.

Opportunities are opening up for Lloyd to use his book on Jamaican Missions outside of the churches. His Publisher recently forwarded to him a request from a University Professor to have colleagues review *The Story of Jamaican Missions* for the Jamaican Historical Society. When Lloyd met with the Professor, he was told that the upcoming issue of the top Jamaican Cultural publication would carry an article which includes a quotation from his book.

He was also asked to be a guest presenter to the Jamaican Historical Society at their next meeting in early December, on the contents of his upcoming book. This is about a Jamaican family with six generations of foreign missionaries. At a recent launch of a new Missions Sending Agency, his book was highlighted as a source of information and motivation for Jamaican missionaries.

Lloyd's teaching assignment at Regent College this semester is Church History. He wants his students to be able to make connections with the past, and to see the blessings as well as the mistakes made by the Church in the past; and to use this knowledge to guide them in their future ministries.

May the Lord use all of these opportunities to His greater glory! Pray that Lloyd will be always well prepared, and be an instrument of God's grace to others, even in the academic community here in Jamaica.

We praise God for His gift of good health which we continue to enjoy. We have no chronic ailments to complain of. This enables us to serve, and to use our energies to motivate others, and to try to pass on to them those skills and insights we have acquired along the way. Our praises are due to the Lord; but also to you, our faithful friends and prayer helpers.

Do please continue to stand with us. The end-time clouds darken the skies around us, but our hope is in our ever faithful God. We know that He is in charge, and controls all situations for our good and His glory!

We see that some of you are already getting snow. Alas, Thanksgiving is not a Jamaican tradition. For us Christmas is the time when families gather. May it be for you a time of good family reunions, and times of shared memories of the Lord's goodness and blessings experienced during the past year.

We "thank our God upon every remembrance of you." For your love, prayers and faithful support as we continue to serve here in Jamaica. We have been greatly blessed with good health, good weather, and were divinely spared the ravages of a deadly hurricane, Matthew, at the last possible moment. Many believe it was the mercy of God towards us, once again. While we are thankful, we grieve for our near neighbour Haiti. But we are happy to report that a number of Jamaicans who are missionaries in South Haiti were spared serious damage and disruptions, so that they are able to minister to the needs of others. Please pray for them.

Elaine and I plan to visit in South Florida just after Christmas for the wedding of our daughter, Arlene on December 30th. We look forward to seeing and fellowshiping with some of you at that time. We request your prayers for us for the following:

- We mourn the passing this week of a younger cousin of Lloyd's from Prostate cancer. Please lift up to the Father his wife, Dianne, and two young children. Thank God that he was a passionate follower of our Lord.
- A Jamaican missionary friend who ministers a lot in the Eastern Caribbean, Africa and North America. He is facing Prostate cancer surgery, without having health insurance. He wishes to do the surgery in the U.S., and is seeking financial and other help to get the best outcome possible. Pray!
- A Jamaican-Puerto Rican couple who are doing Bible translation work in South Asia with Wycliffe. They are on furlough in Jamaica and wish to return to the field before the end of the year, but lack needed financial support. They plan to visit our church in a few weeks.

- For god's will and purpose for Jamaica as we face a Local Government (municipal) election on the 28th of November. We are praying for peaceful elections, and that all may accept the results as God's will.

- That Lloyd will find the right publisher for his just completed book on a Jamaican family of six generations of missionaries.
- For Lloyd's presentation about his book to a meeting of the Jamaican Historical Society on December 6th.

We also have many reasons to praise the Lord, and invite you to join with in praise for all of the Lord's blessings, and enablements for ministry. Please pray for:

- Lloyd's speaking and participation in a number of missionary conferences recently;
