It's early September here in Jamaica, and the children are back in school. Politics is also in the air and on our newscasts as it is also in the States. Ours are not Presidential polls, just for parliamentary seats to fill vacant ones. Bye- Elections as we call them.

We were fortunate to escape the ravages of a direct hit from the recent (July 2nd.) Hurricane Beryl. Though we escaped, various of our south-coast parishes (counties) did not. We did lose electricity for nearly four (4) weeks. Some locations only got back their service last week. This means that we had no Television service, no news reports; no computer service. Even our telephone service was disrupted for quite some time.

Both Elaine and I are "retired" missionaries. So, we have little news of special activities of soul winning and of conversions. Nevertheless, we are both involved in our local churches and minister to individuals as they come our way. Among these are young children, neighbors mostly, whose goats break through our fence and nibble on our flowers and fruit trees. Many do come to feast on our fruit trees: our apples, citrus, raspberries, and star apples. Elaine has tried to help some of them learn to read. This seems to be the biggest weakness in their schools. She uses the 'old-time method of phonics, which, it seems, the schools no longer use.

Some of these children also financially help with transportation and lunch costs, which is a big Jamaican problem. There is a government scheme to help parents meet these costs for their children's education. However the parents find it difficult to access it, so we help them get registered for this program. Some who get this financial help will use it for personal and family needs, causing the children to miss days of school. One such teenager just graduated High School. Elaine invited him to stay with us for a few days which went into a week. Pray with us that he may have seen and learned something that will become a part of his life in a positive way.

Like you, we often fear the future, but then we remember the word of Jesus to us that "when we begin to see these things come to pass we must "Look up! For then our Redemption draweth near." Like David, in Psalm 73, He became envious of the wicked until he went into the Sanctuary of God "then I understood their end". (Vs. 17.) NKJV.

Upon our arrival, we were greeted by the entire family except for a son and a son-in-law who were at work. Their wives, carrying their babies on their backs, had walked over to the family home to visit with us.

We were warmly greeted at the entrance of the small but clean home. After a little while, we were ushered into a room where we were formally introduced to some of the family members and renewed acquaintances with others whom we had not seen for years. Also present was a young man who is now



being discipled by our Pastor friend having previously attended a Church that preached heresy. The young man is thriving both spiritually and financially as he no longer must hand over most of his salary to unscrupulous men!



After a little tour of their home, the tiny chicken run, and the plot of land where the Church meets on a Sunday morning, we were served a nice meal. As we were getting ready to leave, they gave us one of the chickens from a small chicken project Pastor had started in the hope of supplementing his income. We accepted their gift because it would not have been polite to decline but all the while conscious of their sacrificial giving. May Father bless them a thousand-fold!

Although we have known this Pastor for many years, his and his family's love for the Lord and their dedication to His service continue to amaze us. May Father raise others like them to demonstrate His love and draw many to Himself through their service.

We met a group of families who live on making dances during religious processions. They decorate themselves as demons and dance. They live in plastic tents. One of our ministers approached them. They said they never heard the Gospel. We reached them and helped.

Last week we had a women's conference at our church for three days. The meeting started on Thursday. On Tuesday we had a prayer meeting. The Lord gave me the Word about Elijah. He prayed and heaven was shut. I encouraged people to pray. Praise God no rain during the three days. Rain is in the surrounding areas. People were amazed at this miracle and glorified our Lord.

He made up 82 family food packs, and with the help of Gerson, DD, and Rogerson, got those distributed in a few days to people in our village, and a few in surrounding villages. To avoid being mobbed and problems with greedy people, they actually went to each of those 82 homes.

He also got together three big boxes of medical supplies for the three medical clinics in our area. Basic medical supplies are totally unavailable because of our area being cut off from the big cities. Thank you, those of you who gave those items!

Austin has visited many of our friends in their homes and spent a lot of time catching up. He's been working on our vehicles and supervising a project to build an open garage to work on the vehicles.



He visited our friends Andrea and Nadej. Praise God for their new baby boy, Peter. Nadej had a very scary ectopic pregnancy last year and now God has blessed her and mended her heart with a precious baby. He is so gracious. Peter is child number six.
